A Voter's Soliloquy

Before another issue of the Tribune is printed the people of the United States will have elected a new president. It is one of the most important decisions any nation on the face of the earth has ever made. It offers an opportunity and poses an obligation to every man and woman to go to the polls and contribute their influence in shaping this nation's future destiny and perhaps the future destiny of the world.

It has been an intensely confusing campaign and there exists among average voters an ardent concern for simple, honest direction. The questions are too complex and the answers are unknown factors. Each voter will make his own decision, based on the small truths he can salvage from the great mass and rubble of campaign publicity. It is not easy.

The Tribune will vote a straight Democratic ticket. It is in no way influenced by precedence or any former pledge of loyalty. The Tribune believes one of the greatest men of the 20th century is candidate for the presidency of the United States. It believes he is an honorable, God-fearing man (whose first act when he was nominated, was to invoke Divine Guidance on his acceptance of the responsibility), and that in his hands this nation will experience the greatest leadership it has ever known. The Tribune will vote for a man and it is a coincidence that he is the Democratic nominee.

This newspaper is a small voice in a wilderness of great and powerful journals, most of which are hostile to Governor Adlai Stevenson. This item will probably not influence a single vote and is written merely to establish the Tribune's position on a political issue. General Dwight Eisenhower is a great military leader and if the people of the United States were voting for a military leader, the Tribune would irrevocably pledge its support to him. General Eisenhower, despite the strategy of which he must be capable, has become a prisoner of the Republican party. He has been forced to recruit from the Republican party, some of the most abominable and odious characters ever involved in our nation's politics. It is impossible for the average man to believe that General Eisenhower sanctions the policies they advocate, but if he is elected, he must have their support. Furthermore, if he is elected, he will, out of duty, be forced to patronize their influence. They are putting the words in his mouth that he speaks over radio, TV and in public addresses during the campaign. The sterling character of General Eisenhower has been submerged beneath the policies and one-gallows promises of the Republican party.

For contrast, listen to some of the speeches being made by Governor Stevenson, or read his speeches in the newspapers. It is at once evident that he is doing his own thinking and that the brilliance and honesty of his great mind offer the people of this nation the kind of leadership which rests entirely upon principle.

In conclusion the Tribune believes these fine homes in West Texas are real. Despite the Republican propaganda, the Tribune believes the new automobiles in Motley County are real; the modern electrical and gas appliances in the homes are real. It believes the bank deposits which the First State bank publishes are real (although they are not augmented by Tribune funds), the fine farming lands restored from erosion and poverty by government aid, the modern tractors and farming equipment, are all real. It believes the published stock and bond markets, the cattle, grain and cotton markets, are real. It believes the high standard of living here in West Texas is real; that the hopeful (if somewhat bewildered) people of the nation which the REA transmission lines which take the blessings of electrical power to remote farm homes, are real. It believes the Republican offer to "take poles and wires" is an appreciation of the Republican offer to "take us away from all of this—this unreal, synthetic condition, poisoned by synthetic values." We remember the very real condition which Mr. Hoover provided. Thank you General Eisenhower and Bob Taft. The Tribune was conceived in a depression. While in a delicate condition its distasteful parent was frightened by a Republican promise.

Over Half Of Cotton Harvested

Over half of Motley county's 1952 cotton crop has been harvested according to opinions of ginners in three communities.

The survey was made Tuesday by County agent Rufus Emons. Flomot has ginned 2,037 bales and ginners there believe 60% of the crop is harvested. Matador has ginned 1,621 bales and it is estimated 50% of the crop is harvested. Roaring Springs has ginned 1,188 bales and estimates there are that 60% of the crop has been harvested.

A total of 4,846 bales have been ginned in the county this season as compared with 6,419 bales on the same date last year.

"When you put on a memorial poppy on Poppy Day you will be paying individual tribute to those who have died for America in the three wars of the twentieth century," said Mrs. H. H. "Poppies were first worn to honor the nation's war dead in 1918, and the custom of contributing to the welfare of war living victims in exchange for the flowers was begun the following year," Mrs. Schweitzer explained. DICK RUSSELL BACKS ADLAI

RUSSELL IS THE GEORGIA SENATOR FOR WHOM GOVERNOR SHIVERS AND TEXAS DELEGATION VOTED UNANIMOUSLY ON ALL BALLOTS AT DEMOCRATIC CONVENTION IN CHICAGO

Senator Dick Russell of Georgia, he man the Texas Delegation headed by Gov. RAYBURN PREDICTS SOLID VICTORY FOR ADLAI-SPARKMAN

Health Department Cites Necessity For Rabies Control

Two widely separated areas in Texas face an upsurge in rabies between now and June, State Health Officer Geo. W. Cox predicts. The disease could easily spread to other vulnerable areas.

One focus is in Travis, Bastrop, Fayette, and Mays counties in Central Texas. The other is in Panola, Shelby, San Augustine counties in East Texas. Individual instances of mad foxes have been occurring in both these sections throughout the year.

Blanco, Comal, Gaudalupe, and Gonzales counties are directly in the path of the southwestern spread of the Central Texas focus. In East Texas, the trend is east and southeast, threatening Sabine, Jasper, and Newton counties, Dr. Cox reports.

"The first case of fox rabies in any county is an indication that work needs to be started immediately on control," Dr. Cox said. "You know you're in for trouble."

Fox rabies is six times more prevalent in winter months than in summer, Cox indicated. He added that every fox killed now will save trouble later.

He made the prediction of increased rabies incidence despite the fact that rabies-suspect animals heads autopsied at the health department Bureau of Laboratories in September were fewer than at any time since May.

Dr. Cox said wildlife rabies in most affected areas kills off wildlife to a point where rabies cannot maintain itself. It thus dies out and does not reappear until the population builds itself up again.
