Farmers Battle In Fields To Control Weeds

A FIERCE battle is being conducted in Motley County and area fields as farmers attempt to bring the "bumper" weed crop under control.

Home-owners here in Matador are fighting the same kind of battle in order to keep lawns and gardens under control. Mowers and shredders are operating almost continuously during the daylight hours.

Ranchers are enthusiastic about the excellent range conditions, declared to be the best in 30 years at this time of the season.

Continued rains have produced some of the best crop prospects in several years, but the weeds and grass have also benefited from the abundant moisture. Modern, efficient machinery can cope with the problem if the fields are not too wet to operate.

Several reports have been received where tractors have been operating on a 24-hour a day schedule, to get late crops planted and to cultivate growing cotton and feeds.

Joey Thacker landed in Lubbock at 9:30 Tuesday night, July 18, following a 44-day European excursion.

Son of Mr. and Mrs. J. M. Thacker of Roaring Springs, Joey arrived in New York at 10 a.m. July 18 and flew to Dallas, where he is engaged for Lubbock.

The Texas Tech junior departed from Dallas June 4 for London, where he saw Queen Elizabeth II and the Duke and Duchess of Windsor make their historic first public appearance together since the Duke and Duchess married.

While in Germany, Thacker visited the parents of his German professor, Hugo Lentze in Munster and spoke only German to the couple. He also visited in Stuttgart, Germany, with former Roaring Springs residents, Cdr. and Mrs. C. Sherwood, D.C.A. in Europe.

After touring Salzburg and Innsbruck, Austria, and Switzerland, Joey spent the week end in Paris. He was there July 14, which is Bastille Day. On July 14, 1789, the Bastille, a French prison was stormed, marking the beginning of a bloody French Revolution which unseated King Louis XVI.

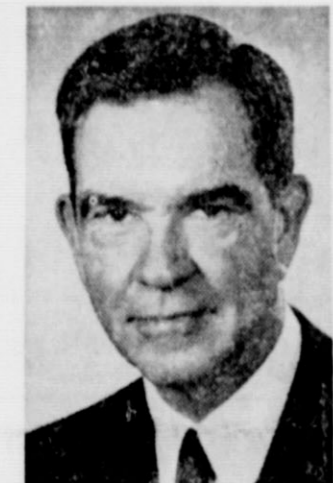
Hale Center Man Is Appointed to State Council

Funds Approved For Water Survey

WASHINGTON, D.C., July 26 - Representative George Mahon reports from Washington that this week the House passed the Public Works Appropriation Bill which includes \$400,000 to continue a board investigation of the possibility of importing water into the West Texas and Eastern New Mexico area.

Of the sum provided \$200,000 goes to the Bureau of Reclamation and was included in the President's budget and was placed in the bill upon request of Mahon, Chairman of the House Appropriations Committee. Mahon stated that the additional funds would be made available to the Corps of Engineers in order to achieve proper coordination between the two agencies.

The preliminary study of water import possibilities for the area was launched last year. The amount provided in the current bill will continue this study and will broaden it to include both the Bureau of Reclamation and the Army Corps of Engineers.

Mahon pointed out that the importation of water into the West Texas and Eastern New Mexico area was an extremely long-range proposition and will require the coordinated efforts of many interests. He was confident, however, that proper steps were being taken at this time to move the project forward.

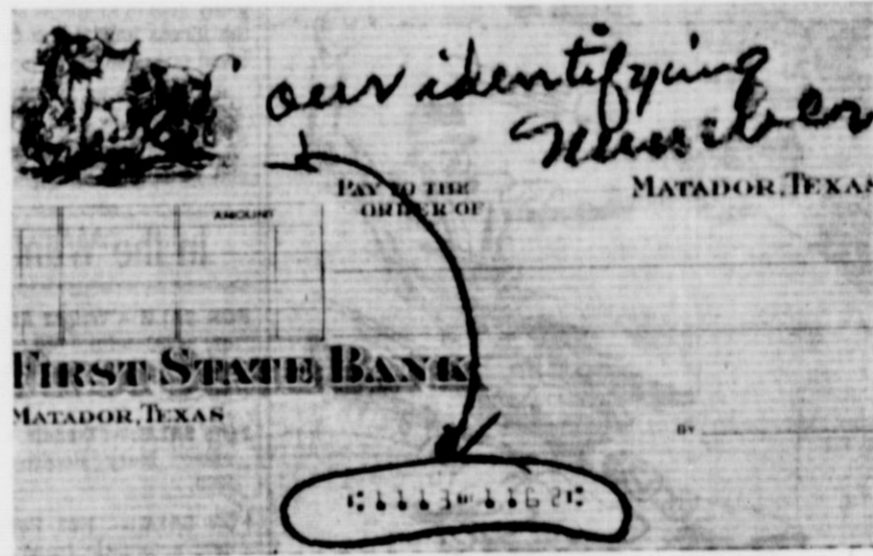

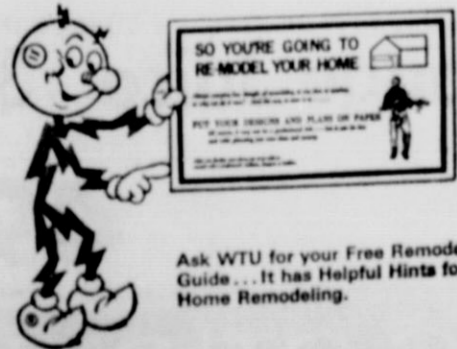
