Discount **On Taxes**

Editor's Note — Considerable misunderstanding has resulted in Motley county's policy of not allowing discounts on the payment of taxes.

The following statement was prepared especially for the Tribune by County Judge W. R. Cammack and is published verbatim, without charge, in the interest of greater unity and cooperation.

THE DISCOUNT ON TAXES

"The question often arises as to why the commissioners' court does not allow the 3% discount on county advalorem taxes if paid in October,-2% if paid in November, and 1% if paid in December, which is offered by the State, but optional with counties, under the

This is a pertinent question and worthy of explanation. We believe that our reasons are quite obvious when properly considered.

"First, There is no provision in our county budget for such a discount. The commissioners' court is operating county affairs on the least possible amount of expenditures. A 3% discount on all county advalorem taxes payable this fiscal year would amount to \$1,-880.00. If allowed it would then be necessary to either raise the county valuation by \$149,000.00 in order to regain that \$1880.00, or run the county in debt each year to that extent. If the county valuation was raised by \$149,000.00 then the state's levy of 75 cents on the \$100. valuation would apply, which would actually cost the tax payers of this county \$1,107.50 more money than they will pay under the present plan; and the State would get it all.

Second, If we could afford a discount on county taxes, that within itself would be prima-facie evidence that you are being taxed too much.

Third, If taxes were paid on the first day of October, the saving to the payer, or loss to the county. would equal an interest rate of 12% per annum; if such taxes were paid on the last day of October the interest rate would equal nearly 18% per annum. Then why should the county suffer so much loss (and the taxpayer gain nothing) when it could borrow plenty of money at half that rate of in-

terest? "Fourth, To illustrate: Last year 3% was deducted from all state advalorem taxes that were paid during the month of October, If all state advalorem taxes had been paid during that month the total discount would have been \$739.35 in Motley county; but don't overlook the fact that this year the state found its general fund over \$32,000,000.00 in the RED, and raised its levy by 17 cents on the \$100 valuation, which cost Motley county over \$8300.00, or more than ten times as much as the 3% discount amounted to ast year; and the \$32. deficit must still be met.
