Two Oil Tests Being Drilled

Two oil tests are being drilled
in Motley County. A wildcat ex-
ploration was spudded in March 27
in the southeast sector of the coun-
ty. It is the No. 1 Heath M. Robin-
son, 11 miles east of Roaring
Springs, being drilled by Locke-
Purnell of Dallas and Fortune Drill-
ing Co. of San Angelo.

Drill site is 2,431 feet from north
and 263 feet from east lines of
Section 91, Block M Matador Land
& Cattle Co. survey. The well is
progressing rapidly.

Second well in the county is on
the Duke Lipscomb property near
Northfield. Surface pipe on the well
was set a week ago. Graham Drill-
ing first had a water well on the
location, then moved in a large,
modern rig and started drilling.
