AUSTIN, - State | Legislators wound up their 60th session here on schedule, despite a hectic flurry of last-minute assignments, and left behind a far-reaching record of achievement in many areas.

No one can deny that there were some notable failures. But the accomplishments were impressive. Here is a random look at some of the session's highlights:

*BUDGET-Lawmakers agreed on \$2,400,000.000 in spending (\$446, 800, 000 from general revenue) for 1968, without passing a tax bill. They will come back next year to budget for 1969. Funds provide for substantial increases in all areas of state government, including education, health, general administration and welfare.

*SCHOOL TEACHERS-After requesting a \$68,000,000 salary increase program and being offer-ed \$55,500,000 by the Senate, teachers finally got \$51,000,000.

STATE EMPLOYEES - These workers came up with their most substantial salary benefits in history. Raises averaged about 14 per cent and ranged up to 30 per






