Deb Jones, Daphne Meredith, and Kim Woolsey provide a service that many people are finding to be a necessary part of health care. They are home health care providers.

Home health care allows for patients to be cared for in the comfort and security of their own home, and helps keep the patients' costs down by cutting out doctors' fees and hospital stays, they said.

Jones, a registered nurse, Meredith, a licensed vocational nurse and Woolsey, a health care aide, all live in Motley County and are employed by Total Home Health Care of Lubbock. They work mostly in the county but also cover some of the surrounding areas, they said.

"This is a much needed service in this area, because many people don't have family members around to help," Woolsey

Woolsey has been in home health care for three years and is responsible for everyday tasks such as preparation of meals, baths and checking vital signs.

Jones worked in a hospital for 13 years, and has been a home health nurse for five years. She is responsible for case management and evaluation, but helps with other duties if needed.

"It's a different place, more one-on-

one with the patients," Jones said. All three women enjoy working with people and have family members who have also been in the nursing profession, they said. They have monthly meetings where they set goals for their patients.


