ROARING SPRINGS CITY WATER NOW BEING SOLD TO PADUCAH CITIZENS

PADUCAH MAN STARTS HAUL WITH FIRST LOAD TUESDAY

Joe R. Meador of Paducah made arrangements with W. S. Weatherall Tuesday to purchase water from the City of Roaring Springs to be hauled to Paducah and sold to a retail trade for drinking and household purposes.

Mr. Meador stated that a wide demand had already been established for the water with the mere mention of its source. He declared that advertised water had been shipped into Paducah for the past two years and had met with fair demand, but that the price was almost prohibitive. He plans to sell Roaring Springs water at the lowest rates possible, in hauling tanks of 500 gallon capacity.

The first tank was loaded Tuesday, hauled to Paducah and given away for advertising purposes. Mr. Meador hopes to be able to use at least one tank load per day throughout the summer.

Texas Wool Industry

By W. E. TALBOT

There is a story—this is the story of a wool mill that has been struggling for years with the possibility of the wool industry in Texas. Good wool, the staple of the American wool industry, is an acknowledged staple of the industry of individual nations for years.

STORY No. II.
 The wool mill, Southern Woolen Co.

The next question that arises is: Under the present conditions of the wool market and the cloth market, would it be advisable to start this mill at this time?

To many people, in thinking of a wool mill, the first thing that comes to mind is a factory with thousands of employees, and when they see this picture they seem impressed with the impossibility of getting such a plant. If they could only see that some plants they have in mind must have, at one time, started in a small way and gradually built up to the present proportions, it would appeal to them that a start is necessary to bring them about.

The present condition of the cloth market is in a bad way. From 1923 until 1929 there were 168 wool manufacturing plants which passed out of existence. A change of conditions was partly responsible for this. In the old days a man wore a blue serge suit in summer and heavy weight in winter, with the result

that these big mills were turning out a volume of one kind of cloth that enabled them through quantity production to succeed. Then suddenly men's styles began to change. Stripes and checks and colors all became the fashion, and these enormous mills with their enormous production were up against a very serious problem in the making of short runs of cloth of the different designs desired. It really meant that the small mill was more easily adapted to the different kinds of cloth and had a distinct advantage, and a great many of them have profited through this change of conditions.

There has naturally been a curtailment of production, and merchants' stocks today are at the lowest of any time for many years. If there ever was a time for us to start, when people have two things in mind, price and the necessity of a new garment, it would be now. It has been estimated that the consumption of wool has decreased, and yet it would only require today an annual additional consumption of 2 1/2 ounces of wool per capita to put the industry back on its feet.

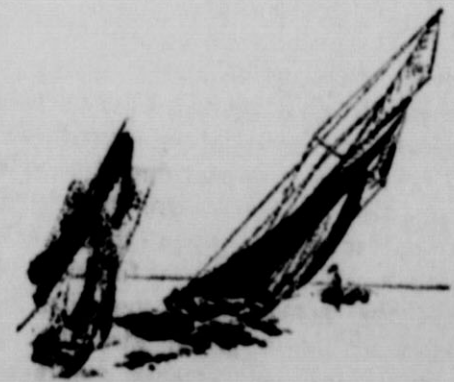
