#### **New Farm Tenant** Loans Ready Soon

First steps for the administration of the Bankhead-Jones Farm Tenant Act, wherein money will be oaned to competent tenants, farm laborers, and share-croppers for the purpose of purchasing familysized farms, are now being taken, L. H. Hauter, regional director of the Farm Security Administration announced this week.

Pursuant to the terms of the Act, distribution of the \$9,500,000 is based on farm populaton and the prevalence of tenancy in each state and territory. Direct administrative costs will be limited to \$500,000 of the amount provided by Congress to carry out the provisions of Title one during the current fiscal year. Loans will be made in approximately 300 counties during the fiscal year 1937-38 and the number of loans per county shall not be less than five nor more than 10, except in states in which the total number of loans shall be less than five.

Application for tenant purchase loans shall be filed with county rural rehabilitation supervisors.

Mr. Hauter, however, has made an urgent request that all applications be withheld until the counties in which this program will be administered this year have been announced. He said this policy will protect would-be applicants from acquiring false hopes and also save county rehabilitation supervisors much unnecessary work. Counties in which the program will be administered this year will be made public in the near future.
