Alexander Fuel, last full-service gas station in the county

The only full service station in Motley County has been in operation for 80 years. Alexander Fuel in downtown Roaring Springs was first established in 1921 by Dan Davis. He was joined by his brother, Lewis Clyde Davis in 1924. Lewis Davis' son, Jack joined his father in the business in 1945. Jack's son, Ronnie joined the business in 1970. Russell Alexander purchased the business in April of 1988. Alexander Fuel will soon celebrate its 15 year anniversary. The Roaring Springs service station is one of the oldest gas stations in the state of Texas still in operation. The business has been in continuous operation, with the exception of one

year, since its beginning in 1921. Russell grew up in Clarendon and graduated from high school there. He worked at a tire center in Clarendon before moving to Roaring Springs. "I was approached by some friends at the pipe plant about buying the business. After some thought, I decided it was a good idea and I have not re-

gretted my decision," Russell said. With everything going to a faster, more convenient way of business, in the county. Alexander Fuel is one of the very few operations that will still pump your gas, check your oil, and wash your windshield. "I've tried to keep the same friendly service the Davis family gave their customers for so many years," Mr. Alexander said. In addition to full-service, the station has available a 24-hour service truck for truck and tractor customers, offering 24 hour road service day or night. The customers in seven counties, Mr. Alexander has a personal friendship with most of his customers.

"We have a lot of visitors come in fore soda and a visit. Russell's uncle has recently moved to this area from Clarendon and is now operating the mechanic shop across the street from the station. John Alexander has had over 30 years of experience in automotive repair.

Russell has one daughter, Hanna, 8, who lives in Lubbock . He was recently elected as Commissioner, Precinct 4 and will begin that position in January. He says he is proud to be a part of Roaring Springs and Motley County and plans to stay here. He welcomes visitors and extends an invitation to everyone to stop by.



17. The sacrifices of God are a broken spirit, A broken and contrite heart.



"The FSA County Committee is the farmer's voice in making national programs fit local situations -- democracy at its best, local in nature, and representing the customers that USDA programs are designed to serve," she added.

Shaw stressed that the FSA County Committee system will only work if all of FSA's customers are actively involved in how the agency's programs are administered. FSA's County Committee system needs diverse representation -- small and large farm/ranch operators, truck farmers and producers of specialty crops, livestock producers and local businessmen and women.

"Diversity is a must in today's changing world of agriculture -- from people on the business side of the operation to those who plant for specific markets. The County Committee should mirror the demographics of the communities they sarve. We need the communities they serve. We need and welcome voter participation from men, women, minorities and voters
