Pioneer Henry Pipkin Claimed by Death

STRANGER death, came to Matador Wednesday morning when Henry F. Pipkin, who was always friendly to all, died at 7:30 a. m. in St. Luke's hospital where he had been in the past two weeks. He was 78 years old.

Funeral services will be held at 2 o'clock in the afternoon at the Methodist Church where Pipkin had worshipped. The building was constructed of which he was a member of the Board of Stewards.

L. W. Tucker will officiate assisted by Rev. W. B. Tucker, retired Methodist minister. Burial will be in East Matador Cemetery following Masonic rites. Eudora Funeral Home will be in charge of arrangements, and the casket will be carried by Pat Sheridan, Stearns, Curtis Graham, McLaughlin, Homer T. Jenkins and Emmet Jenkins.

Matador and West Texas has one of its best known and most beloved pioneers.

Henry F. Pipkin was born April 26, 1881 at Falcon, Ark. and came here at the age of 17. He had never married. He was a barber by trade and active for 52 years.

Mr. Pipkin is survived by one sister, Mrs. Leta Poteet of Matador and two brothers, George Pipkin of Crosbyton and Bush Pipkin of McAdoo, also a number of nephews and nieces.

The pioneer Matador citizen served as Justice of the Peace of Precinct one for 30 years. He was reelected last year but did not qualify because of his failing health.

Charter member and past President of the Matador Lions Club, Henry Pipkin was recognized in this region and by Lions International as truly "living Lionism." During his active life he was always among the first in any civic or charity project. He gave generously of all he possessed. About five years ago he decided to the Lions Club a portion of his home yard on which is located a barbecue pit constructed by the club.

A public meeting in the interest of establishing rural telephone service in Motley and Dickens counties, will be held here Tuesday, May 26, in the District Court room, it was announced last week by Mrs. Bob Martin. The meeting will start at 8 p. m.

The meeting will be conducted by James Wright, manager of the Cap Rock Rural Telephone Cooperative. The meeting is open to the public and a full discussion of the rural telephone program will be heard.

The Star-Telegram last week said the Cap Rock Rural Telephone Co-operative had purchased the Southwestern Bell Telephone exchange in Spur and has a \$550,000 REA loan approved.

County Outlook Is Improved By Rains

RAINFALL that blanketed Motley County and trade area in varying degrees last week has improved the general outlook and brought a new impetus to the already highly favorable economic position. Measured rainfall in Matador was more than 3 inches officially for the week, with Roaring Springs reporting about 2 1/2 inches. Some areas received much less, but from reports it is believed that one to two inches might be considered general for the entire county.

This week farmers are busy planting or getting fields in condition to plant. Many found their soil too wet to plow earlier in the week.

Range conditions are excellent, according to ranchers. Grass is growing rapidly and in most instances there is an abundance of water in tanks and water holes.

More rainfall is needed to effect complete recovery from the long drought period which began in September last year. Except in isolated instances, however, there is sufficient rainfall for immediate needs.

Land and cattle prices remain high with no immediate prospect of any drastic change in the market.

Locally, the outlook is good. One observer has said that it is probable Matador faces the brightest prospects in its history. The continued expansion of the Roaring Springs oil fields has enhanced the position of that community.

The selling of the former Matador Land & Cattle Co. is certain to bring more business to Matador and Roaring Springs. The continued search for oil and gas in the northwest section of the county is reflected in new leases and interest being shown by major companies.

Currently Matador is growing at a healthy pace. Several new homes are under contract and more in prospect. Higginbotham-Bartlett Company here has almost completed extensive improvement and modernization program. Jameson Machinery Company has completed modern new shops on State Highway 70 at the southwest corner of town.

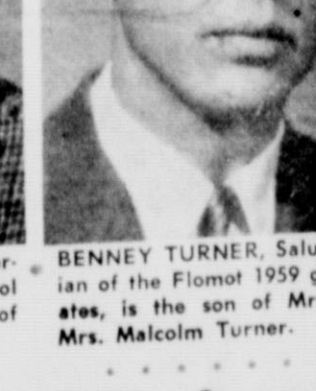

Roaring Springs Seniors are Warned of Failure of Lives Not Dependent on God

"The frightening thing about life is that a certain percent of the thousands of high school graduates are going to be failures in life," Roaring Springs High School seniors were told Sunday night in Baccalaureate Services.

The speaker was Rev. James R. Moore, pastor of the First Baptist Church of Roaring Springs.

Taking as his subject, "A Life to Live," Rev. Moore used as a text, II Sam. 18:18, which concerned Absalom, the son of David.

"Absalom wanted to be a man of authority," Rev. Moore pointed out, "but he failed because he left God out of his life. . . he had no reverence for himself or for others, or for God. . . men whose ambition ends with themselves often discover that their ambition ends them. Absalom as a young man had everything that he could hope to have to be a success, but he failed. He failed because he did not have a purpose in life; he failed because he was selfish."

"The tomb of Absalom speaks of the failures and disappointments of a life which is not built upon God. . . it was Wendell Phillips who said, 'Some men struggle into oblivion, while others forget themselves into immortality.'"

About Your Health

Five Texas babies—all less than one year old—smothered in their sleep last year in freakish accidents involving disposable sheets of plastic material.

The thin, adhesive plastic is in common use today for purposes ranging from packaging laundry and cleaning to making back yard hothouses.

The deaths grimly accentuate the growing danger of using the lightweight materials to protect bedding on a baby's crib.

An eight month old boy died in Irving on June 7 during his morning nap. He was discovered with his head covered by a makeshift plastic crib sheet. The immediate cause of death was said to be suffocation.

In Victoria on September 28 a five month old boy smothered under similar circumstances

when he pulled a plastic sheet over his face.

A four month old Freeport girl suffocated on July 12 when she rolled over in her crib into a plastic bag.

On August 16 a seven month old Hamlin girl smothered when she became entangled in a plastic sheet thrown over her bed to protect the bedding.

A plastic crib cover inadvertently pulled over his head caused the suffocation death on November 26 of a four month old Tyler boy.

Disposable sheets of plastic have been boons to busy mothers of infants because of time saved in laundering bedding. But the only safe plastic bedding pro-

ductor is the type made especially for that purpose—mattress or tucked under a cleaning bag together in a sheet can be fatal for a baby.

To prove the point, one of the bags the laundry to package shirts. Although perfect for that use, note the clings to human skin.

Hold it to your face. How quickly and effectively it throttles your breath when you inhale. Imagine that happening to an infant lying helplessly in its crib.
