Citation By Publication

THE STATE OF TEXAS

To the Sheriff or any Constable of Motley County—Greeting:
You are hereby commanded to summon Frank Cates by making publication of this Citation once in each week for four consecutive weeks previous to the return day hereof, in some newspaper published in your County, to appear at the next regular term of the 110th District Court of Motley County, to be held at the Court House thereof, in Matador, Texas, on the 4th Monday in July A. D. 1936, the same being the 27th day of July A. D. 1936, then and there to answer a petition filed in said Court on the 23rd day of May A. D. 1936, is a suit, numbered on the docket of said Court as No. 947, wherein Winnie Cates is Plaintiff, and Frank Cates is Defendant, and said petition alleging:

That on or about the 27th day of October, 1933, Plaintiff was duly and legally married to defendant in the State of Georgia and continued to live with him as his wife until about the 1st day of December, 1935.

Plaintiff has been an actual bona-fide inhabitant of the State of Texas for a period of 12 months and has resided in said County of Motley, where this suit is filed, a period of six months next preceding the filing thereof.

At all times while married to defendant, plaintiff conducted herself with propriety, doing her duty as a wife, has at all times treated defendant with kindness and forbearance and has been guilty of no act bringing about or causing the hereinafter described acts, omissions and conditions on defendants part.

Defendant disregarding the solemnity of his marriage vows and his obligations to treat plaintiff with kindness and attention within about one year after their said marriage commenced a course of unkind, harsh and tyrannical conduct toward plaintiff which continued with very slight intermission, until plaintiff finally separated from defendant on or about the 1st day of December, 1935. On divers occasions while plaintiff lived with defendant aforesaid, defendant was guilty of excesses, cruel treatment and outrages toward plaintiff of such a nature as to render their living together insupportable.

Defendant is a man of violent passions and of ungovernable temper and during the year 1935 would often get drunk, curse and abuse plaintiff. Would go away at times and stay away for several days and would not let plaintiff know of his whereabouts, leaving her destitute to provide for herself as best she could. Plaintiff picked cotton during the months of October and November, 1935 to get money to buy her some clothes and defendant got drunk, took her money and left the country, and has not offered to support her or to provide any means of support and she has been forced to go to the home of her father for his protection and support.

That said conduct on the part of defendant toward this plaintiff has caused her great mental anguish and worry and the said cruel treatment has rendered their further living together insupportable, premises considered.

That during said marriage there were no children born as issue of said marriage; that Plaintiff's maiden name before she was married to defendant was Winnie Johnson and it is her desire that she be restored to her maiden name.

WHEREFORE plaintiff prays that defendant be cited to answer this petition; that on final hearing plaintiff have judgment of divorce dissolving the marriage between plaintiff and defendant and that she be restored to her maiden name, Winnie Johnson, and for such other and further

relief as the Court shall deem proper to grant.

Herein Fail Not, and have before said Court, at its aforesaid next regular term, showing how you have executed the same.

ways been, and the water superintendent appointed by the city council and under its supervisions.

The city council was never called on until the recent election to take any action on this ordinance before an election was held. But for several good reasons for the good of the city the council thought best as it had an investment in our present water superintendent in schooling and other experiences to keep him as long as he performed his duties satisfactorily.

Therefore about sixty days or more before election we notified the public, and those

entering the race of this ordinance to really keep down this misunderstanding after the election was over and to fully inform anyone that might be elected city secretary what they could expect.

There are many reasons why the city council feels that the water superintendent job should not be elective. Some are:

It is not practicable to turn over machinery such as the city owns to an inexperienced person regardless of who they are.

A water superintendent cannot conduct business of the water department on a business basis as it should, playing politics.

A water superintendent is not usually elected by any city. The state requests and probably will soon require a licensed water superintendent. This we now have.

The council wants the public to know that the action taken was only what we thought best for the good of the city and was in no way a personal matter and it was the intention of the council to prevent a misunderstanding when notice was published in this paper before the election.

INLAND TOWN

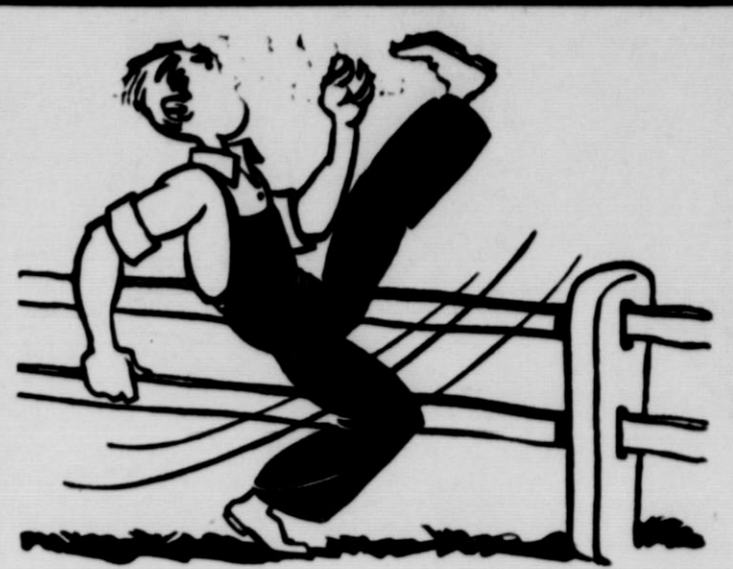
Sentiment is a splendid thing although it rarely has but little commercial value. When the last train whistles in Matador within the next few days and the echo hurries to join companions in the oblivion of space, it will, perhaps, bring a shadow of regret to some hearers, because many people in Matador have placed more than their efforts, time and money in the hopeless venture of rail service—they have also given of their visions, dreams and possibly, prayers. But in a few days the obligation will be forever paid—even the last installment of loyalty to the dead nerve of a tottering industry. When the chronic sore on the shoulders of progress is removed, then the journey to greater advancement will be made with reduced effort.

We of the hair and teeth molting age have considerable difficulty in accepting the truth. We have not a single logical reason why Matador should need a rail service such as it has endured for the past ten years, except back in our hearts we have a fear of the obsolete term "Inland Town". A railroad can do nothing but offer transportation, yet many young men and women who will have control of Matador tomorrow, have never ridden on a train and they see trucks the size of a box car unloading merchandise to local stores—they are not worried about Matador's future transportation problem. They know that the very best service and the most inexpensive service in Matador's history, is now available. Anything that can be moved, can now be moved more quickly and with less expense than ever before. The passenger and freight depots have been moved into the very heart of town and rates will be equal and less than those ever offered by the rail company.

We have for years been forced to tolerate antiquated mail service, comparable only to the past decade when transportation of the post was effected by means of a mail-hack driven across the country. Now that the debt to the railroad is paid for all time, it is within the providence of this aggressive and enterprising community to secure mail service affiliated with the future instead of the past. It will require effort, collective determination, time and perhaps some expense, but all worthwhile things have price tags.

Matador can have anything it wants. Its foundation is imbedded in the rock of character and justice, with structural unity of purpose and desire raising to outstanding proportions, incidentally colored with individualism that is without parallel. That which is within the vision of its people becomes a reality through the miracle of cooperation.

So when the train whistles and turns back to the attic to join the relics essential to another age, Matador will move forward into a new era of progress, made possible by faster, surer wheels--an inland town moving to town with the dispatch of a traveler on his way and knowing where he is going.
