## Civic Pride Grows As Creek Improved

CIVIC PRIDE has been enhanced in the heart of almost every resident of Matador by the extensive and almost unbelievable improvements made along the banks of Hackberry branch of Ballard Creek.

Cars continue to drive over the area with residents admiring the changes made in the creek that had collected debris and suffered neglect for more than half a century.

Many thousands of yards of dirt have been moved and rearranged to smooth the banks of the creek. The course has been changed in places and holes filled in to eliminate the contaminated water condition near the North Main Street bridge. The entire area has the appearance of an attractive park.

Some golf enthusiasts have seen possibilities of converting part of the creek area into a golf course, but the suggestion would have many complications, including financing and the acquisition of the many lots resting in private ownership.

The work was started as a project of the Lions Club but the "driving force" has rested in two men, Lions President and City Councilman Freddie Welling, and County Commissioner Clyde Gilbert. Many others have contributed time, equipment and effort. Two or more residents have contributed cash in furthering the work.

Leon Al Watson, manager of El Matador Travel Center, experienced "Cat" driver, donated two or three days work. In seeding the entire area, it is planned to keep all the vegetation mowed. It is expected that some washing may result in the event of heavy rainfall, but it is believed modern equipment can keep it under control until faults are eliminated.

**Seeded in Rye**  
Givens Lawrence has donated the labor to seed the creek in rye. Leon J. M. Hill donated the rye seed. Good rains will test the extensive grading and bring up the rye to cover smooth soils in Matador's most extensive civic project in the city's history.

## Former Supt. Here Claimed by Death

A former Matador School superintendent, A. J. Spangler, 78, died Sunday, Oct. 11 at Stephenville, Texas, and funeral services were held there at 10 a.m. Monday in First Methodist Church.

Mr. Spangler was superintendent here two terms, 1925-27, and will be remembered by many former pupils. He joined Tarleton State College in 1928 as area supervisor of vocational agriculture. He became director in 1935, went on modified service in 1951 and retired in 1956.

He was one of the first organizers of FFA chapters in the state, and originated the first FFA judging contest. He also compiled the official handbook of the Texas Association of FFA, "Handbook on Meats for Future Farmers."

He is survived by his wife and a sister, Miss Irma Spangler of Lawrence, Kansas.

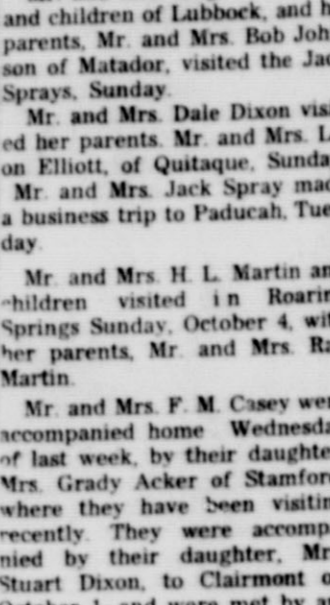
