

With the abandonment of rail service to Matador, local merchants will be benefited to the extent of lower freight rates than ever before, thus making possible lower prices, and making Matador a better town.

More important, however, will be the improved service to be obtained by truck over the high-speed hard surfaced roads to the principal wholesale centers.

It is also important that Matador will be the home of families—probably ten to one employed by the railroad—of those employed by trucking concerns. We will also have an express office and a truck depot, giving equal or better service than the railroad.




Sentiment is a splendid thing although it rarely has but little commercial value. 
