

Washington's Script Adds Value To Notebook Acquired by Library

Contains Virginia Militia Ros- | himself added another chapter to ter and His Colonial Beer Recipe

THE romantic story of an old noteafter 160 years of neglect, when astute literary detection revealed that many of its pages were in George Washington's handwriting. has been added to the long and colorful history of rare books.

The notebook, now in the files of the New York Public Library, dates back to 1757, when Washington was a Virginia colonel. At the time he was raising two regiments of soldiers for the French and Indian Wars. The first ten pages, in a handwriting other than Washington's, are devoted to a roster of these regi-

The remaining forty-four pages, in Washington's own handwriting, contain miscellaneous memoranda, notes for future correspondence and Washington's own recipe for Colonial beer.

When the volume was first acquired by the Library from an old book dealer in 1920 it was for the historical value of the roster. No relation to Washington was known or suspected. The discovery that the remaining pages, long disregarded as the personal notes of some minor military aide, actually contained memoranda written by Washington | the New York World's Fair

the fascinating story of American colonial research.

The identification of Washington as the author was made by Victor Hugo Paltsits, Keeper of Manuscripts of the Library. Examining the notebook, he was struck by the resemblance between certain notes and ideas later embodied by Washington in his letters to Governor Dinwiddie, the Speaker of the House of Burgesses and other Virginia officials. Comparison with other material written by Washington in the same year, and examination by handwriting experts confirmed the fact that the notes were written in Washington's own hand.

Further research based on the notes was conducted recently when a limited quantity of colonial beer, made according to the formula in the notebook, was brewed by special permission of the New York State Liquor Authority. Although it had long been known that Washington. like other colonial squires, followed the custom of brewing his own beer. it was not until the notebook was discovered that his particular recipe became available.

The beverage was brewed as a scintific experiment to demonstrate the advances in brewing technology since Washington's day, and was served along with modern beer to guests at Brewing Industry Day at

"Reports show that this disease, commonly known as "rabbit fever,' is increasing at this time, due in large part to direct exposure to wild rabbits in hunting or dressing of the animals.

"Invariably, tularemia cases are reported more frequently during the hunting season than at any other time. While the disease is caused by a germ found in vari-ous kinds of infected ordents, and can be acquired, among other ways, thru bites of ticks, deer flies, and squirrels, it is most frequently transmitted to man in this section of the United States by infected wild rabbits, hence the name 'rabbit disease.

"The common method of transmission is thru wounds or small the hands of those cleaning or otherwise handling rabbit carin this manner the germs reach the human blood stream, symptoms developing in from one to ten days. The victim suddenly complains of headaches, has body pains, chills, fever, and vomits. The fever, which may run high usually lasts two or three weeks. Convalescence is slow. Death occurs in approximately 5 per cent


FRESH FISH TODAY!

By Katharine Fisher

Director, Good Housekeeping Institute

There was a time, not many years back, when fresh fish, delicious though it was, was neither pleasant nor easy to prepare for cooking. The mean little operations of cleaning, scaling, skinning and boning the fish, to say nothing of all the handling that was necessary, left not a few homemakers pretty much discouraged. Even the ardent angler likes to have some one else prepare his string of speckled beauties for the pan.

Happily the fishing industry discovered the homemaker's dilemma and took steps to correct it. You no longer need to worry about cleaning your fish, for almost everywhere this is being done at the market or before the fish arrives there. We find fish dealers not only willing to clean our fish, but they will fillet it if that is the way we wish it prepared. Some of them, too, have become expert in removing even those troublesome little bones from shad and will do this for you, although sometimes at a slight additional cost.

Again, no cleaning for you to do, for these fillets and steaks are practically boneless and ready for you to put into the skillet or pan. Of course, you must expect that the kinds of fresh fish you are able buy will depend upon the season and the part of the country in which

you live. If you will pick out an up-and-coming fish dealer and take him into your confidence, I am sure he will show a real interest in your purchases and will help you to become better acquainted with food buys in fresh fish from week to week. Try serving fish more often than on the traditional Fridays. Its iodine content, to say nothing of its deliciousness, is a compelling reason, for iodine in the diet helps prevent goiter and other iodine-deficiency diseases. Don't forget that the deliciousness of fish can be captured only by

perfect cooking and a skillful combining of other foods with it. Fish always needs a crisp vegetable or salad, a piquer relish or savory sauce, as a finishing touch. In my experience homes are more likely to overcook than to undercook fish, forgetting the sale done to a turn is tender. juicy, and what I term jellylike—not dry and tasteless, as we too often find it. Some people do not know that certain varieties of fresh fish, like cod, flounder and haddock, are what we term lean fish and therefore need a little more seasoning and more fat in their cooking. Highly flavored varieties of fresh fish, such as shad, mackerel, salmon, etc., are what we term fat fish and need comparatively little fat and less seasoning in their

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


