Weather Erratic In April

Always-unusual West Texas weather pulled all the stops in April leaving forecasters chewing their tongues and scanning the "help wanted" classifieds. It pulled all the pranks in the book with the exception of providing the all-important precipitation in needed quantities. Forecasting the weather has become a lost art and the mere recording of its capers is involved as attested by Water Superintendent Lee Burns who operates the US Weather Bureau's instruments here. An example is the recording of temperature readings, which on April 17, dipped to 31 degrees. Four days later, on April 22, Mr. Burns wiped the perspiration from his face and recorded 96 degrees—a change of 65 degrees.

A siege of sandstorms swept the Panhandle during the last week of April with some recorded winds as high as 70 miles per hour. Rainfall was light except in a few areas. Another cold front moved into West Texas over the weekend and held the mercury down until yesterday, when the upward trend was near normal. Rainfall for the first four months of 1953 is slightly more than one-third the amount recorded here during the same period in 1952. May 1, 1953 was 2.56 inches as compared with 7.30 inches of May first, 1952.

Fire Leaves Farm Family Of 13 In Tragic Plight

Fire of unknown origin Tuesday morning left a farmer, his wife and 11 children without food, shelter and only the clothing on their backs.

Mr. and Mrs. Arthur Buckhannon and their children (one son and 10 daughters) were away from the house when fire was discovered about 9 a. m. They lived in a house on the farm leased by Cecil Brogdon, almost on the county line, south of Roaring Springs. Everything was lost including food, clothing, bedding and personal belongings.

Mr. and Mrs. Buckhannon's children range in age downward from 16 (the son), and an effort is being made to secure used clothing, bedding and other necessities. Collection depot here is the Phillips 66 service station. Anything a destitute family can use is needed.

Resident's Father Dies At Levelland

John Walter Thompson, 75, of Whiteface, Texas, father of Matador resident, Manley Thompson, died Wednesday morning in a Levelland hospital, and funeral services were held today, at 2 p. m. in the First Baptist Church at Whiteface. Interment was in the Whiteface cemetery.

Mr. Thompson had been in failing health for several years, and seriously ill the past two months. Manley Thompson was called to his father's bedside Tuesday morning, where he remained until he passed away.

Mr. Thompson was born at Toone, Tenn., July 1, 1877. He and his family had resided in the Whiteface community the past 28 1/2 years.

He is survived by his wife; three sons: L. U. Thompson of Whiteface, C. M. Thompson of Matador, and W. E. Thompson of Levelland; one daughter, Mrs. G. D. Lyons of Whiteface; 13 grandchildren; 1 brother, W. B. Thompson of Toone, Tenn., and two sisters: Mrs. Lizzie Nuckolls of Dallas, and Mrs. Mary Nuckolls of Maize, Oklahoma.

Editor Speaks At Journalism Forum

Tribune editor Douglas Meador last week was one of four newspaper publishers speaking on the weekly panel of the Southwest Journalism Forum, held at the Southern Methodist University, Dallas. The forum was sponsored by the Press Club of Dallas and the SMU Department of Journalism.

The forum started Thursday and continued through Saturday noon and included some of the most famous names in newspaper, magazine, radio and television work in the country.

MYSTERY GIRL

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Applications For New Notaries To Be Filed During May

Secretary of State Howard Carney has announced that he will reappoint all persons who now hold Notary Public Commissions and that all such persons must qualify by filing oath and bond with the County Clerk of their residence between June 1, 1953 and June 10, 1953. The law specifically required County Clerks to approve Notary bonds and individuals should not send money or requests for commissions direct to the Secretary of State. All Notary matters can only be received by the Secretary of State after the County Clerk acts thereon.

Any person who has not heretofore been a Notary Public should apply to his County Clerk between May 1, 1953 and May 23, 1953, if he desires to

have this application given prompt attention in the State Department, as the rush of re-appointing all old Notaries may slow up the ordinary process of making new appointments and issuing commissions.

Secretary of State Carney said, "Each person applying for a commission as a Notary Public

must be at least 21 years of age and a resident of the County for which he is appointed; exact names and permanent addresses should be given to the County Clerk in applying for a commission, as location of the Notary may be necessary long after he has notarized a particular instrument."

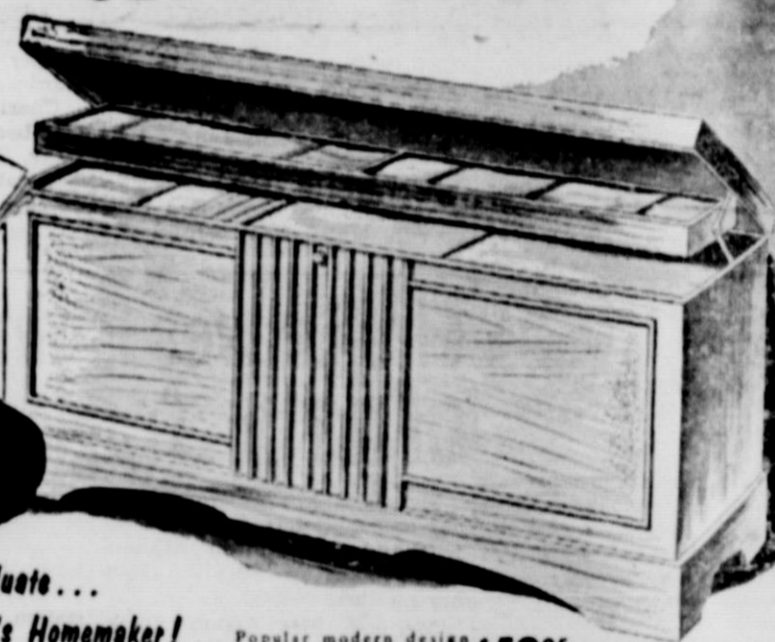

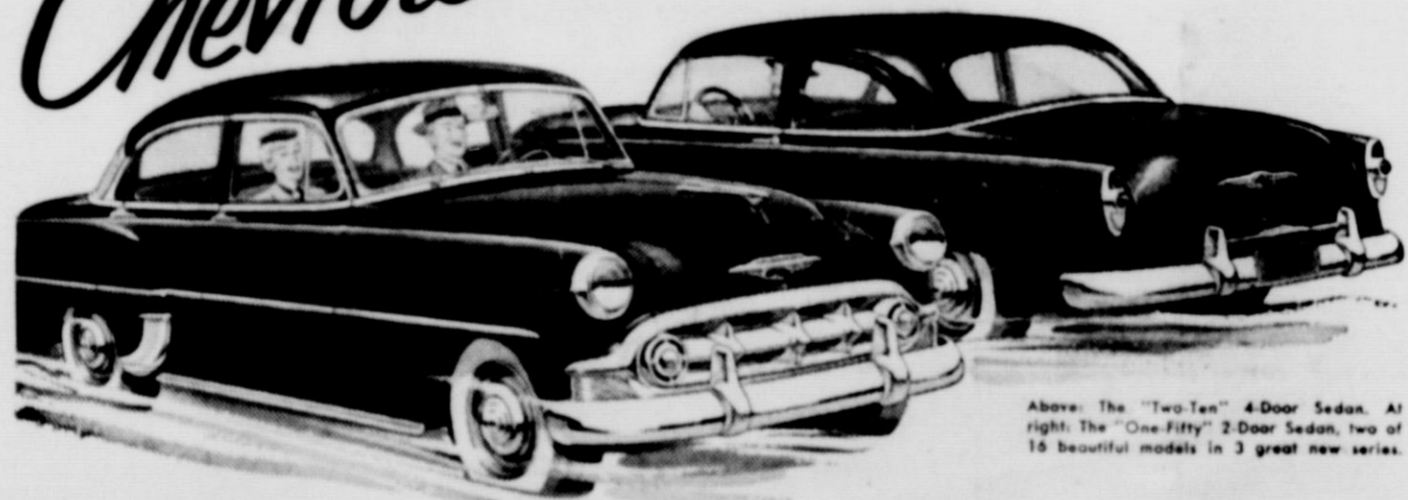

but we are trying. We need more men in the Texas Highway Patrol. At present we have 470 members but we are spread thin over the great state of Texas. We need 1,224 men to properly patrol the highways of Texas but the funds allowed for our department's operation has been curtailed until we have only about one third enough patrolmen. . . .

Captain Lawrence used various makes and sizes of service pistols in the performance of his outstanding feat. 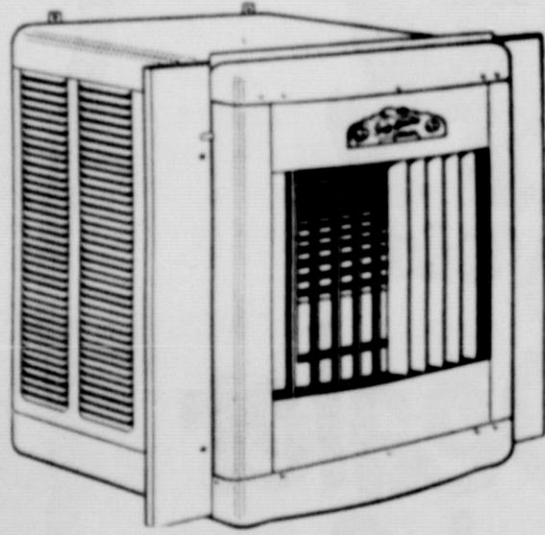
