#### Methodist Church **Begins Observance** Of 75th Anniversary

The Methodist Church of Matador will begin celebrating its 75th anniversary, Sunday, April 23 at the morning worship hour, it was announced this week by Rev. John Fitzgerrel, pastor.

Rev. W. A. Appling, superintendent of the Plainview District, will be guest speaker. Rev. W. B. Vaughn, a former pastor and now a retired minister living here, will be in charge of the service. A covered dish dinner will be served in the basement at noon.

From time to time a former pastor will visit the church. The observance will close December 3 with Bishop Eugene Slater as

speaker for the occasion. The church was organized in 1892, the year after Motley County was organized. Rev. R. M. Morris was the first pastor, and charter members were: Thomas, Mary, Fannie and Ida Edmondson; J. A R. J., and Mary Jones; and Mr. and Mrs. William Wason. Ida Edmondson Pipkin was the last of the charter members to pass away.

The first church building was onstructed in 1900, and the present uilding in 1926. In 1963 an Educaional building was erected and a new parsonage was built in 1965.
