

Vast Ranch Acreage to be Offered for Sale

Local Men to Begin Sales at Office Here

DREAM of half a century is coming true. It is now possible to buy a small ranch out of what was formerly the Matador Land and Cattle Company ranch empire. The Hornica and Bear Creek Corporations have been purchased for resale purposes. The tracts are located northeast of Matador and

comprises 87,000 acres. A group of Wichita Falls business men and two local ranchers, John V. Stevens and D. I. W. Birnie have purchased the two corporations. Space has been rented in the First State Bank building and Birnie will be office manager.

The organization will be known as The Hornica-Bear Creek Land Co., and the phone number is 54.

A large amount of the Hornica and Bear Creek pastures is fertile agriculture land. All the property is top quality ranching land. All the cattle have been sold from the ranch formerly operated as the Red Lake Cattle Corporation, which was in fact, the old Matador Ranch operating under another name.

Stevens and Birnie know more about the land they have purchased for resale than anyone in Motley County. Stevens as manager of the Matadors until it sold and then the Red Lake for ten years, knows every foot of the land and what it will produce in dry years and wet years.

Birnie, a native of Scotland, who came to the country as bookkeeper for the Matadors at the end of World War I, and later as manager of the big ranch at intervals, is familiar with the land and its economic potentials.

Both men as local ranchers know the ranching possibilities of the "foothill country" and will be able to tell buyers what they may expect in operating small "beef factories" in what has been ascribed as some of the finest ranching country in the United States.

Stock Ready For Exhibit

APPROXIMATELY 70 head of livestock to be exhibited here Saturday in the Annual Motley County Junior Livestock Show, is being put in prime condition. County Agent Bill Palmeyer said the FFA boys and 4-H Club boys and girls who will enter projects are eager to get their livestock to the school agriculture building where the show will be held.

Six sheep, 40 head of swine and 25 fat steers will compete for the cash prizes. Funds were raised under the sponsorship of the Roaring Springs and Matador Lions Clubs.

The show will be judged by Odus Holley, vocational agriculture instructor at Patton Springs. Three Bills will have supervision of the exhibit. They are Bill Moss of Matador and Bill Peacock of Roaring Springs, both vocational agriculture teachers, and County Agent Bill Palmeyer.

Classes to be shown are light steers, light barrows, heavy barrows, light gilts, heavy gilts, sows and fat lambs. All animals must be in their places in the show barn by 11 a. m. Saturday. All steers must be weighed in advance, and hogs and lambs to be sold, must be weighed in advance. Show supervisors will request weight tickets.

Prizes in addition to cash are aluminum show sticks provided by the Memphis Production Credit Association, and ribbons furnished by the Farmers Union. Part of the cost of transportation to market will be paid by the Motley County Farm Bureau.

Cemetery Site of Tragedy as Brothers' Automobiles Crash

DEATH came instantly to Locadio Zarate, 20, when he was crushed beneath his automobile in front of the Whitellat cemetery about 7:15 p. m. Easter Sunday. Tuesday his body was buried in the same cemetery.

An automobile driven by his brother, Conrade Zarate, Jr. 22, hooked a fender of the death car and flipped it over, coming to rest on top of the youth's body.

Sheriff Jinks Wilson said apparently the brothers were racing on the county road which passes in front of the cemetery. Conrade Zarate, Sr., father of the brothers, said he was in a third car ahead of his sons, and heard the collision. He tried frantically to remove the overturned car from his son's body.

The car driven by Conrade was not damaged seriously and the youth was not hurt. One witness, who called for aid, said he saw Conrade running, screaming across a field near the scene of the accident.

The body was brought to Stanley Hospital by a Eudy-Seale ambulance and later taken to the funeral home.

Locadio Zarate was employed by Wade Berryman of Matador, who is engaged in water well contracting. The youth had been married only a short time.

The accident was investigated by Sheriff Wilson and State Highway Patrolmen W. A. Richardson and Francis Johnson of Paducah.

FORMER RESIDENT ACCIDENT VICTIM

James Baker, 34, was believed killed instantly about 1:30 Wednesday morning (March 25) when his 1952 Mercury skidded on U. S. Highway 54 and overturned seven miles south of Orogrande, N. M. and north of El Paso.

Baker, who formerly lived in this area and attended Patton Springs and Roaring Springs schools, was alone at the time of the accident. New Mexico Highway Patrol attributed the accident to excessive speed and fatigue. The car went out of control 814 feet before turning over.

The body and wreckage was not discovered until about 4:30 a. m. and he was not identified until relatives arrived at 10 a. m. The body was shipped by rail to Childress, where it was met by a Eudy-Seale funeral car.

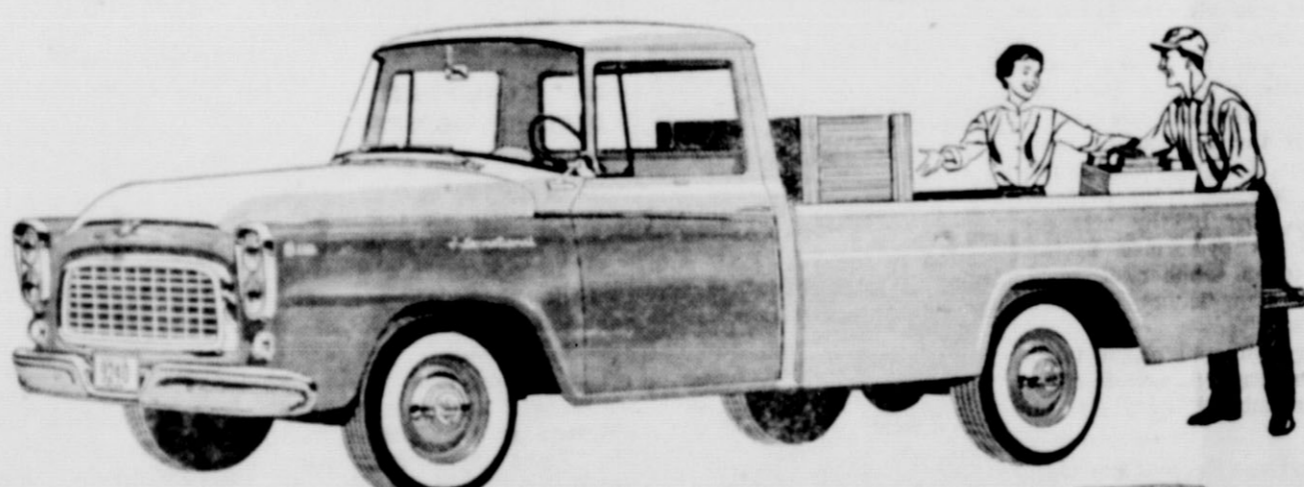
