The cotton crop of Motley  
 County is far better than expected  
 this year, and the bolls are open-  
 ing up at a fast rate. Cotton pick-  
 ers are in a big demand. At the  
 present time Motley county alone  
 can use at least 1000 pickers to  
 care for the crop.

With the number of cotton wag-  
 ons coming to town and the reg-  
 ular run of business in Matador  
 it is almost impossible to get  
 through the streets. The streets  
 are lined with trucks, wagons and  
 automobiles from day light to  
 dark each day, and business is  
 flourishing in every line.

The three cotton gins of Mat-  
 ador are turning out on an aver-  
 age of from 60 to 90 bales of cot-  
 ton per day, and all are practical-  
 ly running day and night. The  
 crop is turning out much better  
 than was expected, and it is fig-  
 ured that a much larger crop will  
 be ginned this year than there  
 was last year.

The News received a number of  
 compliments last week on our  
 paper. One man stated to us that  
 he was "very anxious to see the  
 business concerns of Matador sup-  
 port the paper to such an extent  
 that it would justify us to con-  
 tinue putting out eight pages, and  
 that it was the best advertising  
 the town and county had ever had"  
 This man is doing his part to  
 help us keep it up to that stand-  
 ard as well as a number of the  
 other business men of the town.

We have a whole lot of confid-  
 ence in the future of Matador and  
 Motley county. With the natural  
 resources that exist and the pros-  
 pects in sight for the settling up  
 of the vast area of productive  
 land that surrounds our town,  
 there is nothing to keep Matador  
 from making one of the best towns  
 in this section of West Texas.

We have it from pretty reliable  
 authority that a number of acres  
 of ranch land is going to put on  
 the market in the early spring.  
 This no doubt will prove a wonder-  
 ful benefit to Motley county.  
 There is no question as to the pro-  
 ductive value of the land in this  
 county, and there will be no  
 trouble in finding buyers after  
 the land has been put on the mar-  
 ket.

A special meeting of the Motley  
 County Chamber of Commerce is  
 called for next Saturday at 4 p. m.

 ing is to meet with Mr. Sam Laz-  
 arus, President and Mr. Sommer,

 extensions in this part of West  
 Texas. It is the interest of every

 to her and always provided for  
 her support and maintenance, but

 vows on the 19th day of June,  
 1922, defendant left plaintiff's  
 bed and board, and ran away with  
 a negro man whose name is un-  
 known to plaintiff, and since that  
 date remained away from plaintiff  
 for a period of more than three  
 years without his consent or per-  
 mission, and has since said date  
 been living with a negro man  
 whose name is unknown to plain-  
 tiff. Plaintiff alleges that de-  
 fendant's actions and conduct to-  
 ward him generally are of such  
 a nature as to render their further  
 living together as husband and

wife insupportable, the premises  
 considered. Wherefore plaintiff

 herein and for judgment dissolv-  
 ing said marriage relations, for  
 costs of suit, and for such other  
 relief, special and general, in law  
 and in equity, that he may be

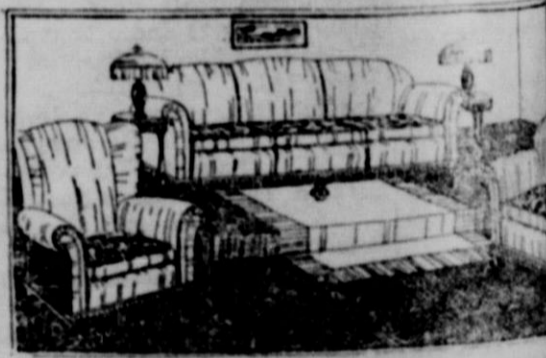
