LUBBOCK, Dec. 1—Glider pilots at South Plains Army Flying school are indeed a versatile bunch...

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Traffic Deaths In State Drop

AUSTIN, Nov. 23—Those big black hats that Texas motor police will don Dec. 1 will not be worn in mourning.

The state department of public safety announced statistics showing 442 fewer deaths in motor vehicle accidents in Texas from January to November than for the first 10 months of 1941.

For the first 10 months of 1942, 929 accidents and 1,113 deaths were recorded, October's 71 deaths was the lowest for any month of 1942.

Houston led the state with 41 deaths for the 10 months and San Antonio and Fort Worth had better records than for the corresponding 10 months of 1941 with 19 and 16 deaths respectively.

Corpus Christi was the only city in the 56,000 to 100,000 classification to increase its death total from motor accidents, the figure jumping from three to eight.

Lubbock, Tyler and San Angelo have clear records to date and Wichita Falls, Laredo and Port Arthur have reduced the number of deaths for the comparative period.
