New Licenses for Hunting Required

(Special To Tribune)
AUSTIN.—"Don't ruin your hunt by overlooking the game laws," warned the Director of Law Enforcement, Texas Game and Fish Commission. "Before taking your gun from the rack, be sure you know all laws concerning game in your particular area."
"Old hunting licenses expired August 31. Be sure to have your new licenses on you when you go out to hunt. Check your gun for a plug. Only three shells, including one in the chamber are allowed in it by law."
"Don't hunt on a piece of property unless you have permission from the owner or person in charge of it. Don't fire near a home or in a direction that might endanger some person, house, or even livestock."
"Hunting from a public road is prohibited by law and it's illegal to shoot from a moving vehicle. These are laws that have been in existence for quite a long time," said the director.
He then reminded hunters that many of the birds taken during the hunting season will have tags on their legs. "These tags should be returned to the Game and Fish Commission with information telling when and where the bird was killed."
He then warned hunters not to forget the changes in the waterfowl regulations. "If they can't be found in print," he said, "check with the warden in your area; he'll be more than happy to help you."

New Motor Vehicle Inspection Stickers Are Now Available

The Texas Department of Public Safety announced this week the new 1960 motor vehicle inspection stickers are now available to Texas motorists.
Col. Homer Garrison Jr., director recommended that Texans have their vehicles inspected early in the new inspection period which extends from September 1 to April 15, 1960. Vehicles not displaying the new sticker after

April 15 will be operating in violation of the law.
"In the vast majority of cases," Garrison said, "this program has become a very minor inconvenience and expense to the motor vehicle owner — provided he moves early to comply with the law."
"The more than 4,500 authorized inspection stations over the state are capable of handling the inspection of Texas vehicles without delay if owners will not wait until just a few days before the deadline."
"With hard summer driving coming to an end, fall is an excellent time to have vehicles safety checked in preparation for the winter months."

SOIL BANK GETS \$12 BASIC RATE

Texas farmers will receive a basic rate of \$12 an acre under announced plans for the Conservation Reserve of the Soil Bank for the 1960 crop season by the U. S. Department of Agriculture. A tentative goal of 452,000 additional acres was also announced for the State.

Principal changes listed for the 1960 Conservation Reserve in the USDA announcement include regulations relating to publicly owned land, tenure of ownership, method of setting payment rates and the determination of priorities when more applications are received than can be accepted.

Land owned by a state, county, town or local government will be ineligible for the program. This rule is already in effect on federally owned land. Land which has changed ownership (except through inheritance) since December 31, 1956 is ineligible to enter the program in 1960.

If land under a 1960 Conservation Reserve contract is sold, the contract generally may be assumed by the purchaser only after it has been in effect for three years.

The priority system of accepting applications has been modified to assure first consideration to farmers who were unable to participate in the 1959 program because of lack of funds.

Detailed information as to the application of these and other changes to individual farm situations will not be available in county ASC offices until mid-August, stated the USDA announcement.

Increased operational costs in the bakery and flour mill are responsible for the higher price of bread, according to the United States Department of Agriculture.

A USDA bulletin, "Marketing Margins for White Bread," points out that bread prices have increased 30 per cent in the past 10 years. The study disclosed that the cost of bread ingredients has remained fairly constant during the past decade. The cost of wheat to the miller in 1948 averaged 2.8 cents per pound loaf of bread, and the same in 1958. The cost of flour to the baker rose from 3.5 cents in 1948 to 3.6 cents last year.

The survey shows that the farmer's share of the consumer bread dollar for all agricultural products used in bread has declined from 24 per cent in 1948 to 18 per cent last year.

"The increase in bread prices resulted from the higher costs of labor, transportation and other non-ingredient expenses," the

bulletin stated. "Hourly earnings in bread-baking and similar establishments are 33 per cent more than they were 10 years ago. Fringe benefits have increased ninefold."

The baker received 16.2 cents for a pound loaf of bread last year, as an average. The retail margin, according to USDA, was 3.1 cents. The baker retained nine-tenths of a cent as a profit before taxes, less than one-half cent per loaf after taxes.

A separate study made by the Department's Agricultural Marketing Service showed that the profits of six leading baking companies have declined 42 per cent on the basis of sales during the 10 year period. Profits decreased from 4 per cent of sales in 1948 to 2.35 last year.

The report stated that "Even if wheat, white bread would still have cost consumers about 17 cents per loaf (retail) in 1958."

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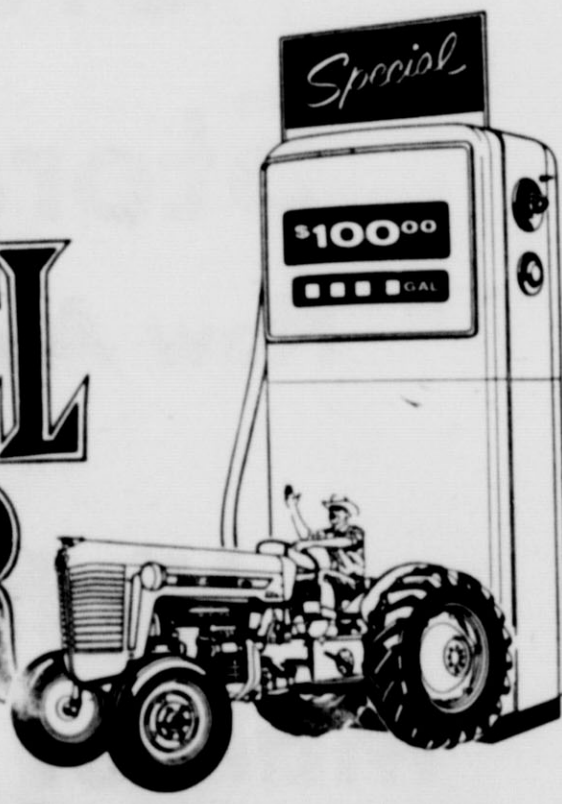

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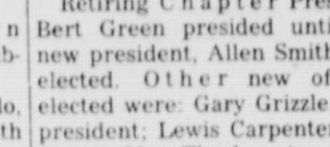
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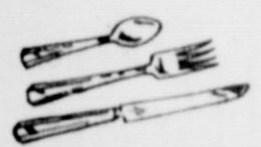
