be impossible to you." Matt. 17:20. History of West Texas is replete with crisis. It is a land of contrasting climates, variable rainfalls, unpredictable weather; a land that has known years of great bounty and many of extreme scarcity. Its pioneers recognized and accepted its challenges.

Harry Campbell, President of the First State Bank, and oldest native resident of Motley county says the years of 1892 and 1893 were years of great drouth that drove away many of the country's new settlers. He was a boy attending Matador's first school, located approximately at the present site of Eudy-Seale Funeral Home. Most of the area around the school was a prairie dog town. He, and other boys, would catch prairie dogs with their hands because the little animals were too poor to run. They were starving to death. Northeast in an area between the Math Patton home and the river, the sand and soil was blown away from mesquite grubs until it was easy to load a wagon in a short time. Prairie dog dens in this windswept section stood up high above the ground because of the packed. hard soil. There was no money except the less than 90c per day paid to the fortunate who held ranch jobs, and the small bounty paid by the county on jack rabbit and coyote scalps. But the rains came again and the land flourished and the settlers returned. They had faith in the country which they were eventually able to subdue sufficiently to make homes and rear their families. History shows that this country has had more drouth years than "good years" and that water has always been its greatest problem.

Drouthy lands have used irrigation since 5000 years before the birth of Christ. Here in our own area pioneer Mexican settlements near Quitaque realized that irrigation was essential to survival and produced crops from the sweet, pure waters flowing from beneath the Cap Rock. Many sections of the west and Texas have long recognized drouth as something the people would be forced to live with, and accepting the problem, met it with irrigation. Great cities have risen out of the desert, and they have strong, stable economies. Los Angeles and all of Southern California is a desert, as is much of Arizona, New Mexico, Utah and the Rio Grande Valley of Texas. The fabulous Plains at our door, never made any progress until the advent of irrigation. The great wealth of water under the Plains was untapped for half a century after the country was settled.

Adversity frequently becomes a blessing. The condition which the non-irrigated areas of West Texas face today could have been less severe if we had established a greater respect and interest in irrigation. Dams across our creeks and rivers and more wells is the long range answer to our problem. The immediate answer is to keep faith in the country, and work collectively as a family facing a problem, to increase the

Rains will return as they have in the past, but the lesson we are learning today should be remembered. Our problem is a thousand times less crucial than it was to our pioneers. They had the courage to face the uncharted tomorrows; to leave us a legacy of experience and a pattern for the future. Faith.

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




