NOTICE OF CONSOLIDATION ELECTION FOR MATADOR INDEPENDENT SCHOOL DISTRICT AND ROARING SPRINGS INDEPENDENT SCHOOL DISTRICT.

THE STATE OF TEXAS COUNTY OF MOTLEY ROARING SPRINGS INDEPENDENT SCHOOL DISTRICT AND MATADOR INDEPENDENT SCHOOL DISTRICT

TO THE RESIDENT QUALIFIED VOTERS OF THE ROARING SPRINGS INDEPENDENT SCHOOL DISTRICT AND OF THE MATADOR INDEPENDENT SCHOOL DISTRICT:

TAKE NOTICE that an election will be held on the 1st day of July, 1967, the same being the first Saturday in July, 1967, within the Roaring Springs Independent School District of Motley County, Texas, and contemporaneously a similar election will be held within the Matador Independent School District of Motley County, Texas, in obedience to an order duly entered by the County Judge of Motley County, Texas, on the 9th day of June, 1967, which order is a component part of this Notice and is in substance as follows:

THE STATE OF TEXAS COUNTY OF MOTLEY

WHEREAS, on this 9th day of June, 1967, there were presented to me two petitions described as follows:

(a) One presented for and on behalf of the Matador Independent

School District, dated June 8, 1967, praying that such Matador Independent School District shall be consolidated with the Roaring Springs Independent School District for school purposes under the provisions of Article 2806, Vernon's Annotated Civil Statutes of the State of Texas; and

(b) One presented for and on behalf of the Roaring Springs Independent School District, dated June 8, 1967, praying that such Roaring Springs Independent School District shall be consolidated with the Matador Independent School District for school purposes under the provisions of Article 2806, Vernon's Annotated Civil Statutes of the State of Texas; and

WHICH REAS, upon examination of such petitions, it is hereby affirmatively found by the undersigned County Judge of Motley County, Texas, that: (a) each of said petitions is properly signed by more than twenty of the resident, legally qualified voters in the District for which presented, (b) the Matador Independent School District and the Roaring Springs Independent School District are contiguous to each other and together will constitute as a whole one continuous territory, (c) both school districts are situated wholly in Motley County, Texas; and therefore that such petitions should be granted and such elections should be held as prayed for:

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDERED, ADJUDGED AND DECREED BY THE COUNTY JUDGE OF MOTLEY COUNTY, TEXAS:

I. JURISDICTION: That such petitions are legally sufficient and the jurisdiction of the County Judge to act under the provisions of said Article 2806 has been invoked by the filing of said petitions. It is specifically found that each petition is signed by the required number of legally qualified voters of the district for which said petition was submitted. That each District is an Independent School District and each District is situated wholly in Motley County, Texas.

II. DATE OF ELECTION: That an election shall be held within each District on the first Saturday in July 1967, the same being the 1st day of July 1967.

III. NOTICE OF ELECTION: It is hereby found, adjudged and decreed that notice of said election shall be given by posting NOTICE OF CONSOLIDATION ELECTION, which shall be prepared by the County Judge, in each District for a period of at least twenty days prior to the date of said election. It is specifically decreed that notice by publication is not necessary for the time and in the manner as set out in said Article 2806, but that sufficient notice may be given by posting only. However, notice by publication may be given in addition to the notice of posting, but the publication of the first notice shall not be required to be made for a full twenty days prior to the date of the election.

IV. ABSENTEE BALLOTING: That Pat Sheridan, County Clerk of Motley County, Texas, is hereby designated as Clerk for Absentee Balloting and the place where absentee ballots shall be cast shall be in the Office of the County Clerk of the City of Matador, Texas. Absentee balloting shall commence on June 12, 1967 and shall continue through June 27, 1967. The Clerk for Absentee Balloting shall deliver the ballots in accordance with the election laws of the State of Texas.

V. PLACES AND MANNER OF HOLDING SAID ELECTIONS: A. Within the Matador Independent School District said election shall be held at the following places with election officials, as follows:

(1) In the Hall of the Courthouse Building in Matador, Texas, in Motley County, within said District, with Mrs. Pat Sheridan, as Presiding Judge, and Mrs. Kim Wilkinson and Mrs. Olive Russell, as Associate Judges.

(2) In the School Lunch Room in the School Building in Northfield, Texas, in said District, with Mrs. Allen Thomas and Mrs. Newell Timmons as Election Judges.

(3) In the Whiteflat Store Building in Whiteflat, Texas, with Mrs. Horace Jameson and Mrs. Jack Spray, as Election Judges.

Ballots for said election for the Matador Independent School District shall be prepared in sufficient

number and in conformity with Chapter 6, Vernon's Annotated Texas Election Code and that printed on such ballots shall appear the following proposition:

PROPOSITION

FOR CONSOLIDATION OF THE MATADOR INDEPENDENT SCHOOL DISTRICT WITH THE ROARING SPRINGS INDEPENDENT SCHOOL DISTRICT FOR SCHOOL PURPOSES

AGAINST THE CONSOLIDATION OF THE MATADOR INDEPENDENT SCHOOL DISTRICT WITH THE ROARING SPRINGS INDEPENDENT SCHOOL DISTRICT FOR SCHOOL PURPOSES.

Each voter may mark out with black ink or pencil one of such expressions, thus leaving the other as indicating his vote on the proposition.

B. Within the Roaring Springs Independent School District said election shall be held at the following place and with election officials as follows:

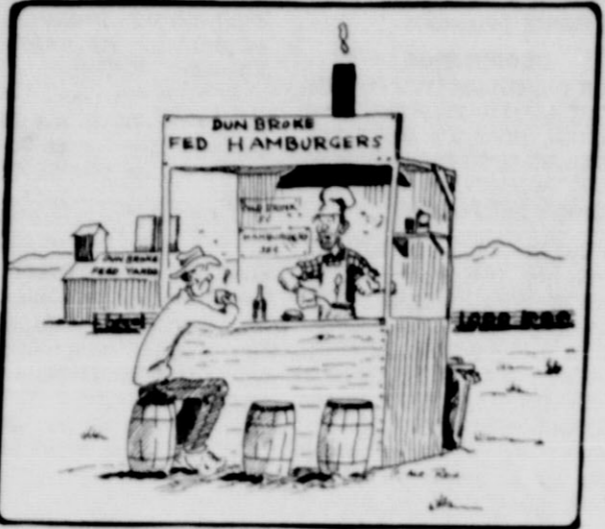

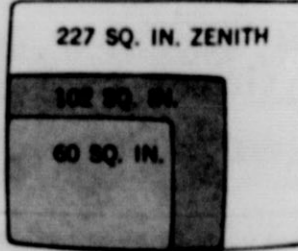
