**Young Girl Leaves Home**

Distraught parents, Mr. and Mrs. Henry Plyler of Whiteflat, Monday requested the Tribune to aid in the search for their 15-year-old daughter, Dorothy Nell, who left her farm home about 6:30 p. m. Thursday.

**FLASH . . .**  
Word was received early yesterday afternoon that the two girls had been found at Sulphur, Oklahoma where their car was involved in an accident. Mr. and Mrs. Plyler accompanied by Joe Bloodworth left immediately to go to the Oklahoma town.

The Matador high school freshman weighs 125 pounds, is five feet, four inches tall and has brown eyes. She wears glasses part of the time. She was clad in green shorts and red blouse when she left home in the family 1951 light gray Chevrolet car bearing 1953 license number AP789. She had no money.

She was joined at Paducah by Betty Auld, age 14. The two girls went to Stinnett where the Auld girl's sister, Mrs. Mary Henry was preparing to go to Springfield, Missouri to accept a position as nurse in the Baptist hospital.

The girls left Stinnett in advance of the older sister, Sheriff John Stotts declared. Mrs. Henry reported when she arrived in Springfield she was advised that two young girls, accompanied by a youth about 13, had called at the hospital Saturday afternoon and inquired regarding her arrival.

Police have been alerted across several states, but trail of the missing girls and their companion vanished in Springfield Saturday afternoon. Sheriff Stotts went to Amarillo yesterday in effort to further the search for the girls. He said he might go to Stinnett and other points if developments warranted an extension of the search.

**Parents Forgive Daughter**  
Mr. and Mrs. Plyler asked that newspapers and radio stations aiding their daughter that they forgive her for running away from home and beg of her to return as soon as possible.

"She has always been an obedient daughter," Mr. Plyler declared, "and has never caused us any trouble before."

**Armistice Is Near 'Cease Fire' Stage**

THE DOVE of Peace is hovering in Korea and the destiny of the world may be determined by its flight. Communist and United Nations truce negotiators neared the end of their long and historic mission Tuesday in full agreement for the first time on all major points of a Korean truce including the voluntary exchange of war prisoners.

The Associated Press from Panmunjom says an armistice could be signed within a week.

But whether the 23-months' labor would finally end the three years of warfar on the blood-soaked peninsula is clouded by vows of South Korean leaders to ignore the armistice and fight on.

The angry South Koreans rejected the prisoner exchange agreement signed Monday as "failure of the United Nations to live up to their fundamental principal of human freedom."

Under the agreement the bulk of the 121,680 Red prisoners and 12,000 Allied prisoners would be exchanged within 60 days; the rest would be released by December.

Many leaders are skeptical regarding the long hoped-for end of the Korean war, with their skepticism measured by former failures of the Comms to agreements. The stock market in New York, however, broke Tuesday on the strength of the peace negotiations, and lost more than one billion dollars in values.

Cattle markets in Texas, being depressed by thousands of drought-stricken animals offered for sale, dropped again as peace talks reached the final stages.

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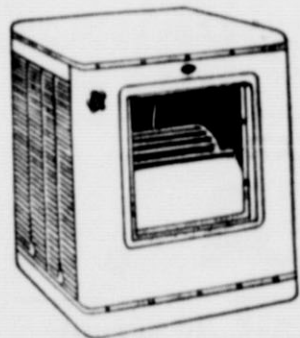
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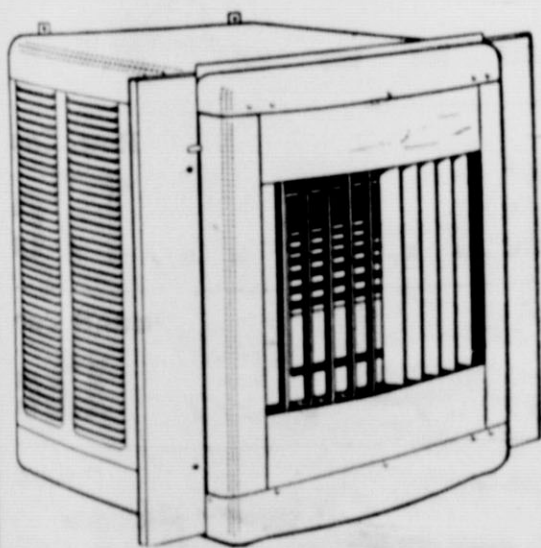

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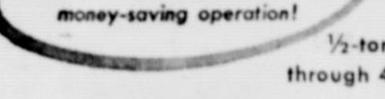

## THE DRAFT LAW

### Rules And Regulations

**EDITOR'S NOTE:** This is the first of a series of ten articles on the draft law, its rules and regulations. The series will follow in subsequent issues of the Tribune.

The draft law requires every man registered with a local board to report any change in personal status to his board.

Young men have asked us what changes they should report. Brig. Gen. Paul L. Keefe, state draft director, says: "Generally, anything which has a bearing on classification should be reported."

The state director pointed to the following things which should be regarded as change of personal status:

1. Current change of mail address should always be sent to board.

2. Marriage should be reported at once.

3. If a wife becomes pregnant with a couple's first child, a physician's certificate must be sent to the board immediately after the fact is known.

4. All additions to the family must be reported.

5. Any and all deaths in a man's family should be reported.

6. If a man and wife are divorced or they no longer live together, this must be reported.

7. Permanent change of job should be reported.

8. Serious injury or physical defect should be reported.

9. If a man becomes a student in a college or university, this fact should be reported.

10. If a man enters the Reserves or National Guard, he should ask his commanding officer to notify his board. He should assure himself that it is done.

11. If a man has attempted to volunteer for armed forces service and has been rejected, he should advise his local board.

## Precaution Urged In Use Of Sprays

With spring house-cleaning and the anti-moth battle under way, housewives all over Texas have been using insecticide sprays. Because most of these are poisonous and some are inflammable, special precautions noted on the labels should be observed, says Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer.

Common sense safety rules include protection of food, dishes, silverware and cooking utensils from moth, mosquito or fly sprays. If you spill concentrated insecticide solutions on yourself, wash off immediately with soap and water.

Don't expose yourself or members of your family unnecessarily to insecticide dust or spray mists. Provide extra ventilation by opening doors and windows when extensive jobs are being done.

Care should be taken not to spray liquid insecticides into electrical outlets or on exposed electrical connections because of danger of short circuits. Don't apply oil-base sprays near fire, flame or sparks and don't smoke while applying them.

Special precautions should be taken to store insecticides where children will not be able to reach them. Never put into a kitchen cupboard where they might be mistaken for food.

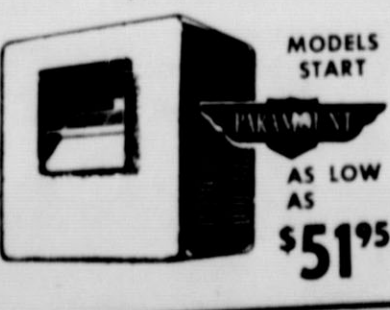

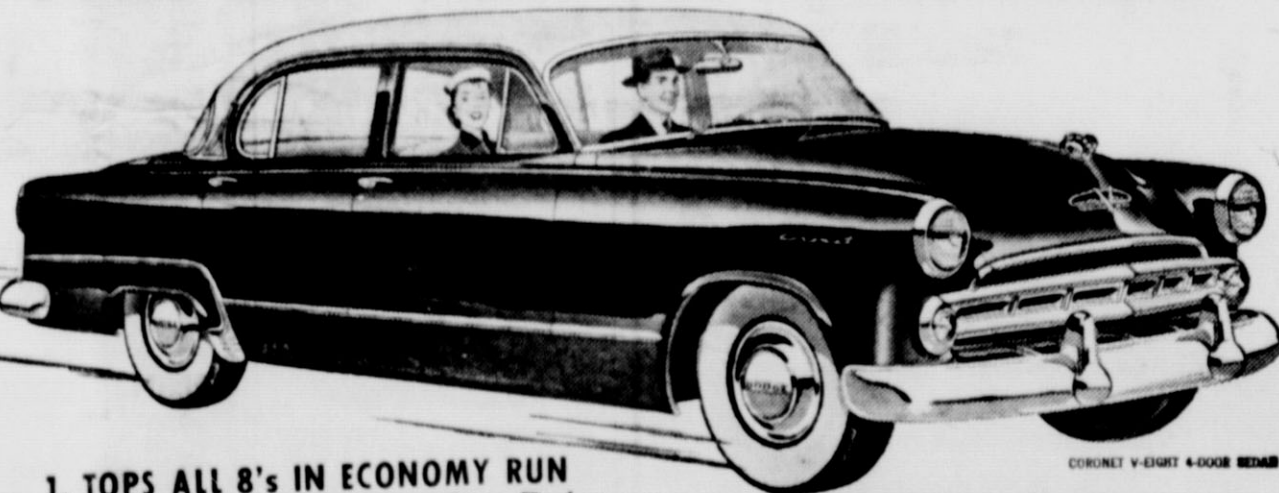
