Foremost among the watchdogs who have faithfully guarded the interests of the Texas public against graft and greed is Olin Culberson, leading candidate for railroad commissioner, who, through a distinguished career, has gained a solid reputation as a man who can't be fixed.

As an executive in the state gas utilities division, he got gas consumers \$180,000 in refunds and annual savings of \$572,000. He quickly gained the reputation as a perfectly honest man, an enthusiast for reasonable gas rates and a hard fighter, respected by all gas companies and hated and feared by some.

His hobby is salary-free work for voluntary firemen. This work led him to discover that fire insurance rates were too high, and he fought for reductions and won them. It is estimated that his work has brought policyholders \$2,000,000 a year in






