## Rainfall Improves Panhandle Outlook

### County Reports Varied Amounts After Two Rain Storms Sweep Western Texas

**RAIN** in varying amounts relieved the tense drought situation in this area early this week when two rain storms swept the Panhandle. First rain began falling here about 3 a. m. Tuesday morning and .38-inch was registered on the US rain gauge maintained by Water Superintendent Lee Burns. At the same time a section of the Whiteflat community reported over one inch. Roaring Springs also received more than Matador, and Spur registered one inch.

The second storm struck about midnight Tuesday with some high winds and electrical display that caused a 15 minute break in electrical service. Several rain gauges in Matador registered a total of .70-inch yesterday morning, including both rains.

East of Matador in the Teepee Creek area one report said the total for the two rains was almost 2 1/2 inches. Northeast of Matador more than 1 1/2 inches were recorded. Good rains were reported in the Patton Springs area, but the fall was not general.

In the meantime heavy rains fell over much of east and southern Texas, Dallas and Ft. Worth both report heavy rains which have relieved the acute water shortage situation. Floods have prevailed in some south central Texas areas.

Farmers here say the rains this week have relieved the long drought period (seven months with a total less than one inch) and with the deep "bottom season" deposited by heavy October rains, the outlook is better than a year ago. Weather forecasters said yesterday the present moisture front has passed with fair skies expected for the next two or three days.

### A. M. Bourland, Area Pioneer Honored On 92nd Birthday In Local Hospital

A. M. Bourland, a Motley County pioneer last week celebrated his 92nd birthday in Stanley Hospital.

His family, many hospital patients who were able to leave their beds, and the hospital staff of doctors, nurses and cooks gathered in his room for the occasion. The latter presented him a birthday cake.

Born in Cardville, Miss., he married Mary Dora Armstrong in 1886 and came to Texas on a honeymoon. They lived in Kaufman and Coleman counties for about five years.

In 1891 they moved to Floyd County, where Mr. Bourland became first county commissioner and helped settle the area. He carried the mail from Floydada to Matador in a two-wheel cart. They moved to Motley County in 1897 and settled near Roaring Springs. In 1913 they moved to a homestead east of Matador and lived here until 1943 when Mr. Bourland retired. They resided in Lubbock from that time until Mrs. Bourland's death in 1948.

Since then, he has made his home alternately with his children.

Family members attending his birthday celebration included two daughters and their families.

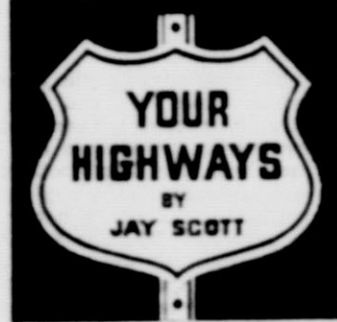

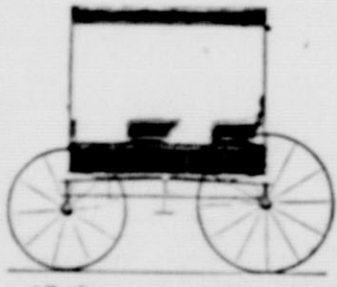

**Insecticides For The Garden Shelf**  
Spring brings a variety of hungry insects out of hiding. It's time to stock the garden shelf with ammunition to protect flowers, shrubs, grass, trees and vegetables from damage.

**FREE TRIALS OFFERED HYBRID GRAIN SORGHUM**  
The Texas Extension Service and the Texas Experiment Stations are offering free trials of hybrid grain sorghum to farmers of Motley County, and basis of selection will be first come, first served.

350 pounds of new hybrids are available at the County Agents office, and these will be broken down into 10 pound lots.

Object of the test is for the farmers to try the new hybrids and see how they do in relation to standard varieties. Sorghum is to be planted at the normal rate, and as all varieties may not be suitable to this area, comments of the growers will be used to determine the varieties that are suitable for Motley County.

Also available is material for harvester ant control. The only report that will be required on the ant poison is the number of hills treated and the results. This will also be passed out on the first come, first served basis.

**Summer Temporary Pasture Planning**  
Summer temporary pastures should form a very important part of the year-round grazing or pasture program on the farms and ranches of the state. Good temporary pastures just don't happen. They must be planned well in advance and the same care given to seedbed preparation, seeding the right plants and fertilization as is used in connection with other cash crops.

Such pastures will permit a resting period for permanent pastures, provide grazing when permanent pastures are on the decline, and provide a means for building up feed reserves.

Sudan grass is the best bet in most areas. It can be planted anytime after the danger of frost is past and until the supply of moisture becomes short in the summer. From one to two acres should be planted for each animal unit. Row plantings are best for grazing, and generally do the best in the dry sections of the country.

Row plantings should be made at the rate of 7 to 10 lbs of seed an acre. Staggered plantings made at intervals of two to four weeks may extend the grazing season until late fall. The different plantings should be fenced separately in order to get maximum production.

Two varieties of this old favorite are generally available in the state. Common is widely grown but may be damaged by leaf diseases, while Sweet Sudan carries some leaf disease resistance and may outyield common in instances where a lot of moisture is received.

Rotation grazing is recommended for getting the most from summer pastures, but this should be planned now. Production can be increased and quality of the forage kept high by rotation grazing. Old stems should be moved after grazing to keep new growth coming. Growth not utilized by grazing should be used for hay or silage.

A soil test made well ahead of planting will show what plant foods should be applied at seeding time. If moisture is available, fertilizer will pay, and on sandy land fertilizer always pays.

## Elementary Elim

The Diary of Mary White

January 17, 1956, Tuesday

Finally got word from Nome that the ANS mechanic had quit and that we would have to overhaul our own light plant here in the village. So we brought it down from the airstrip and put it back in the basement and R. W. and David Saccheus went to work on it. Parts all over the place but never the right ones, was their story. That was partly my story as I tried to shift into second semester. Not enough workbooks to go around. We just put them back on the shelf and will make our own. That's more fun anyway—sometimes?

January 18, 1956, Wednesday

David worked on the motor. I worked on lessons and R. W. and that bird at Shatoolik played with the radio all day. Never heard such horse play. Undoubtedly he is from Texas too. The new principal at Unalakleet is from Kress, Texas, and somewhere up the way is another loudmouther green-horn. Their only saving grace is that they laugh at themselves.

Well, it did it! The one plant

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we had running broke the oil seal and is slinging oil right and left. We studied as long as we could see, then we talked in the dark. I asked each student to name all the different towns he had been in. The majority had never been outside of Elim. Then we talked of places we would like to go. Someone mentioned South America by chance, and I told them of the Pan American trip I hoped to take sometime. There came a lull in the talk. My fourth grade Ethel said, "I wonder who will be our teacher next week?" The rest had a big laugh out of that and, of course, I had to tease her about not paying attention.

The jacks craze is on here. There were a few sets received in Christmas packages and these girls really like to play. No electricity tonight and these Alladin lamps do seem dim. Good excuse for going to bed earlier....

January 19, 1956, Thursday

Bribed R. W. to run the motor an hour or so this morning so we could see how to begin. He placed rags on each side to keep the oil from slinging on the walls. The fan on the generator grabbed a rag about 10:30 and boom! No lights and no radio now. Until the other motor is finished. Felt our way out of the school room about 3:15. Worked on letters tonight but doubt that plane will come tomorrow. Wind is still howling.

I cooked moose steaks for supper. Nathan Nagaruk shot one about thirty miles from here.

Everyone in the village shared it. The piece they brought us was simply delicious.

January 20, 1956, Friday

A bright clear day but this schoolroom with only west windows wasn't very bright. We felt rather than saw until about 10:00. What a day! The mail plane did come and R. W. rushed my letters down unsealed and unsigned. The postmaster licked them before putting them on the plane, but Juneau is likely to think I'm not very efficient when I don't even know enough to sign a purchase order.

Now get set kids! I went down at noon and gave "Santa Claus" a shot. First one he had ever had in his life and his wife and I really kidded him. I told him I was going to write the children down south and tell them I had to give Santa some penicillin. This "flu" bug is playing no favorites.

The motor is fixed and runs beautifully but "nary a drop" of electricity comes through the lines and the tester shows that the generator is generating. Oh for Monger! (electrician in Kettle) I'd put that little gentleman in the basement and not allow him upstairs until some electricity came up with him.

January 21, 1956, Saturday

Arose late, loitered over breakfast, then coffeed a little longer. Now I know that the word coffee is supposed to be a noun but the way we do it on Saturdays I think it should become a verb.

Nothing accomplished by me except that I took a big dose of a drug called "so what?" and floated around in a state of semi-intoxication called relaxation. It is a wonderful state but I achieve it very seldom.

R. W. and some others finally got electricity through the lines once more, so tonight we have lights. The new governor on the motor isn't working smoothly so we go from bright to dim and then to bright again, but we are glad to have them. Theretha and Roger are playing records and giggling over the fluctuations.

January 22, 1956, Sunday

Bush plane today. Wondered why until the grapevine revealed he had stopped for a passenger. A girl from Nome, engaged to one of Elim's young men had been visiting here for several weeks. She was returning to Nome. Through my field glasses I watched them say good-by as she prepared to climb aboard. You can forget that old story you heard about Eskimos rubbing noses!

January 23, 1956, Monday

A tiring day in the school room! Two freight planes to add to the confusion. More kegs of butter from surplus commodities and we are out of practically every item in the lunch room except butter. So, we won't have lunch time. I will just say, "Children it's time for your butter." Movie tonight and my operator was sick so I had to run the machine. In vain I searched the crowd for the mayor's wife. She had not come. I cringed inwardly as I realized afresh how hard the blow had been for her.

January 24, 1956, Tuesday

A day to end all days—except that they, like wars, won't end, of course. A freight plane early

down. No scare easy, for he came right on in to a perfect landing. His passenger was Sgt. Knight whom we had met in Nome. He is connected with National Guard work. I ran back and made his picture then on to the wreck and back up the trail. With the sun to my back the scenery was beautiful. Every swirl in the snow was a different shade of blue and each pocket or swirl had a different tone when stepped upon. So I played ice music in the frosty air as I walked. The bright sun was deceiving for the temperature was thirty below. I had frosty white eyebrows and eyelashes when I returned.

Around two o'clock we finally got settled down to work. Had rooster steaks, coffee and gab from five o'clock on. Sgt. Knight is from Superior, Montana; Ft. Riley, Kansas; and Bellingham, Washington and we had been many of the same places so we had fun.

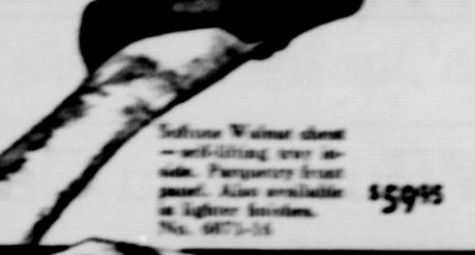
