Mrs. A. T. Swebston, 76, lifetime resident of Floyd County and a member of the pioneer Lewis family, died Thursday, August 31 in University Hospital in Lubbock.

Services were held on Friday, Sept. 1 at 3 p.m. in First Methodist Church, Floydada and burial was in Floyd County Memorial Park with Moore-Rose Funeral Home in charge of arrangements.

Mrs. Swebston was a member of the Order of Eastern Star in Floydada and a member of First Methodist Church in Matador. She and her husband had attended church services here on Sunday preceding her death, which was attributed to a heart attack.

The former Mary Lewis was born in Floyd County Dec. 18, 1890. She attended school in Floydada and Matador and was married September 24, 1910, to A. T. Swebston, widely known Floyd County rancher.

Besides her husband, she is survived by a son, Herschel Swebston of Floydada; four daughters, Anne Swebston, Mrs. Vance Campbell and Mrs. Bill Colston all of Floydada, and Mrs. Bob Burns of Amarillo; a brother, Charlie Lewis of Floydada; four sisters, Mrs. Virginia Conner and Mrs. Minnie Smart of Floydada, Mrs. Henry Sayles of Abilene and Mrs. Greene Bostick of Matador; and seven grandchildren.

With an anticipated continuing teacher shortage, TEA expects an increase in the number of teaching aides employed to do clerical and other non-teaching tasks. Nearly 5,000 of these aides are expected to be employed over the state, compared with 4,317 in 1966-67.

While enrollment continues to grow, some observers have noted that the two per cent increase this year is not nearly as dramatic as the increase in prior years.

Grades one to six will enroll approximately 1,418,000 pupils and grades seven to 12 about 1,179,000.

CITY SALES TAX—A dozen Texas cities—including Austin—are rushing into special elections on the new one per cent local option sales tax which became legal on August 28.

Here's what the big hurry is all about: Local levies approved in elections this month will be collectible January 1. Elections after October 1 would not provide money in the till until April.

Thirty days' notice is necessary to call elections—either by order of city governing bodies or in response to petition by citizens.

First cities to vote on the sales tax will be Elgin and El Paso. Their elections will be held on September 27.

Aransas, Paig, Corpus Christi, Electra, Henrietta, Nacogdoches, Orange Grove, Texarkana and Wichita Falls will vote September 28.

Voters in Austin and Taylor will go to the polls on September 30.

CONNALLY UNDECIDED—Gov. John Connally returned from his African hunting expedition undecided whether he wants to travel Texas campaign trails again.

He told reporters that he may take several weeks or even months to make up his mind whether to seek a fourth term.

Lieut. Gov. Preston Smith says he will run for Governor whether Connally does or not.

Other candidates said to be considering 1968 races are "Don" Yarbrough of Houston, a liberal who has opposed Connally twice. He may run for the gubernatorial post again next year.

Former Sen. Franklin Spears of San Antonio, who may run for lieutenant governor.

"House speaker Ben Barnes who is ready to announce for lieutenant governor if Connally runs again and for governor if Connally retires.

SCHOOL ORDERS ISSUED—Education Commissioner J. W. Edgar has upheld a Harlingen school board order closing Wilson Elementary School at Primera (Cameron County) and requiring transportation of 200 pupils to Stewart School, Harlingen, and Dishman School, Combes.

Edgar overruled transfer from the Gilmer to the Gladewater Independent School district of 45 pupils who live in what used to be East Mountain District which recently consolidated with Gilmer. Parents brought suit to block the consolidation claiming Gilmer schools were inaccessible to their children.

SHORT SNORTS— Acting Governor Preston Smith ordered a special election for November 11 to replace Rep. Jesse T. George of Levelland, who resigned effective September 5 to accept a Washington post as congressional liaison officer with the Small Business Administration.

NEW LAWS EFFECTIVE—Major new laws went into effect within the last week. Among the most significant: "Medicaid" implementing act to provide free medical benefits to 350,000 Texans on welfare rolls. "Minimum age for drivers increased to 16."

Credit Available For Recreation Center in County

Credit for financing well planned community-backed outdoor recreation centers is available in Motley and Floyd counties through the Farmers Home Administration supervised loan program.

Alfred A. Harrison, the agency's county supervisor, with offices at Floydada and Matador, this week described some of the various kinds of projects that have been financed by Farmers Home Administration loans in rural areas. He said these loans are proving to be one of America's most effective rural areas development tools. Some communities have been able to attract new industry because of their new recreation projects.

Community recreation projects financed by Farmers Home Administration includes fishing and boating and swimming facilities; sports, camping and picnicking areas; vacation farms, travel trailer parks, vacation cabins and cottages; hunting preserves; and golf courses.

"Rural communities," he said, "that can boast a new swimming pool, an attractive public park, a golf course or other such recreation facility have a very important asset in the fierce competition to attract new businesses and industry."

"One rural community in eastern North Carolina that borrowed \$100,000 to build a golf course, swimming pool and tennis courts in 1963 attracted two industries that now employ 450 people. The plant managers have frankly stated that they chose the community because of the recreation facilities it provided their employees," he pointed out.

Any group who applies to the Farmers Home Administration for credit assistance will have available to them the knowledge that the agency has gained financing approximately 1,100 recreation projects throughout the country.

Complete information on loans to community groups for recreation purposes along with details about technical assistance in developing the project can be obtained from Mr. Harrison at his office, 107 West California, Floydada, Texas 79235.

AUSTIN, Tex.—With the tolling of school bells, some 2,598,000 students are back in Texas classrooms. Enrollment is 42,900 more than last year.

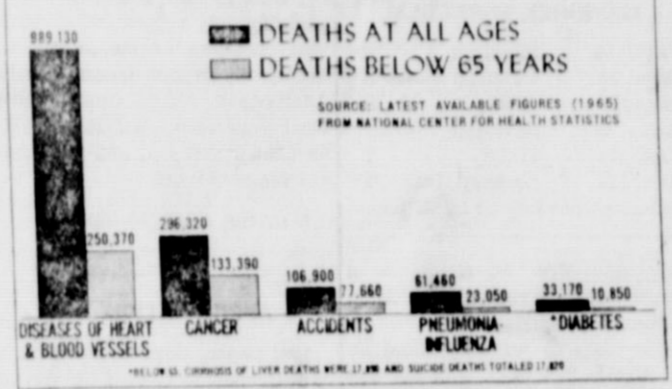
An estimated 122,000 professional people (teachers, principals, and superintendents) are required in the 1,275 school districts in Texas.

Texas State Teachers Association reported a month ago that there were only 450 applications for 1,951 vacancies.

Texas Education Agency estimates \$1,350,300,000 will be spent on public school education in 1967-68. This is a four per cent, or \$55,700,000, increase over last year.

During the coming year, Texas will be spending \$505 for each pupil. Average cost per child for 1966-67 was \$479.
