Necessary For County To Participate In Two Year Program

BENEFIT TO BE OVER \$125,000 EACH YEAR

Permanent Agent Will Relieve L. L. Ballard Now In Charge

Motley county will again have a permanent Agricultural Agent as soon as an appointment from the Texas A. & M. College can be made. The arrangement was culminated this week with the approval of the budget, prepared by the Commissioners Court, by John Edmonds, District Agent of the Extension Service Department of A. & M. College.

Cooperation of the Texas A. & M. College makes possible the services of a county agent for Motley county.

The step to include part payment of the agents salary in a budget prepared by the Commissioners Court was made necessary by the impossibility of counties without agents to participate in the Federal two-year Cotton and Wheat reduction plan. With the services of an agent Motley county is now assured between \$125,000 and \$140,000 in cash rental per year for the two ensuing years, which would have otherwise been impossible.

Emergency Agricultural Assistant, L. L. Ballard, who has charge of the cotton plow-up check distribution in the county, will be relieved of his duties upon arrival of the permanent agent.

The Bank as a Rebuilder

IN place of a 3 per cent loss on an investment of \$40,000 a large New York savings bank is now getting 6 per cent profit on an investment of \$80,000, because it had the good business judgment to spend \$40,000 in modernizing a group of 40-year-old tenement houses on the lower East Side which it was forced to take over on mortgage foreclosure, says an article in the American Bankers Association Journal. A year or two ago the owner, who had always kept up his mortgage payments, began to neglect the property, it became run down and the tenants began to leave.

The bank remodeled the buildings completely, putting in an oil-burning heating plant, incinerators and other modern changes, with the result the buildings are now entirely rented, and there is \$14,000 a year coming in instead of several thousand going out. At that rate the improvements will pay for themselves in three years.

This same bank has done 15 other renovation jobs similar to this, and all have proved profitable. The bank has its own architects and is employing seven painters who are kept busy continuously.
