POPULATION OF COUNTY INCREASES FROM 24 TO 6812 IN HALF CENTURY

WEST TEXAS GREW THREE
AND ONE HALF TIMES
FASTER AS U. S.

West Texas grew in population more than twice as fast as the rest of the state and three and one-half times as fast as the whole United States during the past fifty years, according to the census compilation in the current issue of WEST TEXAS TODAY, official publication of the West Texas Chamber of Commerce.

From the article we find: "The fastest growing section of West Texas, and perhaps the fastest growing agricultural section in America of similar size, is that comprising the present fifty-four counties west and north of Abilene. That vast area, formerly called the Great Staked Plains, and the Llano Estacado, of 52,000 square miles, the size of North Carolina and bigger than either Alabama, Tennessee or Mississippi, had only 3,183 people in 1880, while today its population is 525,429—over half a million. It has increased 1600 per cent."

The census of Motley county in 1880 was 24. The 1930 census of the county was 6812.

Postmaster-General Brown announces that 746,648,418 pieces of mail, weighing in all 113,140,836 pounds, were mailed free in the United States during 1932, under franking privilege and other concessions for nonpayment of postage. If all this mail had been sent at the regular rates the Post Office Department would now be \$10,701,612 richer.
