

Subscribers Asked To Notify Tribune Of Address Changes

With the recent postage increase, and increased costs of mailing, came an increase in the cost of picking up address changes or incorrect address notices at the post office.

Until January 1, it cost 35¢ to pick these up at the post office window, for someone who had not notified us here at the paper of their change of address. Now, each notification costs 50¢, each time, and we may get back three or four papers (or three or four months after you have moved and forgotten about it) - at 50¢ each. As you can see, this mounts up in a hurry.

It is very little trouble for you to notify us that your address has changed. The post office has a kit you can pick up. Please help us keep your cost down, by letting us know that you have moved as soon as possible.

Motley County Heart Association To Launch 1995 Fund Campaign

The Motley County Heart Association will launch its 1995 fund raising campaign during the month of February.

Supporting the American Heart Association is a way that you can make a difference for the people you know and love and for many families whom you'll never know.

Almost 90 cents of every dollar you contribute provides benefits for research and cardiology facilities. This year the AHA awarded \$80,300 in research grants

Dr. Bricker, cardiologist of Lubbock said, "The hospital situation in Lubbock is as fine as anywhere in the United States. We can afford and have the best available techniques and devices."

Options Marketing Workshop To Be Held February 9 For Local Farmers And Ranchers

A workshop, titled "marketing For Tomorrow, Today: Trading on the Options Market", will be held on Thursday, February 9th at the Quitaque Community Center. The workshop will begin at 5:00 p.m. with refreshments provided by the Paymaster Gin - Quitaque.

The workshop is designed to introduce farmers and ranchers to the fundamentals of trading ag commodities on the options market. Topics to be discussed include: What Are Options and The Futures Market?; Benefits Of Forward Pricing; and How To Get Started Trading Options?.

The workshop will be conducted by Dr. Jackie Smith, Extension Economist - Lubbock, with support materials and equipment furnished by DTN Marketing.

Based on the success of this meeting, future workshops will be held to assist producers in the utilization of options as a risk management tool. TEMPLE -- "Rural Economic and Community Development Service (RECDS), formerly Farmers Home Administration (FmHA), is reaching out to members of socially disadvantaged groups to aid them in obtaining their goals of farm ownership," stated George Ellis, Acting State Director of RECDS.

The socially disadvantaged outreach is mandated by the Agricultural Act of 1987 and defines a Socially Disadvantaged Applicant (SDA) as "an applicant who has been subjected to racial or ethnic prejudice or cultural bias because of his/her identity as a member of a group without regard to his/her individual qualities."


Applicants must be a member of the following race/ethnic groups: black (not of Hispanic origin), Hispanic, American Indian or Alaskan Native, Asian/Pacific Islander, or women.

Under this program, RECDS will try to find persons in the SDA categories who are interested in farming. RECDS will be prepared to sell or lease to those applicants who qualify for a farm held in inventory if any are available in the county of the applicant's choice. RECDS can also provide other loan and technical assistance, if needed, to help the borrower get started.

4-H Members Win Award At 1995 Ft. Worth Dairy Judging Contest

The Motley County 4-H Dairy Judging Team participated in the Dairy Judging Contest at the Southwestern Exposition and Livestock Show on January 26, 1995 in Ft. Worth. Team members included Cobey Turner, Ryan Martin, Darryn Perryman, Kaci Risser.

There were 20 4-H and FFA teams (over 80 contestants) from across Texas entered in the contest. Awards were presented in the 4 breed divisions (Holstein, Jersey, Brown Swiss, and Guernsey), reasons, and overall.

In the Holstein division, the Motley County team was awarded 1st place team. Cobey Turner received 1 high point individual honors while Kaci Risser placed 2nd and Darryn Perryman placed 12th in the individual standings of the Holstein division.

In Reasons, the Motley County team was 10th place team with Cobey Turner recognized as 13th high individual. In the Jersey division, Cobey Turner placed 26th in the individual standings. Darryn Perryman was 26th high individual in the Guernsey division.

The contest also served as the district qualifying contest for the Rolling Plains 4-H District 3. In district competition, the team placed 3rd.

This was the first dairy judging contest for 3 of the 4 team members of the Motley County 4-H Dairy Judging Team.

They are excited about their accomplishments and are looking forward to competing in future dairy judging contests.

El Progreso Meets Circuit Riders

Thursday afternoon, January 26, El Progreso Club met in the Senior Citizens building for a program on early day Circuit riders and their mission in bringing religion to the "hinterlands" of Texas.

The meeting was called to order by the Club President, Mrs. JoAnn Dickson, who asked all to participate in the Club Collect. Traditional business was taken care of with the announcement of Mrs. Sue Seigler's resignation as Santa Rosa District President and Mrs. Dickson taking her place on that level. It was announced that the club's annual Valentine-Bingo-Guest luncheon would be February 9 in the Senior Citizens building. A short program by Mrs. Grace Campbell will be on hand as well as a fun-time playing Bingo for White Elephant prizes.

Mrs. Dickson presented Mrs. Lola Pohl who was leader for the afternoon. As Mrs. Pohl played her Casio the group enjoyed singing "The Circuit-Riding Preacher" to the tune of "Battle Hymn of the Republic" with appropriate words, led by Mrs. Grace Campbell. Mrs. Pohl then introduced Mrs. Beverly Vinson with a brief synopsis of her life since coming to Motley County over fifty-one years ago. She mentioned Mrs. Vinson was a transplanted Texan who came from California in 1943 and has been an involved citizen of the county ever since. Mrs. Vinson is active in D.A.R., D.R.T., Study Club, O.E.S. and goes with her husband in many Masonic activities. She also is active in activities of the church (Methodist) in updating the church history, designing the needlepoint pillows for the altar rail, the framing of the church buildings that hang in the foyer and is now undertaking making banners for the church. As Mrs. Pohl concluded her introduction she stated the verse, "Service is the rent we pay for the space we occupy upon this earth" as indicative of Mrs. Vinson.

From the Winston Simplified College Dictionary it states, "Circuit as the route of a traveling Methodist Preacher or the district assigned to him." Thus it is that most of the information for this talk was taken from Methodist works. Mrs. Vinson stated when she first came to this country over fifty-one years ago she had never heard of the circuit riding preachers but soon learned through reading and listening to church-goers. Circuit riding was not only on horseback - it was any means of getting from one spot to another, no matter what kind of weather. As yet churches had not been built, for this was in the early 1820s. When people built houses, they had to get people together to make at least a small congregation before they could build a church house. Methodists had preachers on the ground as soon as cabins were built or tents erected. As there was never much money for a preacher he had to work on a farm, in a blacksmith shop or stood behind a counter during the week and preached on the Sabbath receiving little if any pay and most of the time it was a chicken, butter, milk, eggs or foodstuff of some kind. As was remarked in several publications about the early preacher - they were enthusiastic, earnest, strong in argumentation and convincing and almost overpowering in their oration, preached at every opportunity, "intensely Methodist", had strong opinions and feelings and "he preached until he melted the house to tears."

The preachers oft-times would spend the night with a family of the area, move on to the next place and spend a night or so with them. There were no fences so all he needed was a rope and stake to tie his horse to for many times he had to sleep on the ground.

From Rev. Peter Graves from the Brownfield area: there were "inside" and "outside" preachers - the good ones were left to preach and minister in more heavily populated places while those who were less good were sent to the outer areas and became the circuit riders we hear of today. The distance around the mission was 180 miles and was traveled monthly. Rev. Graves left his family in Comanche so the would live in a protected spot, then traveled sixty miles to his nearest appointment. This was a prosperous year (1870) and his salary and travel expenses were fixed at \$400 with 1/2 pad at the end of the year. In 1876 he was appointed President Elder (P.E.) of the Panhandle District which included Baylor, Wichita, Wilbarger, Hardeman, King, Knox, and Archer with all the territory west. That was a lot of country to cover! Rev. Graves mentions traveling with another preacher to Mobeetie, going, by Doans store where there was a lush plum orchard, also grapes. These two preachers spent many nights in line camps with cowboys and found bed and chuck and mostly irreligious men.

Questions asked at the Gen. Conf. in Waxahachie in 1881 were "How will we get men to send to the rapidly developing N.W. part of Texas?" Buffalo Gap, Albany, Throckmorton and Seymour were the far western outposts at this time with new ones that sprung up at Baird, Abilene, Sweetwater and Colorado City, most western of the new towns. They took young men without families who might get lodging with settlers. That hospitality has never been excelled in history of America. In 1886-1887 a terrible drought and depression hit the area and the conference suffered for two years a serious blot of barrenness.

Mrs. Vinson then mentioned the three Methodist Ministers buried in East Mound Cemetery who were circuit riders, Rev. C.D. Pipkin, Rev. R.L. Jameson and Rev. Marvin Brotherton. She also mentioned Rev. W.B. Vaughn as an early minister of the area buried here for they were all pioneers. Also mentioned was Rev. Butterfield, the father of the late Mrs. Stella Tilson who was a missionary to the Indians and also a circuit rider.

Those attending the meeting other than mentioned were Mrs. Loys Campbell, Mrs. Dorothy Day, Mrs. Opal Pipkin, Mrs. Winfred Darsey, and guests, Mrs. Irene Welling, Mrs. Mary McMahan and Rev. Ron Kelley.

Refreshments were served from a sunflower bedecked table with two old Bibles and a horse carrying out the theme of the circuit rider, all this by hostesses Mrs. Grace Campbell, Mrs. Marge Edwards and Mrs. JoAnn Dickson.





Signup for the 1995 Farm Program began on Monday, January 30, 1995 and will continue through April 28, 1995. Producers need to start getting the ball rolling as insurance must be purchased for insurable crops by March 15, 1995. You need to get new power-of-attorneys filled out for your landlords if the old P-O-A does not designate you to sign for them on FCIC matters. Check with us NOW on this and any other questions you may have. Projected payment rates for 1995 program crops are as follows:

.70¢/bu. for wheat, .40¢/bu. for corn, .39¢/bu. for sorghum, .037¢/lb. for cotton, .40¢/bu. for barley, and .10¢/bu. for oats.

Remember - if you share in an insurable crop in Motley County as an owner, operator, or tenant, and wish to remain eligible for participate in any USDA program for your share, you must insure that crop for 1995 with at least the catastrophic (CAT) level. Insurable crops are cotton, peanuts, wheat, and grain sorghum for 1995 in Motley County.


