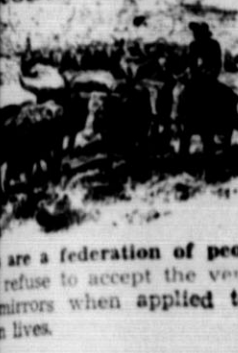

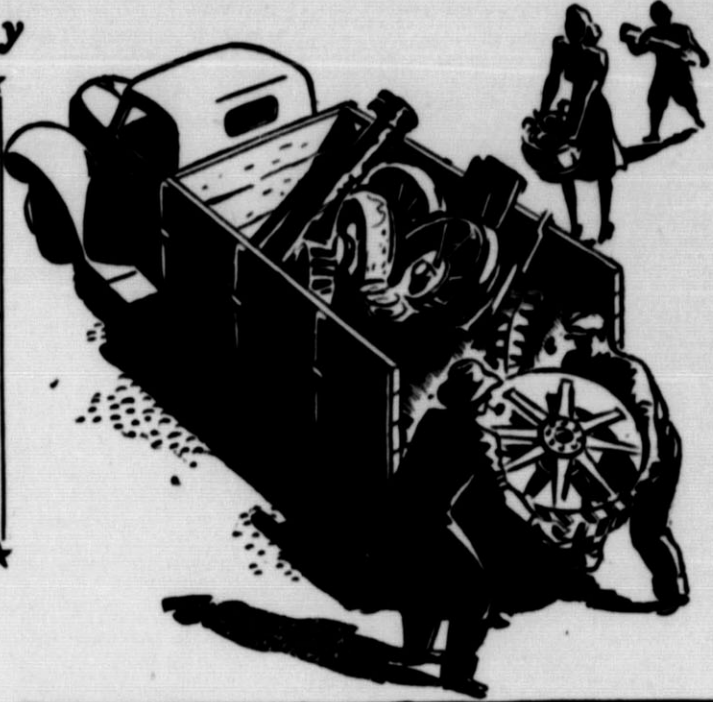

Mulkey, recently of Richland, in charge of the singing and young people's work. Rev. Mulkey has accepted the pastorate at Meridian, left vacant when Rev. Carroll resigned to come to Matador.

Brittain of Plainview, aged retired minister and third pastor of the Matador Baptist Church, was present and was to have appeared on the afternoon program, but received a message just preceding the morning worship, that his wife had suffered a stroke and was in a critical condition, which necessitated his immediate return home.

Celebrating their Golden wedding anniversary, Mr. and Mrs. A. D. Beauchamp were honored at their ranch home near here Tuesday evening, August 18, with a barbecue which was arranged by their children, all of whom were present.

Relatives and friends from over a wide section gathered to join the host of local friends present for the occasion. Many of these had been neighbors and associates of the pioneer couple ever since they came to Motley county at the turn of the century.

Favors of white bells with the wording, "Dud" and "Victoria," "August 18, 1892" and "August 18, 1942," printed in gold and tied with white ribbon, were pinned on the guests as they registered. The Golden Anniversary book, which was designed by Mrs. Frank Pohl, was in the shape of a bell, made of white satin and topped with white and gold ribbon. Inside in gold lettering, was the poem, "Home."

**Daughter Shares Honors**

The table was laid with a white and gold cloth and had as a centerpiece, a three tiered wedding cake, topped with a miniature bride and groom. At one end of the table was a birthday cake for Mr. and Mrs. Beauchamp's youngest daughter, Mrs. J. H. McNabb, (Lucille) of Quanah, Texas, who shared their honors by celebrating her birthday on the same day. At the opposite end of the table was a bouquet of marigolds and tulle roses which were a gift to the bride and groom.

Miss Billie Lawrence, granddaughter of the honored couple extended a word of greeting to the friends present and congratulations to the guests of honor, Mr. and Mrs. Beauchamp and Mrs. McNabb, just before the "bride" cut the wedding cake.

The bride of fifty years ago was lovely in a dress of blue crepe with a corsage of asters, tied appropriately with gold ribbon.

**Married In Jack County**

"Dud" Beauchamp, as he is more familiarly known, first came to Motley county in 1890 as a cow-puncher for the late A. B. Echols, who was moving his cattle here at that time. He returned to Jack County, however, and in 1892 married Miss Victoria Lavada Kennedy, and they continued to make that their home until 1899.

when they decided to move to Motley county.

The tedious trip required three weeks to make, including a ten-day stop at the cattle quarantine line in Knox county. Since they were bringing their cattle with them, Mrs. Beauchamp drove the covered wagon and he, the cattle. They filed on a section of land near Teepee creek and built a dugout for their first home. Lumber hauled from Quanah was used to cover it.

The couple lived in Quanah from 1918 to 1929 and during that time both were active in the advancement of that community. Mr. Beauchamp's name is among those on the stone plaque of the city hall building. Digressing from his ranching interests during this period, Mr. Beauchamp experienced success in several oil transactions in and around Wichita Falls.

**Returns To Motley**

His love for ranching re-asserting itself over his other triumphs, he returned to Motley county and has since devoted himself to that industry. He raises Hereford beef cattle both at Matador and on the Beauchamp ranch in Moore county.

In reminiscence, the couple recall that when they were married, the officiating minister received a hog for his services. Two years later, when the first child was born, the attending physician was paid with a cow — just an old pioneer custom that is still practiced in some instances.

He told them he was tired of checking up on them all the time. He said he thought they were old enough now to check up on themselves. The older children would watch the younger ones. They would have meetings every so often and hand out rewards or punishments.

From where I sit, that's a fine thing for the brewers to do . . . particularly when you realize that after all they're really not responsible for retailing conditions.

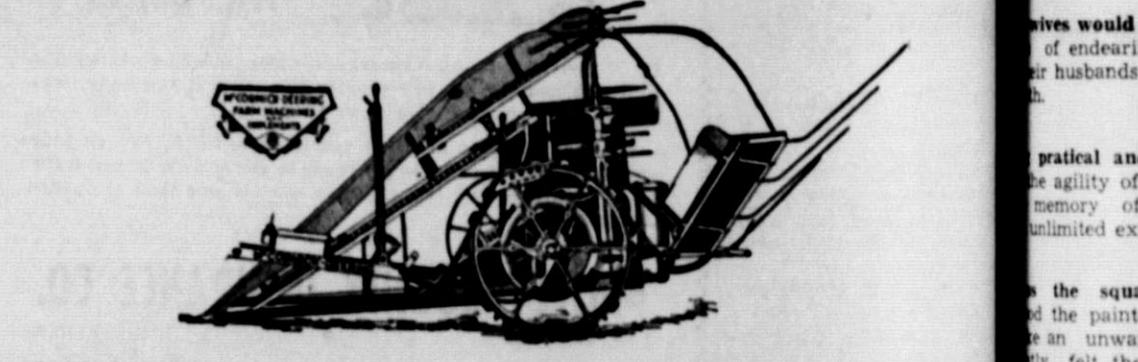
