SAVING ON AGRICULTURAL LAND TAXES

Agricultural appraisal lowers the value of land owned by qualifed farmers and ranchers. It values rural land based on the land's capacity to produce crops, livestock or timber, instead of its value on the local area. real estate market. This lower value reduces property taxes on the land.

However, the chief appraiser may request a new application to verify that you still meet the qualifications. If you get a notice to reapply, be sure to do so. If you don't, you will lose your eligibility. If you become the owner of land that is already qualified, you must reapply in your own name by April 30. If you don't you will lose 6. If the chief appraiser asks you for your eligibility. You must notify the appraisal district in writing by April 30 if

> 9. The agricultural appraisal is based on an estimate of the typical annual income during the five-year period preceding the year before the Appraisal. The agricultural appraisal may change annually based on this income and the capitalization rate.
