Chronology Of 1944 Laced With Tragedy

readily available farm facts serve TRAGEDY OF WAR is reflected in the chronology of 1944, as published countless uses, and their value to in the Tribune. Outside of the war fatalities, county's leading news event was the 40-year-old-courthouse fire on September 27. Grim news reports started early in the year with the death of Lt. Paul Eubank, who lost his life in action on January 11. It is doubtful if any past 12 months in Motley County's entire history have contained a comparable number of outstanding news events as did the year 1944. The Tribune has compiled the following chronology from the front pages of its files, devoting a brief paragraph to each issue:

Courtney calling at the courthouse door opened the meeting and inaugural ceremony. Special prayer services were conducted by Rev. H. G. Verner, pastor of the First Baptist Church of Matador.

The following county and preinct officials qualified for office; Wm. R. Cammack, county judge and ex-officio county superintend ent; Doug Meador, commissioner of Precinct number one; Lem Standefer, commissioner of Precinct number two; A. B. Simpson, commissioner of Precinct number three; J. N. Fletcher, commissioner, Precinct number four; C. W. Norrid, county attorney; H. H. Courtney, sheriff, tax assessor and five; H. F. Pipkin, justice of the peace of Precinct number one; J. D. Mitchell, justice of the peace of Precinct number four.

Mrs. Meddie V. Cox was present but was not sworn in as county treasurer because her bond had not been received from a bonding company and could not be approved by the commissioners court. Mrs. Cox will qualify for office immediately upon arrival of her bond.

Five Were Unopposed

Five of the above county of ficials sworn into office Monday, were unopposed in 1944 elections. County Judge Cammack, Sheriff H. H. Courtney and County, District Clerk Seay and Commissoner A. B.
