in our schools today are handicapped in vocal expression accordtent to the American Speech Coring to the American Speech Cor-rection Association; and there are more youngsters who are defective in speech than there are youngsters who are crippled, blind, or

Defective speech is indeed far from uncommon, but a great many vocal troubles can be cured. In the February issue of Pictorial Review, Maxine Davis after a thorough survey of the latest findings of science and speech schools in this field, points out the most common vocal defects and what

can be done to cure them.




