## Foothill TV Tower Facing Close-Down

A LARGE AREA of Motley County may soon be without television service. The Matador Trans-lator tower located in the Foothills west of town may be forced to suspend operation.

The problem is not a new one. The cost of operation is more than the revenue received. It simply does not leave enough to justify Bob Tipps of Canadian to service the equipment.

As of April 15, a total of 54 of the 70 paying subscribers had remitted \$4 each. The actual monthly expense is \$157.50. If and when all pay, the total revenue is only \$280.

Mr. Tipps services the tower by plane from Canadian and the usual trips eat up the small profit with-

out allowing him anything for his time. With parts, the maintaining services and bookkeeping, Mr. Tipps continues to operate at a loss.

It is possible to sell the equipment and remove the tower, and if that becomes necessary, all subscribers who have paid in advance, will be refunded their money.

If the tower is removed, it will mean that a large area of farm and ranch homes, as well as urban subscribers will be without service.

It is believed that a large number of "users" are not paying for the service, since the tower operates on an "honor" system.

Here is the monthly "fixed" cost of operating the tower: Lights \$50, insurance \$25, lease \$10.50, advertising, licenses and taxes \$30, extra help (average in 1968) \$36.50, postage \$3.25 and telephone \$2.25. (Total \$157.50).

Mr. Tipps has said that if he could collect enough revenue, that additional equipment could be installed to bring in other channels and improve the general service.

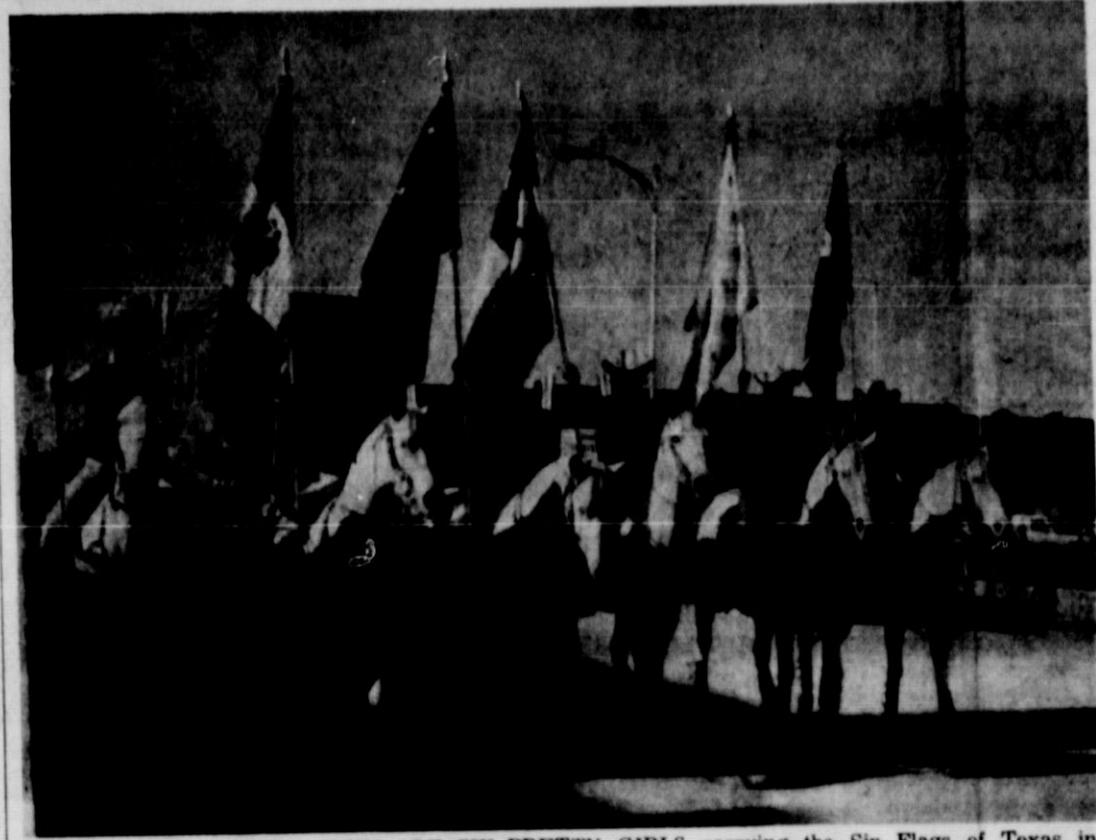

## TRAIL DUST

Pride without adequate control can result in damage to the delicate tissues of friendship and social acceptance. Its balance is somewhere between the pleasure of prestige and the evaluation of humility.

Too much of the world's lack of concern is present in the small, shaggy dog hopefully watching cars on the highway. Ears that are tuned for one friendly sound; eyes waiting for a single ray of hope. But the twilight thickens with darkness to conceal the hurt and the pattern will not change. Other pains are trivial to the ragged knife of being unwanted.

Youth is not a continuity of ecstasy but a drama churning with the mixture of a thousand emotions that still retain their sharp edges. Heartache is more painful and pleasure has more reality, while a small disappointment may become a disaster. Time alone can smooth the vicious passage of days before most events can be accepted with some degree of comfort and moderation.

About the time I iron out some of the wrinkles in my personal problems, and sprinkle down a few worries, there is that revolting discovery of having given attention to something unimportant.

Some of the tempestuous condition in colleges must be attributed to too much time not associated with work and study. Education is broader than books and class rooms; its essence is the preparation for achievement and a sincerity of purpose.

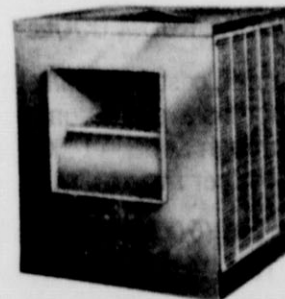

### Texas Highway Death Count Shows Increase

Texas Highway Patrol investigated three accidents on rural highways in Motley County during the month of March, according to Sergeant Vernon Cawthon, Highway Patrol Supervisor of this area.

These crashes resulted in an estimated property damage of \$9,665.00.

The rural traffic accident summary for this county during the first three months of 1969 shows a total of seven accidents resulting in no persons killed, one person injured, and an estimated proper-

ty damage of \$11,420.00. The final entry in the 1968 Texas traffic records has been entered and closed. An all-time record of 3,481 persons killed, 216,972 persons injured, and an estimated property loss of \$836,802,000.00 was sustained.

Since the death count of 2,254 in 1960, Texas has gained steadily each year. The Sergeant stated, "If the number of deaths continue to increase as they have since 1960 by 1975 they will have increased 100 per cent."

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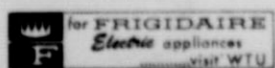

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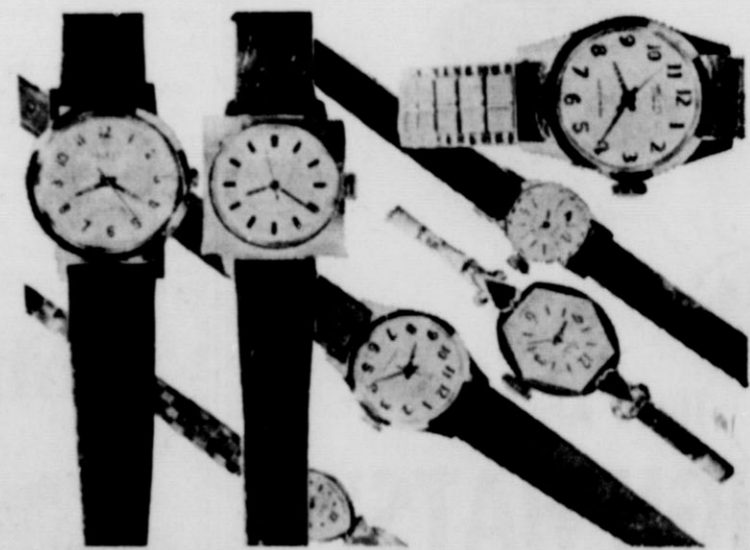


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## New Exerciser Proves Effective For Both Young And Elderly

The deadline on grass seeding (except bermudagrass) this year is June 1. This leaves approximately 40 days to complete seeding operations.

are planned for spraying this year, according to Willard. The beginning spray date will be set soon for both the Great Plains Conservation Program and the ACP Program. Plans should be made as soon as possible to avoid trouble securing a contractor.

Loss of both manager and clerk in the Wellington office forced an early closing of that service point and a temporary transfer of those accounts to the Memphis office, it was announced.

The Anson and Haskell offices were consolidated into the Stamford office in November, 1968. When the consolidation program is finally completed the association will have service points in Stamford (central office) Spur, Munday, Matador and Childress.

James C. New of Sagerton has been employed to replace Royce L. Williams in the Stamford office, Mr. Williams having gone to the Austin PCA. No replacements were made for Tommie Stuart and Janella Nall in the Wellington office. They went to the Austin PCA and a Wellington bank, respectively. It is anticipated that the employees from Memphis and Paducah will staff the new service point to be located in Childress. They are Robert Proctor, Edna Richardson, Billie J. Holley and Mary Davis.

## COUNTY AGENT PALLMEYER SAYS:

In our day to day activities other county agents and I receive many requests for help, and in most cases we can comply. At times though, help is required, as this request from a livestock researcher

at the University of Wisconsin.

E. R. Hauser is looking for 30 sets of identical twin heifer calves—15 sets of Herefords and 15 of Holsteins. These will be used to study nutritional levels, growth rates, feed efficiency, reproductive performance, milk production and other responses to environment.

Later, Holstein calves will be bred to Hereford bulls, and Hereford twins to Holstein bulls. Birth weights, weaning weights, post-weaning weights, feed efficiency and carcass traits of the offspring will also be studied.

I know that it is doubtful if we can find any of the Holstein twins, but what about the Herefords? Remember that all twins are not identical. They must have the same body characteristics, color patterns, body conformation and nose prints. Even the hair sworls will be in the same direction.

Identical twins have important advantages for livestock research, since they are genetically the same. Differences noted in productive performance can more confidently be attributed to changes in management and other environmental factors. Only heifer calves born since January 1, 1969 can be used, and calves will be examined before a purchase is made. If you have such calves, please let me know, and I will supply the name and address of the researcher.

Some interesting facts have been noted in the tests carried out in Motley County during 1968. For example, it pays to control cotton seedling disease.

In a test conducted by Herb Martin at Flomot, and planted on June 15th, net increase on the treated acreage was only \$3.32 per acre, but this late in the year the soil has warmed up, and seedling

disease is not as much a problem.

David Thompson, Matador, also ran a test for seedling disease control in cotton. In this test, seed treated with Demosan to help control seedling disease and D-Syston, a systemic insecticide were used. Planting was on May 25th, and treated acreage showed a net increase of \$5.26 per acre.

These tests are in line with previous tests. Each has shown an increase in the net returns per acre, and the earlier the planting, the greater the returns. Either liquid or granules have been placed in the furrow at time of planting. Once the boxes are placed on the tool bar and properly calibrated, the only extra time required is the dumping of material in the boxes.

For farmers that plant early, and have noted a seedling disease problem, this practice should be tried. As in many of the tests, you may not note any visual difference in the plants during the summer, but when they are harvested separately and records kept, I am sure you will be pleased with the results of the treated acreage.

Dryland cotton yields of a bale per acre and over were not unusual in 1968, but how about 699 lbs./acre and 683 lbs./acre?

Alfred Dye of Roaring Springs planted a test consisting of 4 acres of Western Stormproof and 4 acres of Improved Western Stormproof on May 6th. Yield of Western Stormproof was 553 lbs./acre, and the Improved Western Stormproof, 699 lbs./acre. Beet armyworms ruined the ends of the Improved Western Stormproof block, and to obtain data on this variety, strips were hand gathered, and converted to yield data by Dr. Levon Ray at the Lubbock Experiment Station. Fiber characteristics were also obtained. Mike was satisfactory in both varieties.

L. M. Cox of Matador planted 5 acres of Deltapine 16 to compare

with 9.2 acres of Hybee 300. Yield of the Deltapine 16 was 683 lbs./acre after a 15.1% turnout. The cotton was harvested too green, and was hard to gin, but still was one of the leaders in the county as related to net income per acre. The Hybee yielded 431 lbs./acre.

Complete information on all of the tests is included in the demonstration handbook which should be ready for distribution this week.

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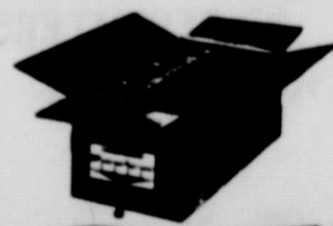
