TB Council Formed For Motley County

A meeting Tuesday night at the courthouse here resulted in the organization of an advisory council for the West Texas Tuberculosis Association. Its prime purpose will be to give better coverage and more interest in the WTTA mobile X-Ray unit scheduled to be in Matador, May 16.

R. M. (Bob) Stanley, who is a director in the West Texas Tuberculosis Association, was elected President of the advisory council. J. R. Whitworth was named vice-president, Mrs. Kenneth Thompson was elected Seal Chairman and Mayor Freddie Wellings was elected as Health Chairman and in charge of publicity.

Flomot area representatives include E. G. Reed, President of the Flomot Lions Club and Orville Lee, also of Flomot. Roaring Springs is represented by Dick Carpenter, President of the Roaring Springs Lions Club and Glenn Sanders, Supt. of Roaring Springs Schools.

Mrs. Thompson is president of Eternas Junior Study Club, which assists with the mobile X-Ray unit.

Mrs. Nancy Gray, program assistant of the West Texas Tuberculosis Association of Lubbock, presented the need for the Motley County Council.

She pointed out that tuberculosis is growing in Texas. She said that in 1965 the state had 2,800 known cases, while 1966 had 3,100 reported cases and 1967 had 3,400 cases.

She said the present law requires all school pupils from the first through the seventh grades to have an X-ray test. All teachers also must receive the test.

Chest Drive is Short of Quota

GOAL of \$3,000 set last fall by the Matador Community Chest is far short of the quota. In fact slightly more than half the goal has been subscribed.

County Judge Forrest Campbell announced Tuesday at the Lions Club meeting that a total of \$1,504.05 had been collected but declared that a number of cards are still to be reported.

The annual drive is sponsored by the Matador Lions Club. Judge Campbell asked that all Lions collect outstanding cards immediately in order that a final check of the drive might be made. All cards and envelopes are to be returned by this week end.

Beef Production Short Course Set

A beef production short course for adult farmers will be held March 11-14th under the sponsorship of the Matador High School Vocational Agriculture Department according to Chas. Johnson, Supt. and Bill Moss, Teacher of Vocational Agriculture.

Mr. Frank C. Litterst, Beef Production Specialist with the Vocational Agriculture Division of the Texas Education Agency and the Department of Animal Science at Texas A&M University will be the instructor for the course. He is headquartered at Texas A&M University.

Mr. Litterst is a graduate of Texas A&M University with a degree in Animal Husbandry. Much of his work was done in livestock production.

After 3 years of service in the U.S. Army, Mr. Litterst served as instructor in the Veterans Agriculture Program in Hays County 4 years and was District Sales Manager for Burrus Feed Mills, Ft. Worth, Texas 4 years.

He then served as Manager, Baldwin Land & Cattle Company, with ranches in Travis and Shelby Counties until 1964. This included operation of a ranch consulting business in Texas and Louisiana. He has successfully operated his own ranching and farming business consisting of both registered and commercial cattle, sheep, angora goats, pecans and grain farming. He is a former director in the State Shorthorn Breeders Association and a member of American Angus, and Texas & Southwest Cattle Raisers Association.

Lions Urged To Be 'Better Listeners'

"COMMUNICATIONS" was the title of the principal address Tuesday at the regular luncheon meeting of the Matador Lions Club, held in the basement of the First Methodist Church.

The address was made by Lion Bill Pallmeyer. "This is what may happen to the chairman of the program committee when his program fails to materialize," Pallmeyer said by way of introduction. An address on soil conservation had been slated for the program.

"We must learn to be good listeners," Pallmeyer declared. "Someone has said tell the truth and forget it. But more is needed. We must be good listeners to prevent lack of understanding.

"If you are talking to a group or an individual, try to speak the language of the people," Pallmeyer declared. "We learn more by oral interpretation than by visual means."

"According to surveys, the best listeners are telephone operators and news reporters. In the group class pre-school age children listen better," Pallmeyer said.

He said one of the enemies to proper listening was the habit of letting the mind wander or "day-dreaming."

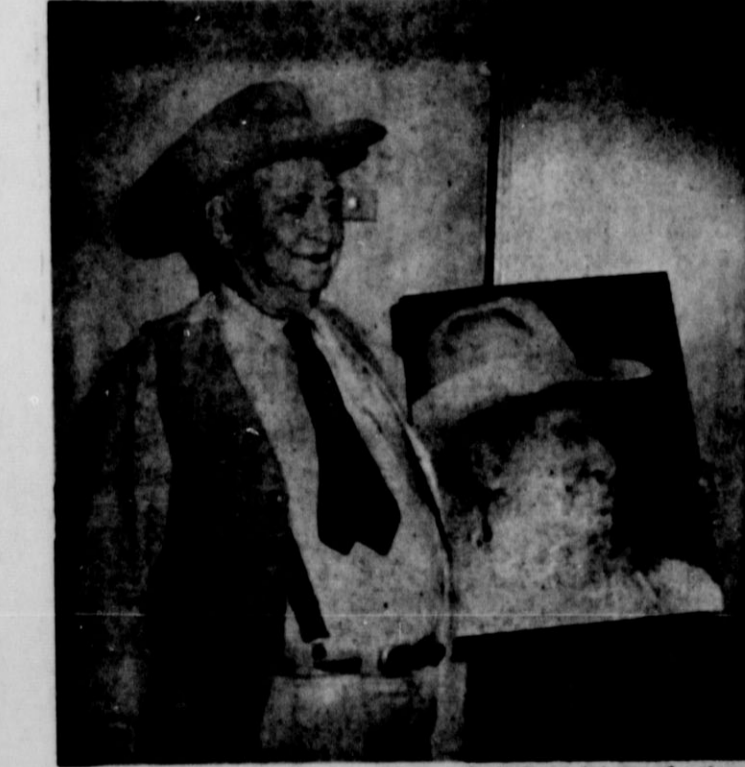
Resident Game Warden Ronnie Vandiver was introduced and welcomed into the club as a new member.

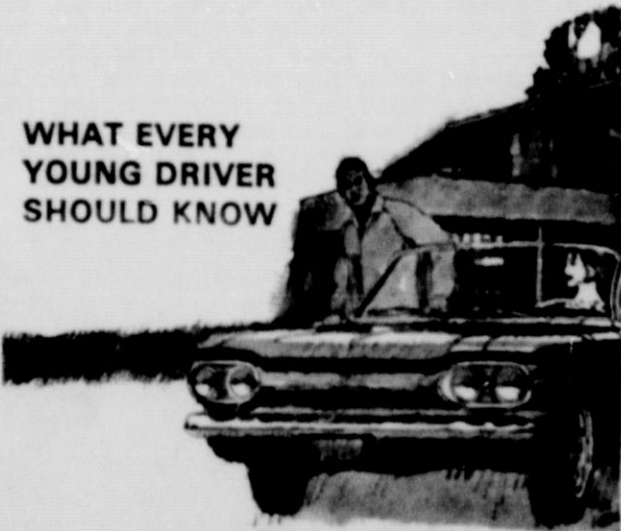

Tiny Tarts Tipped With Cream



Be elegant yet easy when entertaining with these Lemon Creme Tarts created in the Borden Kitchen.

Lemon Creme Tarts (Makes 16 2-inch Tarts)

PASTRY CUPS:

- 2 sticks (10-oz. package) homogenized pie crust mix
- 2 tablespoons boiling water
- 2 tablespoons ReaLemon reconstituted lemon juice
- Melted butter

In a small-size mixing bowl, crumble 1 stick pie crust mix. Add 1 tablespoon water and 1 tablespoon lemon juice. With a fork, mix until dough loses its stickiness. Stir until dough forms a ball and completely leaves side of bowl. On a floured board, with a floured rolling pin, roll dough to a 14-inch circle. With a round 2-inch cookie cutter cut 32 circles of dough. Repeat with remaining stick of pie crust mix. Press a circle of dough onto the bottom of a 2-1/2 inch diameter muffin cup or a 5-oz. custard cup. Press 3 circles of dough around sides of cup, edges overlapping, petal-fashion. With tines of a fork, pierce entire surface of pastry. Repeat with remaining circles. Bake in a hot (450°F.) oven 8 to 10 minutes, or until pastry is lightly browned. Remove from oven; brush with melted butter. Let cool thoroughly before removing from cups.

FILLING: In a medium-size mixing bowl combine 1-1/3 cups (15-oz.) can sweetened condensed milk and 1/2 cup ReaLemon reconstituted lemon juice. Stir until mixture thickens and is thoroughly blended. Whip 1/2 cup heavy cream; gently fold into lemon mixture. Divide filling in half; blend yellow food coloring into one half and red food coloring into the other. Spoon filling into cooled shells. Refrigerate 2 hours, or until filling sets. To serve, whip 1/2 cup heavy cream and garnish each tart.

Start Now To Put Yourself In Shape

Your doctor recognizes the importance of exercise to health. The American Medical Association points out that exercise, or lack of it, is often a significant factor in the control of obesity, diabetes, heart and circulatory problems, orthopedic disease and emotional disorders.

Fitness developed through vigorous activity and exercise can be preventive, as well as therapeutic, in nature. In a positive sense, health includes abundant energy and vitality. A healthy person is physically fit when he can perform his daily work and tasks without undue fatigue, maintain adequate reserves of energy to enjoy recreational activities and leisure, and meet the challenge of unexpected demands. These might be running to catch a train, quickly climbing several flights of stairs, shoveling snow, or jacking up the car to change a tire.

Can you go up several flights of stairs without severe discomfort, chest pain, or having to stop before you reach the top? You would expect to be puffing a little at the top, but this should subside soon if you are reasonably fit. The best exercise is doing something physically active which you enjoy, with the exercise part secondary. If you enjoy swimming or tennis, or handball, these are excellent sports for exercising most of the body. Golf is good for the tired businessman. Most of us, however, find it difficult to exert the mental discipline to keep at a program of daily calisthenics purely for the sake of exercise.

If you have had little or no exercise for years, be cautious about plunging immediately into active sports. Work up to strenuous exercise gradually. There are simple tests by which your doctor can determine the extent of your physical fitness. If you flunk the tests miserably, and many of us will, then ask your doctor to prescribe a simple, daily exercise program to help you get back in shape. 1-68

Scout Members Top 6 Million

On the eve of its 58th anniversary to be observed February 7 to 13, the Boy Scouts of America announced it attained an all-time high in membership on December 31 with an active membership of 6,058,508 boys and leaders according to word received by R. L. Hurst, Staff Director of the South Plains Council.

Chief Scout Executive Alden G. Barber told local Scout officials that 1967 closed with 4,461,111 boys registered, a gain of 171,732, or 4 percent during the year.

Mr. Barber also said there are 1,597,397 adult volunteer leaders in the movement, a gain of 55,235 or 3.6 percent. In Cub Scouting, a program for boys 8,9, and 10 years of age, there are 2,243,174 boys, a gain of 117,780 or 5.5 percent. There are 1,908,183 Boy Scouts, 11 and older, a gain of 54,867 or 3 percent.

Explorers, young men 14 and older, total 309,754 units, a decrease of 915 young men, or a 3 percent loss.

On December 31 last there were 149,454 units, a gain of 2,266 over the previous year, or 1.5 percent. There are now 58,045

Cub Scout packs, 60,388 Boy Scouts troops, and 22,021 Explorer posts.

Since its founding 58 years ago next Thursday (Feb. 8) the Boy Scouts of America has ended each year with a gain in membership. Since 1910, there have been over 44 million boys and leaders identified with the Boy Scouts of America.

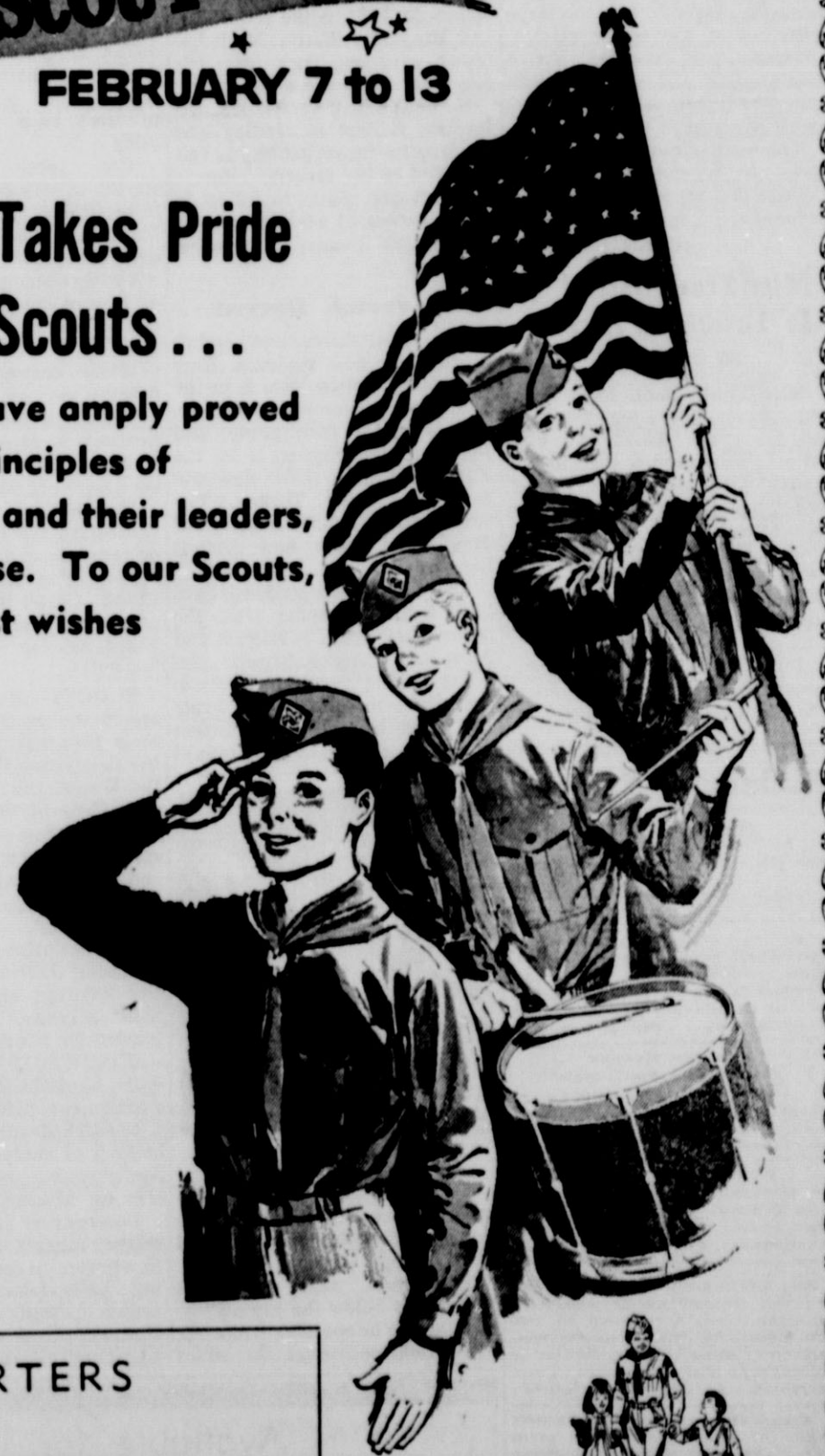
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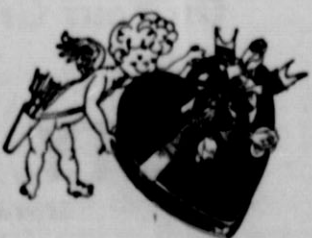

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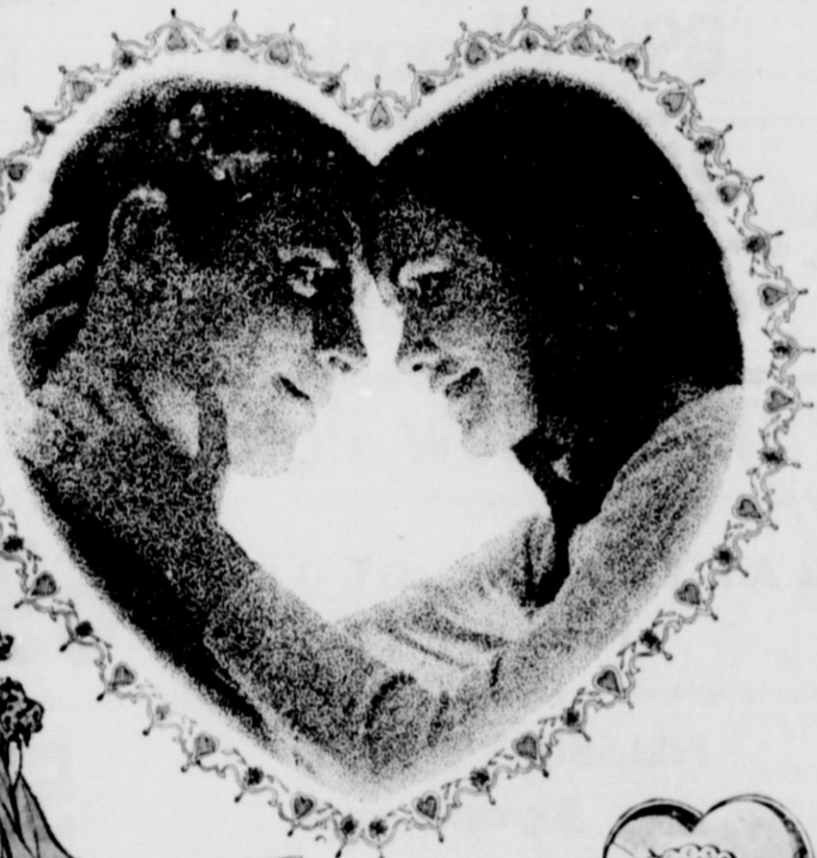
