Cotton Platform Being Enlarged

The Panhandle Compress and Warehouse Co. is making its cotton platform fifty feet longer and building a shed over the entire length. It will now be 275 feet long and 56 feet wide, giving 15400 sq. ft. of storage. An office and classing room of 12 by 20 feet dimensions is also being built. Large double windows have been installed thus giving plenty of light for grading and classing which will be done in the office.

According to Manager Clyde Henderson, who was in charge of the work last year, 30 bales of cotton were received at the platform; 10 from Matador and 20 from Afton. The cotton from Matador was classed for Government loan. 8 bales were good middling; 2 bales were strict middling, 7-8 in. staple. The 20 bales from Afton were shipped out.

SEVEN BALES GINNED

Seven bales of cotton were received at each of the gins in Roaring Springs last week. With continued warm dry weather both gins will soon be running at capacity rate.


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

INCH OF RAIN ON TERRACE WORTH \$3.69 PER ACRE

COLLEGE STATION, Each inch of rainfall held on the land by contour rows and level terraces resulted in an extra new income of \$3.69 per acre, an 11-year test has shown.

In 1927, at the request of M. R. Bently, agricultural engineer of the Texas A and M college extension service, and others, the agricultural experiment station set up at the substation at Spur, under the direction of R. E. Diekson, two comparable 10-acre fields one of which was terraced and the other with the rows running down the slope.

The blocks consisted of Abilene clay loam soil with a slope of six inches in 100 feet. The terraces were of the level type spaced at vertical intervals of 12 inches and had the ends closed to hold the water.

Measuring devices installed at the bottom of the slope revealed that there was no runoff from the terraced field while there was an 11-year accumulated runoff of 23.36 inches, or an average of 2.12 inches a year, from the un-terraced area.

The terraced field, over the 11-year period, returned an annual average of 66.1 pounds of lint and 123 pounds of seed per acre above the yield of the second area. Figured at 10 cents a pound for cotton and \$20 a ton for seed, the increased yield had an average value of \$7.84 a year.
