A former resident and member of a pioneer Motley County family, Ellis F. Daffern, 76, of Payson, Ariz., died June 12 in a hospital in Phoenix, Ariz. He had been ill since suffering a stroke in December, 1966.

He was a brother of Matador residents, A. J. (Albert) Daffern and T. J. (Jeff) Daffern.

Funeral services were held Wednesday, June 14 in the Chapel of Light in Green Acres Memorial Garden, with burial in the cemetery there.

Mr. Daffern was born April 7, 1891, and came as a child to this area with his parents, the late Mr. and Mrs. Steve Daffern, in about 1906. He had made his home in Arizona for a number of years.

Survivors include his wife, of Payson; one son, Franklin Daffern of Los Angeles, Calif.; one daughter, Mrs. D. W. Hand of Tempe, Ariz.; five brothers, Robert Daffern of Plainview, Tex.; J. P. Daffern, Albuquerque, N.M.; Paul Daffern of San Bernardino, Calif.; and A. J. and T. J. Daffern of Matador; and three sisters, Mrs. Mary Thomason of Denver, Colo.; Mrs. Lorene Maxwell of Fort Worth; and Mrs. Lillie Blackburn of Phoenix.

Mr. Daffern was a member of the College Art Award, was on the Dean's Honor List, and transferred from there to South Plains College, Levelland, where he won the S.P.C. College Art Award, was a member of the Student Council and a student of the Press Club. He was a student teacher in night school and held elementary teaching classes for students.

He has won 1st place in painting.

Hospital Board to Shun Extra Taxes

IT IS PROBABLE that hospital facilities may be provided by the Motley County Hospital District without any additional taxes, according to a typed release received by the Tribune. It may be necessary, however, to levy a small maintenance tax, the release declared.

Full text of the release is as follows: "Motley County Hospital district board of directors, met at the courthouse, Wednesday night, June 15, and received the amendment to the act of the Legislature authorizing the creation of the district.

"This amendment was necessary in order for the district to have power to issue revenue bonds for the purpose of paying for hospital

facilities which the board was contemplating for the district. "The effect of this amendment to the act creating the district was to permit the financing of the hospital facilities without the necessity of levying a property tax on the property in the district to raise the money, as it is expected that an agency of the federal government will purchase the revenue bonds, in event they cannot be sold to private investors.

"At this meeting, an application was authorized to be submitted to the proper financing agency for the advancement of the money until the hospital facilities could be completed and the revenue bonds are approved by the Attorney General, and sold.

"In event this application is approved by the federal financing agency, and the funds are made available, the board is of the opinion that proper hospital facilities for the district will be made available at an early date thereafter. However, it must be kept in mind that the actions of the federal agencies are sometimes slow, and that immediate results cannot be expected, but the board will use every effort to rush the matter along. The federal agency may require that a moderate maintenance tax be levied."

School Merger Issue "Quiet"

One of the most important issues ever to confront this West Texas county, the consolidation of the Matador and Roaring Springs Independent School Districts, is "quiet." Little discussion is heard on the streets of Matador and Roaring Springs, and school officials said yesterday that the earlier barrage of questions has ceased.

An election Saturday, July 1, will decide the issue. Both Matador and Roaring Springs must vote a majority for the issue to receive approval.

In event both districts approve the consolidation, name of the new district will be Motley Consolidated Independent School District.

Both schools are losing scholars and need the consolidation to receive full state aid in order to employ sufficient teachers. In event of the consolidation the new district would receive \$300,000 from the state as a "bonus" within ten years, from the saving in a single operation.

An aluminum gate slammed against Mrs. Segler, cutting and bruising the left side of her face, breaking her glasses and barely missing her eye. She had been aiding her husband in moving cattle from one area to another.

Mrs. Segler has just recovered from severe reactions to a recent wasp sting which had required extensive medical treatments.

One chart in the booklet contains a record of rainfall by the month, since January 1924. Only 100 copies were produced.

Federal Funds Increased for Rural Housing

Farmers Home Administration has been authorized to insure an additional \$148 million of rural loans according to word received by L. J. Cappelman, Farmers Home Administration Texas State Director.

This action, announced in Washington by Secretary of Agriculture Orville Freeman, will enable USDA's Farmers Home Administration to commit an additional \$30 million in Farm Ownership loans and \$118 million in Rural Housing loans to low and moderate income families. Previous allocations of funds for Farm Ownership loans were exhausted in February. There are some 20,000 applications and unfunded loan docket currently being held by the Farmers Home Administration.

Funds for Rural Housing loans to low and moderate income families were exhausted in April. The Farmers Home Administration is now holding some 42,000 applications and unfunded loan docket for Rural Housing loans. Both the funds for Farm Ownership and Rural Housing loans are being made available immediately. Farm Ownership loans are made to buy land, construct or repair buildings, improve land and refinance debts. They are repayable over 40 years and bear 5 percent interest.

Rural Housing loans are made to farmers and other rural residents in open country and small rural communities with populations of not more than 5,500. Loans are made to construct and repair needed homes and essential farm buildings, purchase homes or buy sites on which to build homes. The maximum term is 33 years. The interest rate on loans to families with low and moderate incomes is 5 percent. County office for Motley County is located at the Motley County Courthouse, Matador. County supervisor is Alfred A. Harrison. Office hours are 9 a.m. to 12 noon every Wednesday.
