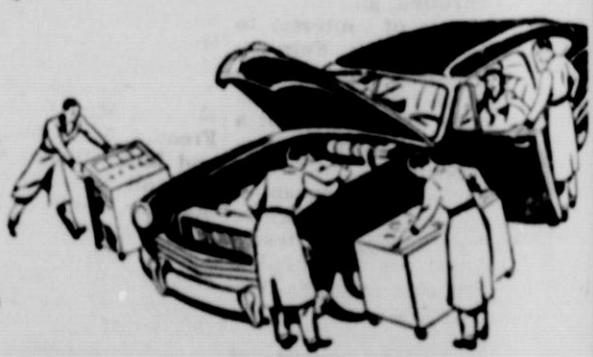

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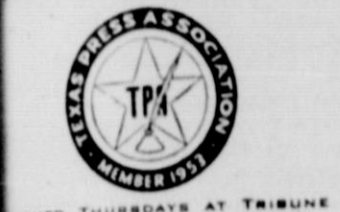

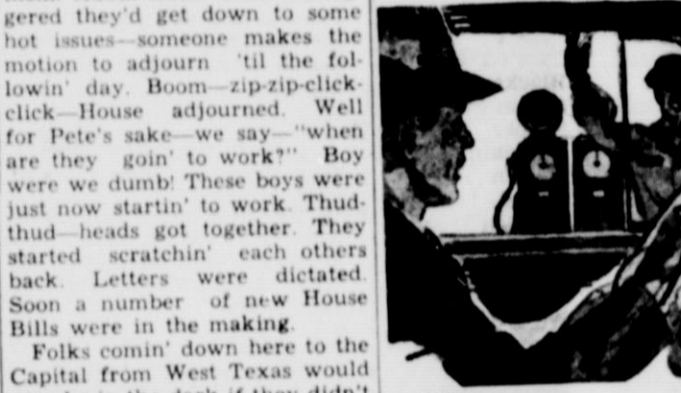

father of Shelia Rice, and Midway coach, was the first to detect the error. On the other hand one or two were still of the opinion that Neighbors had guarded Rice.

"Naturally, we did not know but in order not to do a possible injustice to Miss Traweck, we added Miss Traweck's name to the All-State team and Mr. Fred (Waco jeweler) gladly sent both watches.

"The real truth of the matter is that the person we intended to get the All-State position was the girl guarding Miss Rice. Right now I still do not know for sure whether that girl's name was Neighbors or Traweck, but all those from Matador in Waco probably know, and the evidence seems to lean in favor of Miss Traweck, but in order not to make it a bad situation, we left Miss Neighbors on the team, and added the name of Miss Traweck, making it a seven player team, figuring that everybody would have to be satisfied along that line, and in that manner no injustice could be done.

"Numbers Cause Trouble"
"But the entire trouble emanated from the fact that the Matador girls did not have their numbers on the program as did the other teams. The scorers' table, of course got the numbers but that table was far removed from the press table. I was more or less responsible for the mistake, as I conveyed the wrong information, if it was wrong, to other members of the committee making the selections.

"You find the name of the girl guarding Shelia Rice and will know the name of the girl really deserving of the All-State position, but since both are on the team and both got watches, I do not see where it would help to continue the controversy.

"It was State Director L. C. McKemie who first called my attention to the fact that in naming Neighbors as the girl

that guarded Rice, instead of Traweck. That was when we started asking questions, with the result as I have outlined. It seems to me all should be satisfied, and if there is any criticism it should be directed toward parties here and not to your superintendent.
