## Soaking Rains Improve Outlook

DROUGHT-BREAKING rains reported as much as 3 inches at Flomot, brought a refreshing outlook on farming and ranching conditions during the past two days. The White Star area received two inches. Matador had an official 1.42 inches and the county in general received soaking rains. There was no runoff as the moisture went into the thirsty soil.

Slow, soaking rains have washed the cares from the face of West Texas. While the moisture needs of the area have not been satisfied from seven months of drought, relief has arrived.

A storm system originating about the Texas-New Mexico line and extending eastward late Monday developed into rainfall by Tuesday morning.

The advance summer heat vanished in the wake of the storm that brought tornado warnings as far north as Matador, and the mercury suddenly dropped to cause fires to be re-lighted and residents to seek heavy clothing.

Snow fell Tuesday night in the northern Panhandle and weathermen said frost might be expected in the Amarillo area early this morning.

It was the first rain of consequence here since Sept. 15, according to records kept by R. M. (Bob) Stanley. Total rainfall (until Tuesday morning) since Aug. 1, was 4.33 inches (including snow and sleet).

The record shows Aug. 1.11 inches, Sept. 2.09 inches, Oct. 19-inch, Nov. none, Dec. 14-inch. Only .95-inch of moisture had been recorded here since the first of the year.

## Kay Rattan Crowned Queen at Lions Show

The show was the most successful in the club's history, both from a financial standpoint and in the number of paid admissions. It was necessary to turn away some late arrivals because no more seats were available in the high school auditorium.

estimated that the service club would net approximately \$550 after all expenses have been paid.

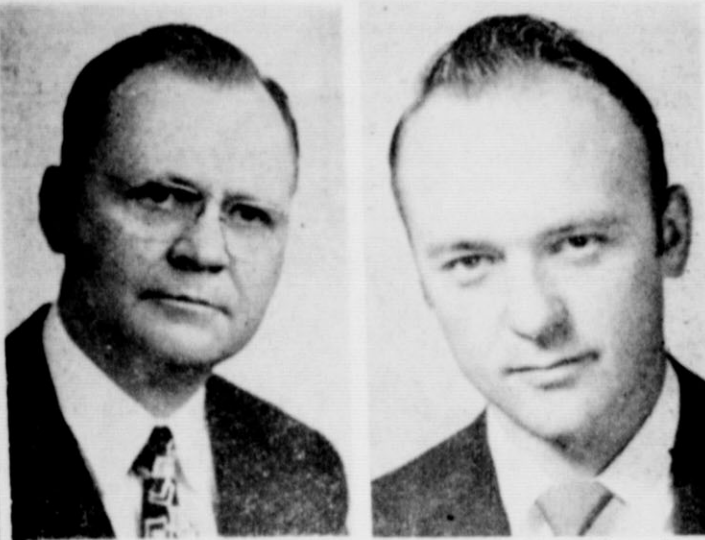
### Light City Vote Re-Elects Three

### "Put Foundations Under Your Castles"

## County Seniors Hear Judge Elbert Reeves

"MAKE FOUNDATIONS for your castles in the air" County Judge Elbert Reeves Monday night told the seniors from Motley County's three high schools. He was the principal speaker at the annual Fleming-Post American Legion banquet honoring the graduates, their superintendents and wives, and their sponsors and wives.

Members of the Legion Auxiliary prepared the covered dish supper, arranged the colorful table decorations and arranged the Legion club room for the reception.

"It requires a lifetime to learn how to live," Judge Reeves told his audience, "and I do not propose to advise you on the future. I will, however, ask you four questions, and as you answer them, I feel that you will derive some benefit from the thoughts I am talking to the seniors:

"Question 1, do you have a wholesome attitude toward life? Question 2, do you have a self fit to live with? Question 3, do you have a philosophy fit to live with?"

In each instance the speaker suggested ways in which the questions might be answered to provide richer, fuller lives.

"A destiny makes us brothers," Judge Reeves said, "and the future of the world must look to the young people of America to direct its course."

Introduced by Speer Legionnaire Joe Speer of Flomot, who originated the annual banquet plan, introduced the speaker.

"We planned these annual banquets," he said, "because the Legion is essentially a service organization. We are looking to you boys and girls to get the world out of the mess for which the present generation is responsible.

"If freedom and democracy are to survive, the responsibility of survival rests on the younger generation," he said.

Invocation was by Rev. L. W. Tucker, pastor of the Matador Methodist Church. Pre-banquet music was played by "The Three Notes" Group singing followed by the banquet was accompanied by "The Hep Cats" of Matador.

Seniors from the three schools were introduced as were invited members of their respective faculties. Also recognized were two members of the county school board, Delmont Hays of Northfield and Raby Webb of Matador.

### Voting Light in Trustee Election

Voting was light throughout the county in Saturday's trustee election. Unofficial returns indicate that less than 180 votes were cast. Bill Seale of Matador, candidate for trustee at large on the county school board, received 146 votes, the largest number for any candidate. His vote in Roaring Springs had not been confirmed and is estimated to bring the total to about 180.

Matador might have been the lightest box of the three school districts except for a sudden wave of write-in votes late in the day. At three o'clock the voting showed a total of about 25. When the polls closed Matador had 100 votes.

Incumbents John V. Stevens and Forrest Campbell were re-elected. Stevens received 100 votes and Campbell 89. Mrs. Melvin Meason received 26 write-in votes and Mrs. Bill Pipkin as a write-in candidate received 15 votes. Mike Hoyle received three write-in votes and Mrs. Algie Groves two.

At Flomot the three candidates were elected. Barry Barham received 27, Gordie Washington 25 and Alton Anderson 27. Four write-in candidates received one vote each.

Roaring Springs named three out of a slate of five candidates: S. J. Braselton received 37, Avery Payne 32 and Frasier Watson 28. Carl Tardy received 19 and Lester Davis seven.

Jess Browning, candidate for a place on the County School Board from precinct two, received 37 votes. Raby Webb, candidate for a place on the County School Board from precinct one, received 100 votes.

### Car Registration Has Healthy Gain

Car registration in Motley County as of April 1st, showed a healthy increase over 1958, which may be taken as a barometer indicating an increase in population.

Records from the office of Sheriff, Tax Assessor and Collector Jinks Wilson, show 47 more passenger cars registered April 1 as compared with the same date a year ago. The county registered 883 automobiles on that date in 1958 and 910 in 1959.

Gains were also shown in the registration of commercial and farm trucks as compared with a year ago. Truck tractors were exactly the same (15).

In 1959 owners registered 186 commercial trucks and 283 farm trucks as compared with 195 commercial trucks and 290 farm trucks this year.

Burleson of Matador received the Reserve Championship award for her 946-pound Hereford Bearden (800-pound Hereford).

A total of \$353 in prize money was awarded to the exhibitors of 23 steers, 35 swine and three lambs. Of the prize money \$225 went to steer exhibitors, \$121 to swine and \$7 to lambs.

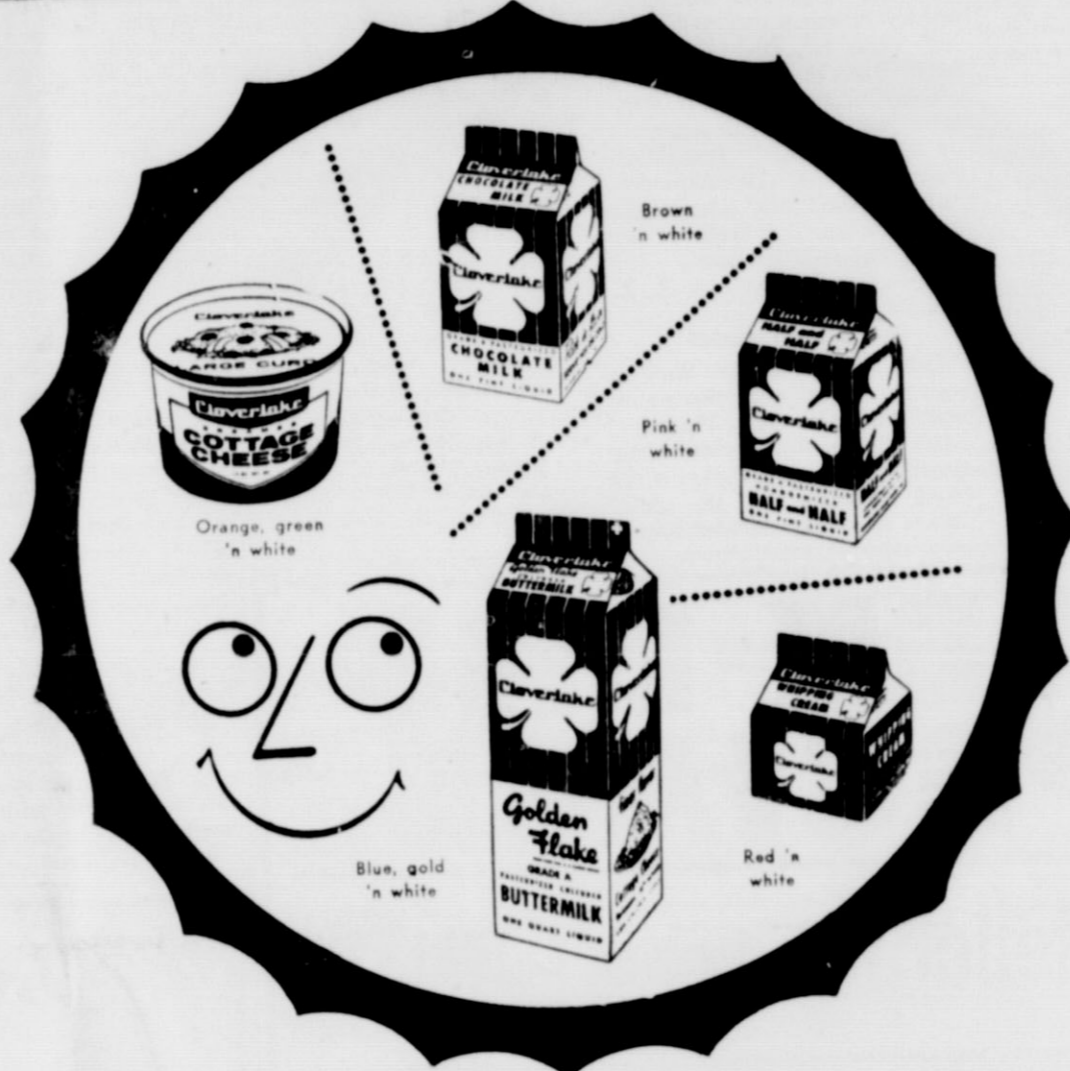

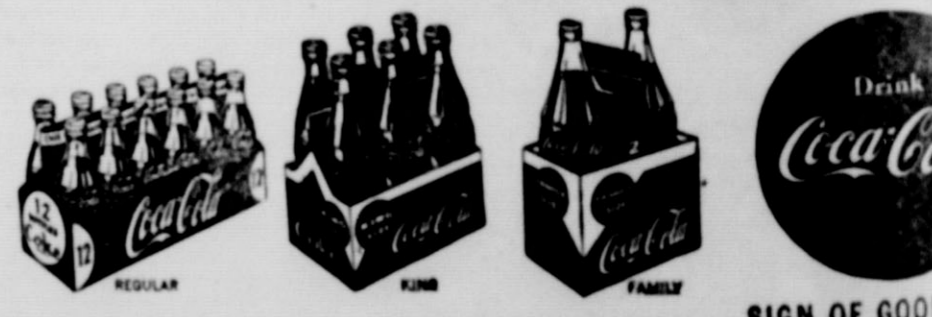

**Social Security Benefits Paid to Aged Dependents**

Dependent aged parents of a deceased son or daughter may now receive Social Security payments even though the deceased was survived by a widow, widower, or child. Mr. John G. Hutton, district manager of the Lubbock, Texas, Social Security office indicated that these addi-

tional benefits are possible as the result of recent Social Security amendments.

Dependent mothers and dependent fathers in this group should immediately get in touch with their Social Security office, Mr. Hutton said today.

Before a dependent mother at age 62 or dependent father at age 65 can receive benefits, they must file proof of dependency with their Social Security office. Generally this proof must be filed within two years after August 1958, when the law was amended, or within two years after the death of the son or daughter whichever is later.

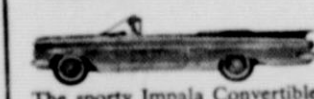

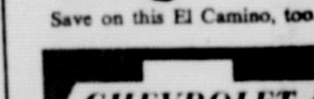
