

# Ranch Hand Is Victim Of Tragic Night Fire

burned, the body of Newton Bingham, 40, was removed from a burning house at the historic ranch headquarters at 3:30 Sunday morning, minutes before the building was discovered by fire.

Looking through a window in the southeast corner of the burning building, Mr. McDaniel saw Bingham on a bed. Flames at that time had not reached the room although it was filled with smoke. Breaking the window, he went in to rescue Bingham. The body was so badly burned that he had difficulty in removing it from the building. McDaniel finally succeeded in dragging the body from the building. Con-

dition of the body indicated Bingham had been in a burning room and dragged himself to the other room before he died.

**Bell Summons Help**

Meanwhile Mrs. McDaniel summoned help. She said she first thought of sounding the horn of a nearby pick-up and then thought of the church house dinner bell, which she began ringing. Mrs. Seth Sager, wife of the ranch manager, heard the bell at the ranch headquarters and seeing the fire, called the Matador Volunteer

Fire Department.

Mrs. Sager said the building was a mass of flames when she called the firemen. Water carried by the two trucks which responded to the call, aided in keeping the fire from spreading to adjoining buildings. In keeping the fire confined to the one building, the new fire truck was brought inside the wire-enclosed lake which is fed by springs at the headquarters. The firemen then had a sufficient supply of water equal to city mains.

**Search For 2nd Victim**

Sheriff John Stotts arrived at the scene of the fire soon after the alarm was sounded and said he and Deputy Jinks Wilson had seen Bingham and another man in a pickup about 2 o'clock. Firemen, fearing that a second body might be in the smoldering embers, waited until daylight before the search could be completed. Cause of the fire is not known, although there was speculation among acquaintances of the victim that it might have resulted from his smoking in bed.

Bingham's body was removed to Matador by a Eudy-Seale ambulance and funeral services were conducted Tuesday at the Spur Methodist church with the Rev. Victor Crabtree, pastor of the Dickens Baptist church officiating. Interment was in the Spur cemetery under the direction of Campbell Funeral Home of Spur.

Survivors include his wife, a son, Joe, by a former marriage, his mother, Mrs. Rachel Bingham, Spur, and a brother, Wallace Bingham of Houston. Mrs.

Bingham was in a Crosbyton hospital at the time of the tragedy.

The building destroyed was among the oldest structures on the 72-year-old ranch, and was known to early cowboys as the "great house", later it was converted to a bank house and had recently been modernized for family quarters. Bingham had been employed by the ranch about six months as a truck driver, but had moved to the headquarters house from Matador only a week ago.

**PRESIDENT ASKED TO CONSIDER AID IN DROUTH AREAS**

WACO—The Texas Farm Bureau Federation asked President Eisenhower June 18 to "give serious consideration" to five proposals designed to alleviate the hardship suffered by livestock producers in the drought-stricken area of the state.

In a telegram to the chief executive, the TFBF board in session in Waco requested that immediate emergency measures be instituted to "relieve this drastic situation." The message, signed by President J. Walter Hammond, contained the following proposals:

1. That the drought-stricken portion of the state be declared a disaster area.
2. Provide through existing channels, or otherwise, a system of credit to enable livestock producers to maintain possession of foundation herds.
3. Provide necessary long-term credit for essential feed.
4. Make available surplus CCC feedstuffs at prices as low as those offered to foreign countries.
5. That the United States Department of Agriculture initiate a beef-purchase and promotion program that will restore confidence, strengthen the market and aid the industry over this emergency.

**Grim, Silent Ranchers Hear Plans To Relieve Area Drouth Emergency**

**Cheap Money, Feed Required At Once**

ADVANCING in little group out of the hot twilight, drouth-plagued ranchers and farmers sat on the courthouse lawn Monday night and listened silently as plans to relieve the grave emergency were discussed.

Altho dry in place the lawn grass was cool and soft and one of the green spots remaining in the county. Earlier plans to hold the meeting in the District Court room were abandoned because of the heat and lack of cooling facilities. The lawn was large while many more sat in automobiles and trucks around the square. Loud-speakers were rigged with two microphones—one on the courthouse steps and another down the side walk to pick up suggestions from those in the audience who would speak. There were few suggestions.

Motley County Farm Bureau President John Hunter opened the meeting with a few brief remarks and introduced State Representative Elbert Reeves, "We face a grim and serious problem," Rep. Reeves told his friends and neighbors. "Definite action must be taken." He then introduced C. H. DeVaney, Co-

loma, vice-president of the Texas Farm Bureau Federation and principal speaker.

**Temporary Situation**

"We believe the situation is only temporary," Mr. DeVaney said. "Otherwise we'd all be leaving this country. What we need now is some long term credit."

He pointed out that banks, having made loans when cattle prices were high, are now holding paper representing 150 per cent of the current value of livestock.

"Banks can't continue to make such loans," he said. "What's more, the ranchers and farmers need another 50 per cent of the valuation for feed."

Elmer Stearns, executive vice-president of the First State bank here, corroborated DeVaney's statements, declaring that in some instances the local institutions have extended credit on

livestock collateral in excess of 150 per cent at present values.

Mr. DeVaney urged that a plan be sought which would provide cheap feed and money at low interest rate. He said it would take years for the rancher and stock-farmer to recover from the economic loss. He said a telegram had been dispatched to President Eisenhower outlining the urgent needs in the drought-stricken area. County Judge Vance Gilbreath, who last week appealed to Rep. Walter Rogers in Washington, for aid from federal agencies, also spoke.

**Aid Must Be Immediate**

Representative Reeves declared, "We have delayed too long in making this appeal for aid. Many of the area's fine foundation herds have been depleted and the entire economy of the cattle-producing country is (continued on back page)

Brig. Gen. Paul L. Wakefield, state draft director, names the following types of deferred men, among others, who have their liability for service extended until age 35:

1. Members of the ROTC and other officer training programs.
2. Students deferred to go to high school or college under requirements of law; college students deferred under authority of the local board.
3. Men left at home for civilian employment.
4. Men deferred to farm.
5. Married men deferred because of their children or because of extreme hardship and privation to dependents.

6. Men classified as mentally, physically, or morally deficient or defective.

"The regulations spell this out", General Wakefield says. "So when a man gets the privilege of a deferment he is taking on a corresponding responsibility. The man who never receives a deferment like these cannot be drafted after he reaches his 26th birthday."

The state draft director says that, under this provision of law it is possible for a deferred man to lose his qualification for deferment at age 34, for example. Under such circumstance, he would again be eligible for draft.

Brig. Gen. Paul L. Wakefield, state draft director, names the following types of deferred men, among others, who have their liability for service extended until age 35:

1. Members of the ROTC and other officer training programs.
2. Students deferred to go to high school or college under requirements of law; college students deferred under authority of the local board.
3. Men left at home for civilian employment.
4. Men deferred to farm.
5. Married men deferred because of their children or because of extreme hardship and privation to dependents.

6. Men classified as mentally, physically, or morally deficient or defective.

"The regulations spell this out", General Wakefield says. "So when a man gets the privilege of a deferment he is taking on a corresponding responsibility. The man who never receives a deferment like these cannot be drafted after he reaches his 26th birthday."

The state draft director says that, under this provision of law it is possible for a deferred man to lose his qualification for deferment at age 34, for example. Under such circumstance, he would again be eligible for draft.

a "thorough investigation be made of the disparity between producer and consumer prices" by Agriculture Secretary Benson's Livestock Advisory Committee which was to meet June 20 in Chicago.

The directors stated that livestock producers and credit agencies in this state "prepare for ordinary drouths, but this unprecedented drouth has not only depleted ranges of forage, but has also depleted the sources of credit."

The telegram added that the situation has become so drastic that it has caused a near panic in the movement of livestock to market.

"We feel that this situation is temporary, but that if not halted immediately, will result in the forced sale of breeding herds which would eventually be reflected in higher prices to consumers. In addition, it could wreck the economy in a vast livestock-growing area," the telegram stated.

## Stevepost Weighs Shivers' Chances As Nation Leader

Allan Shivers' chances of becoming the first Texas governor to move to the White House are explored in the current (June 27th) issue of The Saturday Evening Post.

The analysis is made by Geo. Sessions Perry, who reports that the forty-five-year-old Shivers handles Texans more skillfully than anyone since Sam Houston and that his political power is almost unrivaled since the time when Stephen Austin, who settled the place, was the government in person.

Shivers' success still mystifies Texans who have seen him almost completely ignore the tried and true techniques of vote-getting in Texas. Perry writes, in an article entitled "He's Got Texas in the Palm of His Hand": "Despite his hesitancy to buddy-up to the man in the street or the furrow, he has become the top dog on the Texas political scene and an enigma with highly provocative potentialities on the national scene," the author finds.

"Not only has he won his own political wars by wide margins and become the titular head of the Democratic Party in Texas, but he was, as of November 4, 1952, the de facto head of the Texas Republicans as well," Perry continues. "Beyond question, it was he, more than any other person, who delivered Texas's twenty-four highly skitish electoral votes to the Eisenhower-Nixon ticket."

## Two-Party Governor

What matter of man can it be who rides the obliging Democratic donkey as he airily packs the elephant's trunk with Texas goobers? Perry says this question becomes one of national interest, for soon Shivers will have graduated from the highest of purely Texas political jobs, when he completes his present term of governor, having served in that office longer than any other man in Texas history.

"As politics is his profession, and one he has mastered cum laude, it's not likely that he'll want to confine himself to local affairs in the future," Perry adds.

It is reported that such neighboring nabobs as Governor Rob-

ert F. Kennon, of Louisiana, are already touting Shivers as the next President of the United States. And Perry points out that Shivers has never yet met his match at the polls.

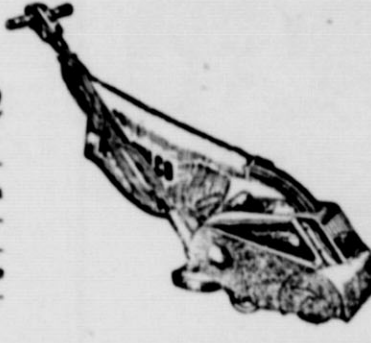
