\$3.50 in extra taxes each year. It was pointed out that the city and county will probably face a serious problem within the next few months if some form of employment is not provided for the unemployed in the county. The Commissioner's Court is at present faced with a grave problem and the prospect is darker for the future, members of the court declared. Paving of the streets would be a permanent aid to property values in the city and in most cases prove a good investment to property owners.

Mayor G. T. Edwards asked for a vote on the proposed method of raising the money and a secret ballot taken disclosed that the seventeen present had unanimously voted for a bond election to be placed with the property owners. Mayor Edwards declared that he would take immediate action to secure the services of an engineer in order that accurate estimates might be had on the costs of a drainage system. Plans for holding the election would follow the estimates made by the engineer, it was declared.

Driving 184 cars and trucks nearly three million miles in 1938 with less than one accident per 100,000 miles was a feat which won drivers for the West Texas Utilities Company national attention and the safety award made by the Bureau of Safety in a contest between a group of companies of similar size.
