Burning Pickup Call Answered

A call about 2:30 Monday afternoon to the Matador Volunteer Fire Department was promptly answered. A pickup truck loaded with hay was burning approximately one mile west of Teepee Creek on US Highway 70.

Delmore Kooztz of Chillicothe was driving west on the highway loaded with baled wheat hay and oats in his Dodge pickup, and pulling a covered horse trailer, bearing a race horse. Kooztz looked back and saw that his trailer was afire. Kooztz was alone and said he does not smoke.

Topping the hill, headed east was Peck Thompson, who also saw the fire. He helped Kooztz get the horse trailer loose from the burning pickup, and they managed to get part of the burning hay off the pickup.

In the meantime the Matador Volunteer Fire Department truck arrived, as well as a Seigler ambulance, and Sheriff J. D. Spray.

There was little to do but let the bales of hay burn themselves out and drag them off the pavement. The firemen with water hoses, stood by to squelch any showing of flame in the pickup.

Kooztz, who was on his way to Lubbock horse track races, did not estimate the loss. Windshield and cab, including personal belongings, were destroyed by the fire. No estimate of the total damage was made, since engine, tires and etc. of the pickup were not apparently harmed. Firemen kept the baled hay under control until it was consumed by the fire.

Light Moisture Recorded Here

Showers starting early Sunday and ending about dark with a sudden squall out of the west, bearing strong winds, hail and rain, registered 57-inch here.

Another shower Tuesday afternoon left a recorded 02-in. on Bob Stanley's rain gauge. Last moisture was March 6, which produced 95-in. in snow January had no recorded moisture and February showed a total of only 22-in.

December had only 63-in., Nov. 94-in. and Oct. 52-in. September produced 5.29 inches, and Aug. 5.52 inches.

Total rainfall in 1966 was 20.72 inches, slightly over the 13-year average of 20.33 inches.

 Pastor and Mrs. Morris G. Pruitt, of Chicota (Tex.) Baptist Church, were appointed missionaries to Togo in Western Africa, on March 6 by the Southern Baptist Foreign Mission Board. They expect to do general evangelistic work in the small West African nation.

Mr. Pruitt has been pastor of Chicota Church since August, 1963, having previously served Slide Baptist Church, Lubbock, for more than two years. Mrs. Pruitt taught piano in Chicota for two and a half years.

Born in Lovington, N.M., Mr. Pruitt spent most of his childhood in Texas, where his family settled in Dickens County when he was 13 years old. Mrs. Pruitt, the former Carol Anne Hester, daughter of a Baptist minister, was born in Abilene, Tex., and lived in Adamsville, Lubbock and Odessa, Tex., while growing up.

At Foreign Mission Board headquarters in Richmond, Va., for appointment and a week of orientation, Mr. and Mrs. Pruitt gave brief testimonies of their Christian faith and experience.

He said he began to feel led toward foreign missions about three years ago, while a student in Southern Baptist Theological Seminary, Fort Worth. He had already decided he would preach anywhere the Lord wanted him.

Mrs. Pruitt said her urge to become a missionary began when she was about 12 and grew stronger with each contact she had with missionaries. "I feel there is no other life and no other choice for me and my family except to go and tell
