### LARGE TRUCK AND CAR COLLIDE AT DUTCHMAN BRIDGE FRIDAY NIGHT

1000 GALLON KEROSENE CARRIER GOES IN DITCH AND CAR LOSES WHEEL

A large tank truck loaded with 1000 gallons of kerosene, belonging to the Logan Trucking Company of Lubbock, went into the borrow ditch near the west approach of the Dutchman river bridge about midnight Friday night, when struck by an automobile. The automobile, a large sedan, suffered the loss of a front wheel and fender in the collision. The truck, turning over after collision, was badly damaged. No injuries were reported. No definite information is available but assumptions are that the driver of the car was blinded by lights and becoming confused, struck the truck.

### Henry R. Black Is Victim Of Fatal Heart Attack Tuesday Afternoon

### PROMINENT FIGURE IN FOUNDING THIS CITY

### Interment To Be In Matador Cemetery Thursday Afternoon

From the failing ranks of Pioneer Texans, death summoned the spirit of Henry R. Black at his home in Spur Tuesday afternoon at 5 o'clock, July 4th. Mr. Black had been in celebration of the holiday at Roaring Springs. Returning home he was stricken shortly afterwards by a fatal heart attack. Coming to Motley county 33 years ago, Mr. Black was identified with the early history of the county. He served as sheriff a number of years, was interested in a Matador Mercantile business and later came to Roaring Springs where he was engaged in the development of the city. He was deputy sheriff of Dickens county at the time of his death. Henry R. Black was born in Fannin county, Texas, May 9, 1870, the son of Mr. and Mrs. John Black. He was married to Miss Nellie Lynn at Crystal Falls, June 24, 1894. He is survived by the widow and six children: Mrs. Flora Prejean, Houston; Coleman Black, Moran; Mrs. O. E. Hause, Houston; Mrs. J. A. Cunningham, Miami, Fla.; Ralph Black Crane; and Mrs. Bess Pickard, Spur. He is also survived by two brothers and two sisters: Bob Black, Moran; Arch Black, Matador; Mrs. Joe Meador, Matador and Mrs. Sam Jones, Wooten. Mr. Black made a profession of religion and became affiliated with the Methodist Church of Matador. He never moved his membership from that church, altho he took active interest in church work in other places he lived. Interment will be made in East Mound Cemetery at Matador this afternoon. Active pall bearers selected are: Rause Moore, J. E. Russell, Doug Meador, Dr. A. C. Tra-week, C. D. Bird, Charlie Morris and W. B. Arthur. YOUTH DIES RESULT OF ACCIDENT RIFLE SHOT SATURDAY AFTERNOON H. K. Martin, 18, was shot above the left temple with a small calibre rifle when the gun accidentally discharged in the hands of B. F. McAllister, 12, near the W. R. Tilson farm home north of Matador Saturday afternoon. The wounded youth was rushed to Matador for medical attention but all chances of recovery were dispelled upon examination. Death came about 8 o'clock Saturday night. Burial was made in the Whiteflat cemetery Sunday.
