



COTTON estimated to yield between \$750,000 and \$1,000,000 in Motley county may suffer severe weather damage if cotton-pickers are not secured in sufficient numbers in the immediate future according to farm leaders. Producing rapidly after the delayed rains, cotton and other row crops in the West Texas county now indicate that the yield may exceed that of last year, which was in the neighborhood of 10,000 bales. Leading farmers in the Roaring Springs, Whiteflat and Flomot areas believe the feed crop prospects are better than in many years. An area extending about Matador suffered from the prolonged drouth until it has failed to recover after the rains.
