## Methodist Church Begins Observance Of 75th Anniversary

The Methodist Church of Matador will begin celebrating its 75th anniversary Sunday, April 23 at the morning worship hour, it was announced this week by Rev. John Fitzgerald, pastor.

Rev. W. A. Appling, superintendent of the Plainview District, will be guest speaker. Rev. W. B. Vaughn, a former pastor and now a retired minister living here, will be in charge of the service. A covered dish dinner will be served in the basement at noon.

From time to time a former pastor will visit the church. The observance will close December 3 with Bishop Eugene Slater as speaker for the occasion.

The church was organized in 1892, the year after Motley County was organized. Rev. R. M. Morris was the first pastor, and charter members were: Thomas, Mary, Fannie and Ida Edmondson, J. A. R. J., and Mary Jones, and Mr. and Mrs. William Wason. Ida Edmondson Pipkin was the last of the charter members to pass away.

The first church building was constructed in 1900, and the present building in 1926. In 1963 an Educational building was erected and a new parsonage was built in 1965.

## Veteran Tells Lions Of Vietnam Crisis

WE HAVE a tiger by the tail in Vietnam and the greatest disaster that could befall the cause of freedom, would be to loosen our grip. This is the opinion of Winston Hall of Silverton, who was the principal speaker Tuesday at the regular luncheon meeting of the Matador Lions.

Still a youthful man, Hall has been a combat Marine in three wars. He is retired now after 24 years in the uniform. He has been awarded six Purple Hearts, the Vietnam and the greatest disaster that could befall the cause of freedom, would be to loosen our grip. This is the opinion of Winston Hall of Silverton, who was the principal speaker Tuesday at the regular luncheon meeting of the Matador Lions.

Still a youthful man, Hall has been a combat Marine in three wars. He is retired now after 24 years in the uniform. He has been awarded six Purple Hearts, the Navy Cross, Bronze Star and Silver Star.

"Vietnam is important to us and to the world," Hall said. "It has been estimated that the rich delta country of South Vietnam could, within five years, feed the entire Far East. We were asked by the South Vietnam government to help defend their country.

"If we pulled out, the communist powers would take everything within six months, and most of it within six weeks," Hall said. Communism feeds on ignorance and the Viet Cong is ruthless, driving with fear and brutality. He sends soldiers into battle without guns, depending on arms taken from the dead (women, children and the old) is less important than is a bone to a dog.

"Our greatest mistake," Hall said, "was under-estimating the cunning and intelligence of the Oriental. The same mistake was made by France and England. We must also remember that the people have never known a day of peace in 175 years."

We are making progress and the US remains the hope of freedom. Our men have plenty of the three B's, bullets, beans and bandages and that is all you need to fight a war."

Hall was introduced by Lion Ronnie Christian, program sponsor. In the announcements made by Boss Lion Frank Price he said the club had voted \$500 to buy a power mower for use in the City Park.

## TRAIL DUST 'Pay Without Work' Declared as Danger

A NATION that wants pay without work is creating a national peril according to Dr. C. L. Kay, Assistant President of Lubbock Christian College, well-known theologian, writer and nationally famous speaker.

He made the principal address at the annual "Gentlemen's evening" program and banquet by El Progreso Study Club, in the First Baptist Church sanctuary and basement Thursday evening.

"We live in an age of confusion," the dynamic speaker declared, "and we want friends without being friendly. We want success without work, and demand more and more while giving less and less. We should give more responsibility to state and city government, and express ourselves to our elected officials. We need to return to fundamental principles.

"The rate of crime is going up six times faster than the rate of population growth, and we have more sentiment for the criminal than the law designed to protect us. We need greater vision. We need to do our home work well."

**Unusual Introduction**  
Dr. Kay was introduced by Ralph Stapleton of Flomot, farmer, rancher and bank director. "I have never met this man before," Stapleton said, "so I am going to tell him about myself." He proceeded to tell the visitor about himself, and Dr. Kay replied in kind.

"I have been introduced many thousands of times," Dr. Kay said, "but this is the most unusual introduction I have ever received." He apparently enjoyed the experience.

After more than 30 years in the Graham Building on Main Street, City Bakery has moved its station to the Smith Building on US Highway 70, east of the Dixie Dog Drive in.

"It is a matter of economy and changing conditions," Roy Smith, manager, said this week. "Because of the many convenient bakery products sold in food markets, most of which we distribute, it was feasible that we close our bakery and retail outlet."

"We felt that as distributors of Mrs. Baird's Bakery products and Frito Lay products, it was in keeping with the times to distribute only to retail outlets in this area. Modern bakery packaged products and frozen food bakery products make it impractical to attempt to compete in operating the small bakeshop.

"We are grateful to our loyal customers in the area," Mr. Smith said. "And there is no change in our service, except that we are strictly in the wholesale bakery products business and we operate from our own building. Fresh bakery products are delivered each night for delivery to grocery stores in the area, the following morning."

## Prominent Rancher, J. C. Burleson, Dies

J. C. (Doc) Burleson, 73, prominent rancher of the county, died Monday in the Plainview Hospital, where he had been a patient for several weeks. He had been in failing health following throat surgery last year.

Funeral services were held at 10 a.m. Wednesday in First Methodist Church, with the pastor, the Rev. John Fitzgerald and Earl Cantwell of Silverton, minister of Rock Creek Church of Christ, officiating. Burial was in East Mound Cemetery with Seigler Funeral Home in charge of arrangements.

John Carr Burleson was born at Vance, Edwards County, Texas, September 11, 1893, and died April 17, 1967 at the age of 73 years, 7 months and 6 days.

He moved to Briscoe County in 1924 with his parents, traveling in a covered wagon. He later lived in Swisher County. He was married to Miss Onie Martin, Jan. 4, 1915, in Matador and they moved to a ranch near Flomot in 1921, living there until moving to Matador in 1957.

Mr. Burleson had been a director of the First State Bank since 1931. He was a member of Matador Masonic Lodge, the Shrine and Scottish Rite, and belonged to the First Methodist Church. He was generous in supporting the Methodist Children's Home, with donations of calves, and was a staunch supporter of the Junior Livestock Show.

He encouraged young people to raise good beef, and improved the quality of his own herd while increasing his ranch holdings.

When the Matador Ranch sold in 1961, he acquired a block of range-land which included the historic Mort Camp northwest of Matador. He graduated from the old Seth Ward College in Plainview, and for a short time operated a cafe there.

Survivors include his wife, Onie, one son, W. E. Burleson of Floydada, two grandchildren, Stanley Burleson of Cedar Hill and Mrs. Frank Potts (Marisue) of Royal Oak, Michigan, two brothers, Jim Burleson of Ruidoso, N. M., and Bruce Burleson, Amarillo, a foster brother, Edwin Crass of Silverton, two sisters, Mrs. W. C. Price of Plainview and Mrs. Ray McMurry of Silverton; and six great-grandchildren. One brother, Joe Edd Burleson preceded him in death.

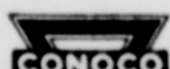
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#### Slides are Shown For Garden Club

### COUNTY AGENT PALLMEYER SAYS:

Blueford Hancock, Extension Horticulturist from College Station presented information relative to pecan and fruit production in Motley County, and as far as pecans are concerned, water and the high calcium content of Motley County soils present a problem.

For those who wish to try pecans, Wichita and Western Schley are the best for this area. The best time to set out the plants is from the middle of February to the middle of March, and freshly dug plants have a better chance of survival. Good stock should always be obtained, and the optimum size for pecan nursery stock is from 5 to 7 feet in height.

The root system should be kept moist at all times, and holes should be just large enough to accommodate the root system. Trees should be set at the same depth it stood in the nursery, and the hole should be filled with good topsoil, firmed around the roots. It is also wise to fill the hole with water a day before planting, allowing the soil around the hole to become saturated, and not allow this dry area to soak water away from the freshly planted tree.

Beginning the second season, apply nitrogen fertilizer in a split application, the first in late winter and the second in late May or early June. Do not exceed 1/2 pound of actual nitrogen per tree at each application for newly planted trees, spreading this in a band around the tree, starting at least 12 inches from the trunk. Also apply a foliar spray containing two pounds of zinc sulfate (36% metallic zinc) to 100 gallons of spray mix to the young trees when the leaves are about 1/3rd grown, and in areas where high calcium levels are present in the soil as is the case in most of Motley County, one or two additional zinc foliar sprays at approximately three week intervals will be required.

After the trees start to bear, nitrogen fertilizer at the rate of 1/2 lb. of ammonium sulfate per diameter inch of tree trunk should be applied at the drip line of trees in late winter, and worked into the soil. If growth of the tree is below normal during the preceding year, the amount of fertilizer should be doubled, but if the tree makes excessive growth (over 15 inches of terminal growth), no fertilizer is needed.

All bearing pecans should receive an annual application of zinc as a foliar spray, with the spray prepared in the same manner as the spray applied to young trees. Finally, insect control is a must. A regular spray program for the pecan nut casebearer should be followed, and for other insect problems, consult L-246, "Texas Guide for Controlling Insects and Diseases on Fruits & Nuts". Hancock also advised growers to plant more than one variety as an aid to pollination, and if water is available, don't be afraid to use it. Keep the soil moist.

but don't keep the trees standing in water.

I have some aids that were developed by Hancock relative to pecan production, and will be glad to go over these with you. We know that the pecan will grow in Motley County, but for satisfactory results, proper care and treatment is necessary.

Matador boys' track team brought home a pair of second place finishes to garner a total of 100 points in UIL competition.

After what Coach Willborn Myers called "an outstanding team effort," the red and black thinclads numbered six men as regional qualifiers. They are: John Shead, who won the 880 with a time of 2:10.5; Mark Timmons, who copped a blue ribbon in the 220 yard dash and a red ribbon in the 100 yard dash by breaking the tape with a time of 24.3 and 10.6, respectively; and John Thomas, shot-putter, who flung the 16 pound ball 42'6" for a 2nd place. The mile relay team swept first place with a time of 3 minutes 45 and 3/10 seconds. It is composed of Jimmy Timmons, John Shead, Dickie Shead and Larry Bostick.

Other winners were: Dick Moss, 5th in the half mile; Joey Meador, 4th in the 100 yard dash and 6th in the 200 yard dash; Jimmy Timmons, Luis Moore and Larry Bostick, 3rd, 4th, and 5th, respectively in the quarter mile; Jesse Perkins, 5th in the mile run; and Mark Timmons, Darrell Marshall, Luis Moore and Joey Meador, 3rd in the 440 yard relay.

In field events, Luis Moore took 3rd in the high jump and 6th in the shot put while Mark Timmons nailed down 4th place in the discus throw.

The freshman team also won second place by amassing 45 1/2 points. They lost to first place Jayton by only 2 1/2 points. Led by the flashing spikes of Don Pitts who reaped a windfall of 20 points, the freshman team showed up exceedingly well.

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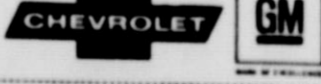

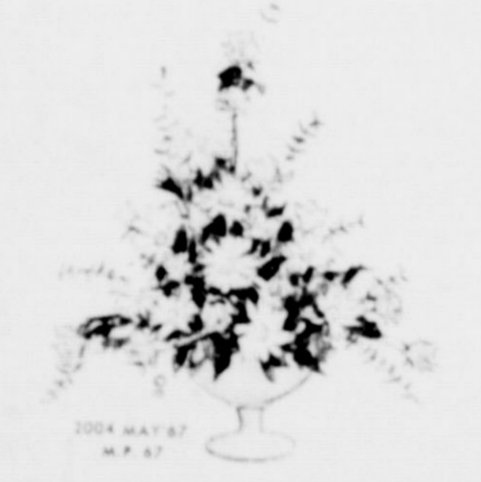
