crock or barrel. Jars with glass lids, that clamp down, are preferred. The salt in sauerkraut will corrode metal

If there is a cool storage place and the sauerkraut is to be used during the winter, you can make the kraut right in the jars. Mix the shredded cabbage with the salt-4 ounces of salt to 10 pounds of cabbage and pack it into the jars. Place the rubbers and lids on the jars, but do not seat tightly Have an enamel pan under the jars to catch the juice that bubbles out. Let the kraut stand for two or three days until there is good gas formation. Then pour the juice back, and seal the jars. Allow the kraut to ripen for a month or six weeks, and then it is ready

When sauerkraut until gummer, it's best ment for about 10 days an be ready for canning. Have sauerkraut thoroug then fork it into the jars. Put the rubbers and lids on the jars, but do not seal. Place the jars in a bath of boiling water and continu heating for about 5 minutes, until the water returns to boiling. Then seal the jars and continue heating them in the water bath 10 minutes for quart jars, and 15 minutes for

two-quart jars There's a modern trend in cook ing sauerkraut, too. Many cooks prefer to cook kraut like other vegetables-only for a short time Panning is a convenient and quick method. Simply place the kraut is a frying pan with some bot fat cover, and cook for about 5 s to use glass jars that hold minutes. Add celery seed or caramough kraut for a single way seed to make a really savory

sauerkraut in a covered pan with a very tart apple chopped and mixed with the kraut. Tuck some frankfurters into the sauerkraut and and cook until the "wienies are piping hot all through.

In many localities there are other traditional ways to serve sauerkraut. Some like it especially well with turkey, goose, and other poultry. Other cooks put the sauerkraut in a baking dish with layer of spareribs over the op, and heat in a moderate oven turning the spareribs to get hem cooked through and brown on both sides. Others serve sauer craut with loin or shoulder of oork. Another idea is to scal he sauerkraut with macaroni an ooked sausages or bits of ham.
