A&M's veterinarians wage war on MS

COLLEGE STATION - The fight against multiple sclerosis (MS) is being waged at a not-so-likely location: the



Some children go home with a blue ribbon or even a college scholarship. And every child leaves with more esteem, a greater understanding of the spirit of competition, and a better sense of who they are - and perhaps who they want to

Thousands of students across the state participate in stock shows and fairs every year. They spend months raising chickens or feeding and grooming steers after school and on the weekends. As a number of major stock shows get underway across the state, students from all walks of life will learn responsibility, gain respect for animals and others, and garner skills and knowledge for the future.

Shows like the San Antonio Livestock Show, Fort Worth Stock Show, Houston Livestock Show and Rodeo and the Star of Texas Fair and Rodeo offer families plenty of entertainment while contributing heavily to scholarship funds for youth. Since 1957 the Houston Livestock Show and Rodeo alone has contributed \$85 million for scholarships and educational

programs to area youth. These shows also help introduce agriculture to people who might not be exposed to it otherwise. This year the San Antonio Livestock Show will have an exhibit called "The World of Agriculture" where folks will be able to watch ag demonstrations and participate in hands-

Stock shows give students a chance to learn business skills and financial responsibility while developing an animal worthy of the auction ring. They learn how to keep records of expenditures and track their progress, much like their own small business. Texas livestock shows are grooming today's youth into the efficient and dedicated agricultural producers of College of Veterinary Medicine at Texas A&M University.

Dr. Jane Welsh, an associate professor in the Department of Veterinary Anatomy and Public Health, is demonstrating the vital role veterinary research plays in promoting public health.

"Our work highlights the diversity of research at the College of Veterinary Medicine, and we work on an animal model of a human disease, which may surprise the public," Welsh said. "Our work is aimed at understanding the origins of multiple sclerosis and advances may aid the understanding of the disease process in MS. Also, therapies that function in our model system may be beneficial to MS patients."

For the past three years, Welsh and her team have conducted tests using interferon tau, a protein produced by sheep during pregnancy, discovered by Dr. Fuller Bazer, director of the Center for Animal Biotechnology. This new protein could possibly replace interferon beta, which is given to MS patients as a shot and, although highly beneficial to MS patients, does have numerous side-effects
