City's First Male Beautician Finds His Career Challenging

There is a lot more to being a beauty operator than rolling and combing hair, James Earl Jackson believes. As the city's first male hair dresser, James fulfills a life-long ambition with his work at Modern Beauty Shop.

Son of Mr. and Mrs. Johnny Jackson, James was born in Poteau, Oklahoma, August 18, 1948. "Ever since I was a child, I have been amazed with the many ways hair can be arranged and wanted to have something to do with it. I used to comb my mother's," he recalls.

As he grew older, the decision to stick by his career preference became more difficult as he encountered dismy and disparaging taunts from his peers "because it was considered sissy." "Then I decided one could not let criticism stand in the way if he wanted to do something; so after graduation I enrolled in Jessie Lee's," he stated. James did not enter the preparatory school with no knowledge of his career responsibilities. He had done a research theme on a career in hair dressing as a high school junior "but still did not think I could become one."

After graduation in May of 1966 from Matador High School, James entered Jessie Lee's Institute of Hair Design in Lubbock in August and found himself completely surrounded by women. He was the only boy in a class of 50. The school is divided into three levels - Junior, Senior and Advanced Senior. After completing the required number of styles on his manikin in a month and a half, the trainee was promoted to senior. He made the move from senior to advanced senior ahead of the usual time and then spent three months perfecting important styling techniques. "You don't actually dress a head of hair until you're a senior," he said. "You just apply color, give permanents, roll, learn to give manicures, study facial contours, etc."

The young beautician holds two awards from Jessie Lee's. The awards are for completing with excellence a specified number of styles using wigs and for cutting. Following his graduation from the institute and his licensing by the state board, James worked for Mademoiselle in Lubbock. He was later employed at the Toga in Plano before coming to Matador.

"There is a challenge in every head of hair you do," he commented as he shaped the neckline of Vicki Jameson's London boy cut. "I like the way women in Matador try new cuts and styles," he added. The life of a man in a predominantly woman's world is a bit different.

difficult James concedes. He believes that women come to the beauty shop to relax completely. "I sometimes feel out of place. I think it makes the women act differently to have a man around," he said. There have also been some embarrassing accidents in the business for James. "Once the cold water went off and I didn't know it and really burned the woman's head. You should have seen everyone coming out from under the dryers when she screamed."

However, no one ever looked more suited to his surroundings or more satisfied with his work. Tying a drying net over Miss Jameson's hair, James continued, "I don't feel as if men are better than women at dressing hair, for one thing, most men are slower, but I do believe women like a man to dress their hair because he takes a greater interest in the way the style looks on them. Sometimes I like a style that the customer doesn't but if the customer also says she likes it, it makes me happy because I have pleased her as well as myself."

Is this going to be James' work? "I don't know. I would like to have something else to do but I don't know what. Sometimes I dream of being on big name people and being like George Masters is one of the most popular stylists and he excludes all but the rich. I think then, James' love minute of it because it's a minute."

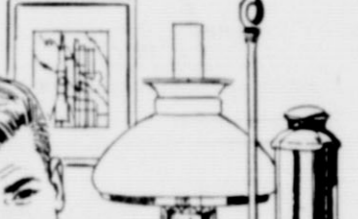

in crime in Texas since the Youth conference began five years ago, under the direction of Waggoner Carr, former attorney general of Texas, she pointed out. Following service in the chambers of the Texas House of Representatives, the honorable Ben Barnes, speaker of the house, addressed the group. His speech emphasized the importance of youth in keeping the state and nation strong, Miss Tilson said.

W. C. Palmeyer, a major in the U.S. Army Reserves, who recently returned from Ft. Hood, where he had spent the past 19 days speaking to soldiers who were to be shipped overseas, made a statement on his work. "We were trying to teach them how to cooperate with the civilian population in other countries where they might find themselves stationed," Palmeyer said.
