

Cultivation Essential To Trees

THE MATADOR TRIBUNE

stated State Director Webb of the Prairie Sates Forestry Project. "Shelterbelts must be cultivated from six to eight times yearly in order to obtain the best growth and survival.

"Trees are like cotton, maize or any other row crops. They must be freed of weed competition to thrive and the more they are cultivated the faster they will grow. Webb indicated that one of the big reasons some shelterbelts outstripped others is that the better shelterbelts were given beter cultivation.

"The best time to cultivate is before the weeds get much of a start," declared Mr. Webb. "Never, let them get over six inches high for then the job to get rid of them is harder. A number of early cultivations will also reduce the amount of work later on in the season," continued Webb.

Usually clean cultivation around the first of April, followed up every ten days or two weeks until around July 15, will give the trees a good start in life. Webb mentioned the Elbert Reeves, G. V. Hensarling, and Frank Montgomery sheterbelts as some of the examples in Motley county of what can be done with good cul-

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

Stress Good **Nutrition As Defense Need**

Today nutrition authorities are stressing the need for guarding the national health in carrying on an effective program of defense. In calling attention to the importance of proper food, it is pointed out that a survey has revealed that approximately 45 million of our population are living below the "safety line" of what is considered an adequate

What factors are essential in ou what factors are essential in our foods to assure that the diet fully meets body needs? Protein is necessary to build and repair body tissue. There must be vitamins to promote growth and protect health, and calories to supply heat and energy. Minerals, such as iron, copper, phosphorus, and calcium. eded to build blood, bones and teeth.

Importance of Iron

In considering the minerals needed, medical authorities point to the special importance of iron as a blood builder. It ranks first among the nutritive elements in

this respect.


The iron in the body of an average adult is only about the weight of a penny, but this element is vital to health. Iron enters into the structure of every active body cell. Iron is a constituent of the hemoglobin or red pigment of the 25 trillion or more red blood corpuscles, and thus helps to carry oxygen to every

part of the body.

Foods rich in iron must be added to the diet at six months or earlier and continued throughout life, ac-

Iron Prevents Anemia
