## Heavy Rains Soak County Farm Land

### Outlying Area Hail Damaged

#### Muleshoe Wildlife Refuge Receives Extensive Damage

Late Friday afternoon southwestern Bailey County caught the brunt of a storm which ravaged crops in the area. Hard, wind-driven rain and hail fell, flooding crops and in many areas crops were beaten into the ground.

Hailstones up to and including larger than golf ball size broke windows, stripped trees and ground crops into shreds. A large part of the hailstorm concentrated on the Muleshoe National Wildlife Refuge about 20 miles from Muleshoe. Wildlife Manager Bert Blair reported windows knocked out of the house and office building, wind damage to the house and at least eight inches of hail on the ground. Flooding caused a problem, as water was so deep, it took officers several hours to get in to bring the Blair family to Muleshoe. There were no injuries reported from flying glass or debris.

The first problem Blackwell ran into was water--rivers and lakes of water. Then, he could not locate the pickup that was trying to get the woman into town. The pickup was stalled and the telephone in the pickup went dead. After some two hours of searching by members of the county and state police and the Bailey County Electric crews the pickup was located -- BUT -- the woman refused to come into the hospital.

She was taken to Needmore where she stayed with friends. Saturday morning, before presstime, heavy, rain-laden clouds dominated the local weather picture and farmers began casting wary eyes toward the threatening skies. More rain was forecast to continue through the day and evening Friday.

Roads all over the area were either closed or passable though water covered. Shortly before 6:30 a.m. Friday, heavy rain began falling in the Muleshoe area. The downpour was accompanied by thunder and lightning and preceded a brief hailstorm which peppered for about five minutes. Although some leaves were knocked from trees, no appreciable damage was noted from the brief hail. Stones were mostly pea sized with a few marble sized hailstones found.

From one to slightly more than two inches of rain blanketed the area before 8:30 a.m. and moved on east and northeast. In the Needmore area, there was brief flooding as the rain fell too fast to handle the runoff. In Muleshoe, city streets were miniature rivers until the water could run off around 10 a.m. Friday.

## Sorghum Growers Watch Greenbugs

With hundreds of acres in Bailey County devoted to the grain sorghum crop, farmers cast anxious eyes on their young crops for the dreaded infestation of greenbugs.

Last year, greenbugs hit Northern Bailey County and Southern Bailey County and left depleted crops in their wake.

Heavy damage was reported all over the area by farmers who either did not spray or sprayed the tiny bugs too late. Some farmers reported greenbug damage in excess of 60 percent to their crop.

Sorghum growers should be on the alert again this year for the pesky and destructive greenbug. This tiny pest which sucks the juices from the sorghum plant and did such widespread damage in the Sorghum Belt last summer is back at it in many areas.

If there are greenbugs in your fields be prepared to spray--but do so only after you have positively identified them as pestomologists. Unless you have the greenbug you might be destroying beneficial insects by spraying. There are several other insects--Primarily

## First Grain For Season This Week

Homer Richardson, who farms south of Muleshoe, brought in the first load of wheat which was reported to the Journal. Richardson took his load of wheat to Farmer's Co-op Elevator Saturday afternoon, however, it was not unloaded until Monday morning.

Elevator officials said the wheat had 14 percent moisture.

This week, Richardson has sent in several more loads and the elevator reported receiving more than 20 loads of wheat before the heavy rains which began early Friday morning.

Barring too much rain to prevent combines from moving into the fields, the wheat harvest is expected to be in full swing early next week.

## Rain Report

Reports inside Muleshoe city limits are from two to two and one-half inches of rain, small hail and high winds.

Needmore - three and one-half inches or more and very light hail.

Circleback - five inches, a lot of hail. One strip of land one mile southwest of Circleback a mile wide was reported to be wiped out with the crops beaten down to stubs.

Maple - one and one-half to three inches, with large hail.

Bula - three inches and large, heavy hail in the entire area.

Lazbuddie - one and three-fourths inches and very light hail.

Sudan - four to five inches and heavy hail.

Bovina - two inches in town with up to five in the area. Lot of hail between Bovina and Lariat.

West Camp - one and one-fourth inches of rain, light hail.

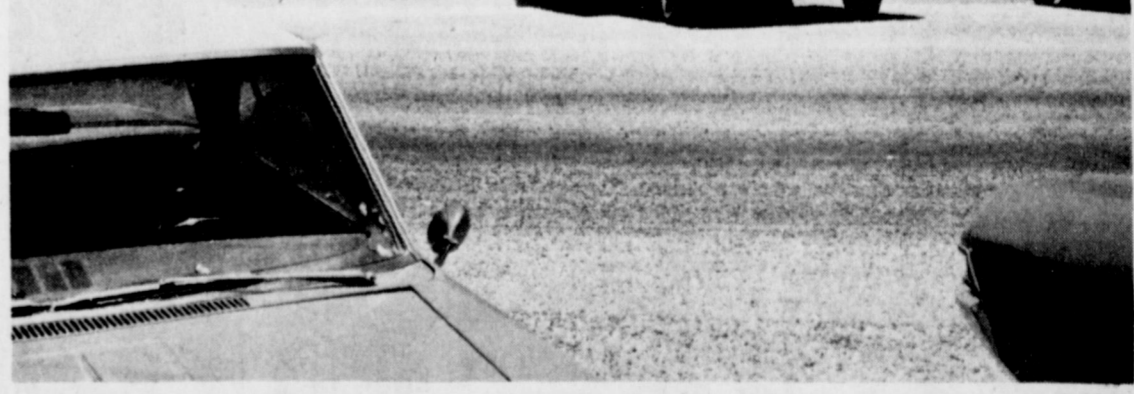
Progress - from one and one-half to two inches, light hail.

Earth - two inches and no hail.

this particular rain will be a double blessing and that dry-land farmers have the right to expect one of their better dry-land crops this year.

Adams said also that a rain at this time, when cotton is 100 percent planted and up will assist cotton to reach the bloom stage before the first irrigation will be needed. Adams cited that cotton research proves water by natural means is more beneficial if cotton can reach the bloom stage before irrigation has to begin.

The county agent found in a field trip Friday that thrips are light and a heavy infestation of aphids in young cotton. He said the cool weather following the rain will build the aphids population, and is expected to all but eliminate thrips from the tender cotton. Aphids are said to injure or damage cotton by removing sap and usually are removed by natural means before extensive damage can be done the cotton. Most of the time, either weather or aphids natural enemies of other insects will remove or control them.

Adams also reported that treated seed was found to be almost clean cotton with thrips

and aphids kept down to a very minimum in numbers. He reported the treated seed cotton to be much healthier than untreated cotton.

Adams also said that heavy irrigation will be stopped temporarily but farmers will be in fields as soon as they can move equipment in to fight sand which is an ever constant problem following heavy rains.

Reporting an excellent range rain, the county agent said range cattle are doing so well that marketing is slow at this time.

Wheat harvest, which was just getting underway this week, has come to a halt until combine

operators will once again be able to get their machinery into the fields. Some baled oats and some baled alfalfa were caught in the Friday downpour.

The rain could do nothing but help the young growth of grain sorghum and the county agent reported sugar beets, castor beans, Irish potatoes, tomatoes, peaches and apricots all to be helped by the rain. He said farmers are fighting voluntary castor beans which are coming up in their fields.

Adams said farmers are hampered by a labor shortage which is not lessening in the area.

Some key identifying characteristics of the greenbug are: a length of about 1/16 inches, a general light green color with a dark green stripe down the back, green legs with black tips, and black cornicle tips (the cornicles are two small tubes at the rear of the body.) There are both winged and wingless greenbugs.

If you do identify a greenbug infestation, how do you decide whether its severe enough to spray?

1. If plants are up to six inches high, spray when there is visible damage with colonies of greenbugs on lower leaf surface.

2. Beyond six inches and up to pre-boot, spray before any entire leaves are killed.

3. From pre-boot on, spray when greenbug numbers are sufficient to cause death of more than the two lower-normal sized leaves.

For spray materials, Wayne Fowler, agronomic education director for DeKalb AgResearch, Inc. reports that the most frequently recommended chemicals are Diazinon, Malathion, Ethyl Parathion, Phosphin and Systox.

Fowler says the Diazinon and Malathion can be applied as a ground spray but that he advises that the other three are highly toxic and should be sprayed from the air. He

warns against using the methyl form of Parathion because of potential damage to the plants.

After first spraying farmers should keep a close watch on their plants and be alert to a reinfestation says Fowler, it may be necessary to spray again. If another application is required, be certain the chemical can be used a second time in a season. Some materials are labeled for one spraying only.

Be certain to check with your local extension personnel or your seed dealer on any questions regarding greenbug infestations and spraying.

Such natural enemies of the greenbug as lady beetles, lacewings and certain wasps species, normally keep greenbugs under control. But with cool, wet weather conditions, greenbugs are able to reproduce faster than these natural enemies can eliminate them. When these weather conditions prevail sorghum growers must be especially watchful.

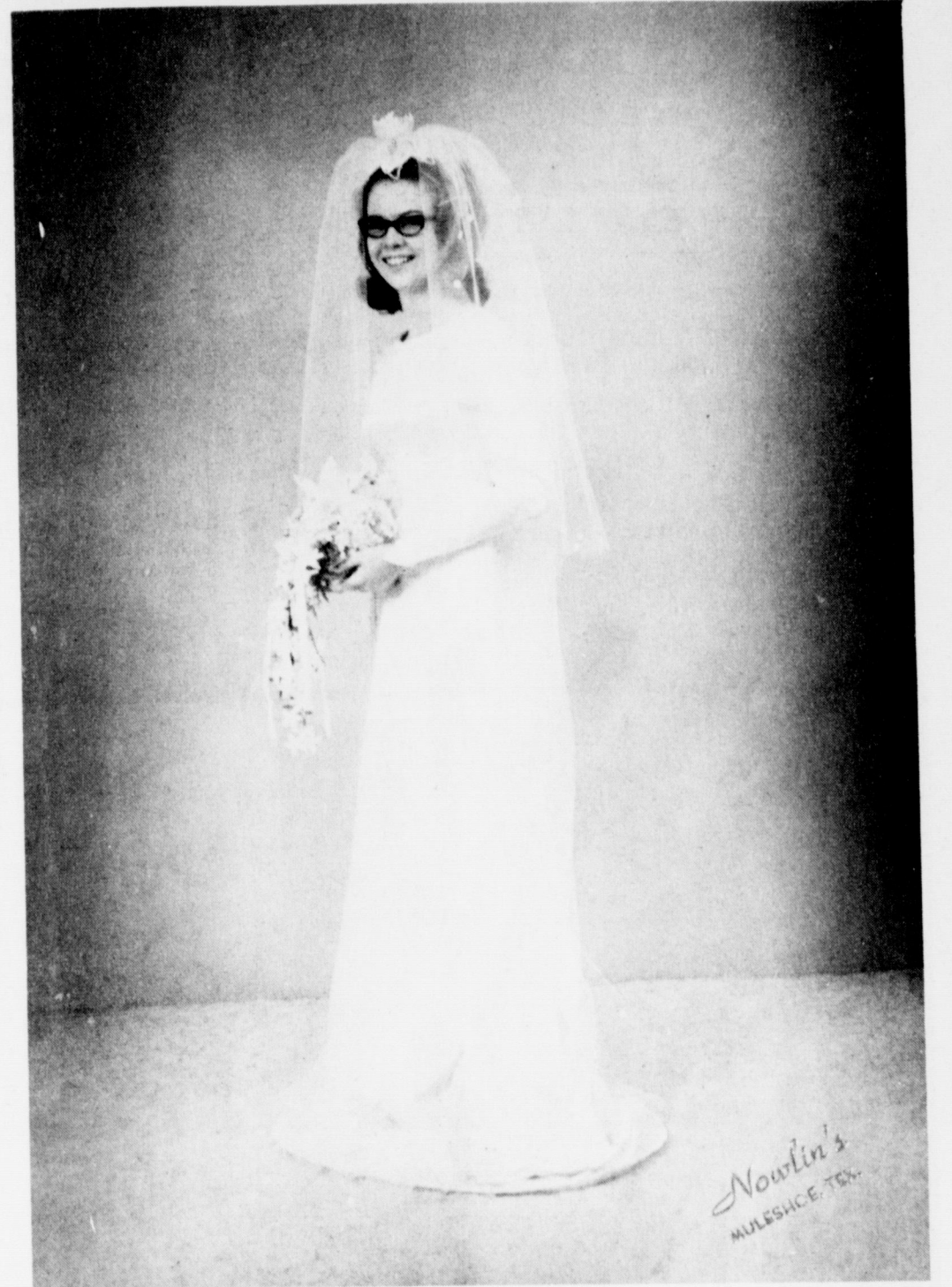
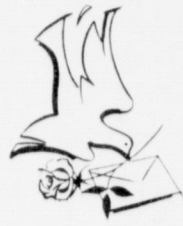

## CWF Installed Officers

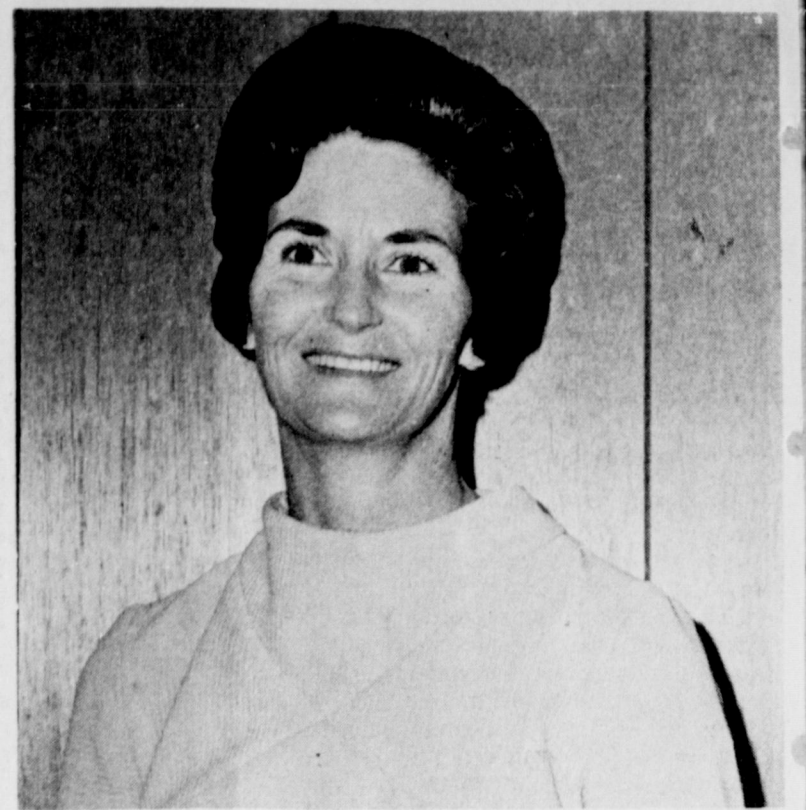

NOTICE OF HEARING ON SPECIAL BENEFITS TO BE RECEIVED FROM PROPOSED STREET IMPROVEMENTS AND ON OTHER MATTERS WITH REFERENCE THERETO WHICH HEARING IS TO BE HELD IN THE CITY HALL OF THE CITY OF MULESHOE, TEXAS, BEGINNING AT 7:30 O'CLOCK P.M. ON THE 7 DAY OF JULY, 1969.

TO ALL OWNERS AND TO ALL PERSONS OWNING OR CLAIMING ANY INTEREST IN OR LIEN UPON ANY PROPERTY ABUTTING THE STREETS AND AVENUES OR PORTIONS THEREOF OF THE CITY OF MULESHOE, TEXAS, HEREINAFTER NAMED, WITHIN THE LIMITS HEREINAFTER SET FORTH, AND TO ALL OTHER INTERESTED PARTIES AND TO THEIR AGENTS AND ATTORNEYS:

You are hereby notified that the City Council of the City of Muleshoe, Texas, has determined the necessity for an ordered improvement of certain streets and avenues or portions thereof hereinafter described within the limits hereinafter defined, the nature of which improvements is hereinafter generally set forth, and that the City of Muleshoe has approved and adopted the es-

imate, statement and report of the City's Engineer and has taken other proceedings with reference to the making of such improvements as of record in the Minutes of the City Council of the City of Muleshoe and has by ordinance ordered that a hearing be held, and notice thereof given, NOW THEREFORE, PURSUANT TO SAID PROCEEDINGS AND SUCH ORDINANCE, NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN:

I. That a hearing shall be given to the owners and to all persons owning or claiming any interest in or lien upon any property abutting the streets and avenues or portions thereof of the City of Muleshoe, Texas, hereinafter named, within the limits hereinafter set out, and to all other interested parties, including their agents and attorneys, before the City Council of the City of Muleshoe, Texas, which hearing shall be held on the 7 day of July, 1969, at 7:30 o'clock p.m. and shall be held in the City Hall of Muleshoe, Texas, at which hearing all of said owners and other interested parties, their agents or attorneys shall have the right to be heard on any matter as to which hearing is a constitutional prerequisite to the validity of any assess-

ment sought to be imposed and to contest the amounts of the proposed assessments, the lien and the liability thereof, of the special benefits to the abutting properties and the owners thereof by means of the improvements for which all of such assessments are to be levied, the accuracy, sufficiency, regularity and validity of the proceedings and contracts in connection with such improvements and proposed assessments, or concerning any matter or thing connected therewith. The said hearing may be continued from time to time and day to day until a fair opportunity for hearing has been afforded to all desiring to contest the said assessments or proceedings, and the City Council shall have the power to and shall correct any errors, inaccuracies, irregularities and invalidities, and shall determine the amount of assessments and all other incidental matters and shall have the power by ordinance to close such hearing, and by the same or by a later ordinance or ordinances to levy such assessments before, during or after the construction of such improvements, but no part of any assessment against abutting properties shall be made to mature prior to acceptance by the

City by ordinance of the improvements abutting the property for which the assessment is levied. It shall not be necessary to levy all of the assessments at one time or by a single ordinance, and said hearing may be closed as to each portion of a street and/or avenue constituting a unit of improvement (as such units are designated below), after a fair opportunity for hearing has been afforded to all desiring to contest the assessments proposed to be levied against the owners and their properties abutting the portion of each such street and avenue constituting a unit of improvement; and the City Council shall then have the power to levy such assessments against such abutting properties and against the owners thereof, as provided herein and in the prior proceedings of the City Council herein referred to.

No assessment will be made against any abutting property or the owner thereof in excess of the special benefits to such property and its owner in the enhanced value thereof by means of such improvements as determined at such hearing. All of such owners, claimants and other interested parties, their agents or attorneys, are hereby referred for further information to the proceedings with

reference to said improvements on file and/or of record with the City Secretary of the City of Muleshoe and particularly to the estimate of the City's Engineer, and to the proposed assessment roll wherein the exact amount proposed to be assessed against each abutting property and the owner thereof is set forth; said City's Engineer's estimate and said proposed assessment roll being on file in the office of the City Secretary.

II. The nature of the improvements for which assessments are proposed to be levied and to which this notice relates is the filling, grading, raising, paving or repaving said streets and avenues or portions thereof in a permanent manner, and by the construction or reconstruction and the realigning of curbs and gutters where there are no existing curbs and gutters which can be utilized in whole or in part in the opinion of the City Engineer and by reconstructing and realigning existing curbs and gutters which can be utilized in whole or in part in the opinion of the City Engineer, and by the construction of such other necessary incidentals and appurtenances as the City's Engineer has found to be necessary or advisable, all as shown by the plans and

specifications of the City's Engineer, and by widening where necessary so as to attain the paved width from back of curb which is set out below, said paving to consist of the construction of an adequate asphaltic wearing surface on an adequate base, the exact nature of such improvements being more particularly shown in the plans and specifications which are on file in the office of the City Secretary of the City of Muleshoe.

III. The streets and avenues or portions thereof to be improved within the limits fixed by the City Council are listed below as they have been divided by the City Council into separate and distinct improvement units. There is stated in connection with the listing of each street and avenue or portion thereof within the limits herein defined constituting each improvement unit the estimated amount or amounts per front foot to be assessed against the owner or owners of properties abutting such street and avenue or portion thereof and against such properties, the estimated total cost of the improvements as to each improvement unit.

There is included in the estimated amount to be assessed against abutting properties and

the owners thereof a proportionate part of all costs incidental to the construction of the improvements.

The designation of such streets and avenues or portions thereof and such other information is as follows: Below.

The City reserves the right to omit the improvements to entire units or blocks therein where one or more properties therein are exempt from the lien of the assessment and the owners fail or refuse to execute valid mechanic's lien contracts fixing valid contractual liens against such properties, or to otherwise secure the payment of their share of the costs of such improvements, and any such omissions will not invalidate the lien or liability or assessments made against the properties abutting any streets and avenues or portions thereof of being improved.
